



Robert E. Reynolds, MD, DrPH was born in 1938 and was raised in Xenia, Ohio where he attended public schools. He earned his BA degree at Yale University (history and philosophy) in 1960, his MD from Harvard University in 1964, and a doctoral degree in public health (medical care administration) from the Johns Hopkins School of Public Health in 1970. He trained in internal medicine at the Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center and the Johns Hopkins Medical Institutions. He also completed a residency in clinical preventive medicine at the Johns Hopkins School of Public Health. He is a Fellow of the American College of Physicians and the American College of Preventive Medicine.

Dr. Reynolds began his involvement with computers and information systems at the Medical College of Georgia where he served as associate dean for health care programs and associate professor of medicine from 1970-73. From 1973 through 1981 he served as professor of preventive medicine, associate professor of medicine, and medical director of the Sheridan Road Hospital of the Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center where he was also responsible for installing and managing a new and innovative hospital information system.

In 1981, Dr. Reynolds assumed the position of associate dean for administration and hospital affairs, and associate professor of medicine at the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine. In this role he was responsible for the school's financial and administrative affairs, and for coordination with the Johns Hopkins Hospital. He was also the primary spokesperson for information technology in for the administration, medical education and clinical practice for the School of Medicine before moving to the University of Virginia in 1988.

Dr. Reynolds was appointed Senior Associate Vice President for health sciences and professor of medicine at the University of Virginia in 1988 where he was responsible for financial affairs, strategic planning, information technology and intra-institutional coordination between the components of the UVA health sciences. In 1996 he was named the Vice Provost for Health Sciences and the William Hobson professor of health information sciences. He also became professor and director of the division of clinical informatics in the newly established department of health evaluation sciences (now public health sciences) when it was inaugurated in 1996.

At the University of Virginia Dr. Reynolds led several of the grounds-wide strategic planning initiatives for information systems, and was responsible for the development and implementation of the Academic Computing Center in the Health Sciences and the Clinical Data Repository between 1988-99, and for UVA's preparations for the Year 2000 computer systems event. He also served as an informatics and information systems advisor and consultant for the National Library of Medicine, the Association of American Medical Colleges, and numerous hospitals and private enterprises.

In 1999 Dr. Reynolds was appointed to the position of Vice President and Chief Information Officer for the University of Virginia, and held this position until 2006. He then returned to the department of public health sciences in the School of Medicine as acting chair for 2006-07 and vice chair for 2007-08. He retired as Professor Emeritus in the summer of 2008. He was recalled by the UVA Hospital & Clinics in February 2009 to serve as Project Director for the implementation of the \$122 million dollar EPIC electronic medical record system implementation. He retired again in June 2010.
