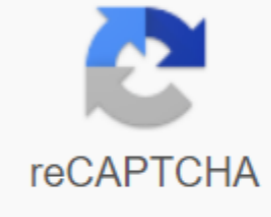




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Daredevil born again

It was later republished in the graphic format of the novel along with the previous release of the #226, and the subsequent story of the arc from Daredevil #232-233, which decides some loose ends from the original story arc. Because of this, this subsequent plot arc has become generally considered part of Born Of Above. The story tells in detail about daredevil's descent into madness and poverty at the hands of Kingpin, as well as the subsequent struggle to build a new life for himself. Background and Creation With regular writer Danny O'Neill preparing to leave the series, longtime Daredevil editor Ralph Macchio called Frank Miller and asked if he would be interested in returning to the series. Miller, whose first stint as a writer brought Daredevil off the verge of cancellation in the list of top sellers, agreed on the condition that artist David Mazzucchelli would work out full scripts. Contrary to rumors, Mazzacelli did not rely on Miller's layouts; work of art on the history of completely Mazzucchelli's. Plot summary of Karen Page, a former secretary of Nelson and Murdoch's law firm in New York and ex-girlfriend Matt Murdock, left years early to pursue an acting career. After a brief success, she became a heroin addict and was reduced to a role in pornographic films in Mexico. For cash, she sells information that Matt is a Daredevil for a heroin drug. This information is being sold in Kingpin's direction. Over the next six months, Kingpin used his influence to force the IRS to freeze Murdoch's accounts, buy back bank accounts in his apartment, and police it. Nicholas Manolis testified that he saw Murdoch pay a witness for pretending to be a living. By coincidence, Murdoch's girlfriend Glorianna O'Brien breaks up with him and turns to meet his partner and best friend Foggy Nelson on the rebound. Initial investigations by Daredevil revealed that Manolis was helping to frame Murdoch in exchange for his son's treatment, but he could not find who was behind the set-up and did not want to hand Manoliz over to authorities. Nelson's exceptional legal defense saves Murdoch from prison, although he is prohibited from practicing law. His original plan is thwarted, Kingpin has Murdoch mined, leaving his Daredevil suit in the wreckage to show that he knows his secret identity and is responsible for his recent ordeal. He also orders that anyone else who has been involved in the identity of Daredevil be killed. Karen eludes Kingpin's killers and makes her way to New York to find Murdoch. Now homeless, plagued by paranoia and increasingly aggressive, Murdoch has consistently followed Kingpin's subordinates, providing Kingpin with frequent updates about Murdoch's mental state as he became obsessed with the fruits of his scheme to destroy Murdoch. Driven by thoughts of revenge, Murdoch confronts Kingpin in his office and is brutally beaten by a criminal lord. To prevent an investigation into his death, the unconscious Murdoch soaked in whiskey and strapped into a stolen taxi, which was then pushed into the East River. Murdoch regains consciousness, breaks out of the cockpit and swims to safety. Heavily injured, he stumbles through the infernal kitchen, eventually finding his way to the gym where his father trained as a boxer. There he was found by his mother Maggie, who, having been in Matt's life for decades, became a nun in the local Catholic Church. She's looking after him to get back to health. Meanwhile, Daily Bugle reporter Ben Urich investigates the plight of his confidant and stands vigil with Manolis as his son is taken for surgery. When his son dies, Manolis confesses to Urich in the set-up and suspicions that Kingpin was behind it. Nurse Lois, the performer appointed by Kingpin to oversee Manolis, responds by breaking Urich's fingers and beating Manolis almost to death. Undarited Manolis calls Urich from his hospital bed, but Lois breaks into his room and strangles him, laying the receiver on the bed so Urich can hear him kill. Instead of thrusting it, it goads Urich to come forward with his investigation, alerting him to the paper and the power of the situation. Karen arrives in New York, rolling with pornography fanatic Paulo Scorsese, who supplies her with heroin in exchange for sexual services. She contacts Foggy to ask about Murdoch's whereabouts. When he realizes that Paulo beat her, Foggy insists on taking her to his house. Kingpin, increasingly obsessed with Murdoch's murder, uses his military connections to procure America's super soldier Nuke. To pull Murdoch out of hiding, he arranges for the cruel mentally ill to be released from the shelter, dress up as Daredevil and kill Nelson. Nurse Lois is ordered to move so she can not be involved, but she rebels and tries to kill Urich. Murdoch, who followed Urich after learning about articles he wrote about Kingpin, knocked out Lois and left her to the authorities. He then overheard a phone call to Urich, who had prompted him to plot to kill him. At the same time, Paige notices how Skortsev pursues Nelson's apartment building. To prevent nelson's murder, she runs out into the street to meet him, and they are attacked by killers, whom Kingpin ordered to kill anyone who leaves the building. The imposter Daredevil arrives to find Murdoch waiting for him. Murdoch defeats the impostor and saves Page. Paige admits that it was she who gave his secret identity, but Murdoch tells her that he went beyond the loss of his material property. Now back together, they move into an abandoned apartment, where Murdoch helps her through heroin seizures, supporting them as a diner chef. Nurse Lois offers to testify against Kingpin in exchange for a reduced sentence, but he killed her reporter Daily Bugle, who sent to interview her. Unable to pull Murdoch out of hiding, Kingpin orders Nuke to fly to Hell's Kitchen and make a general attack. From a helicopter Nuke shoots at dozens of civilians and destroys the diner where Murdoch works. Appearing as Daredevil for the first time since his apartment was destroyed, he has no choice but to kill both Nuke and his pilot to avoid further civilian casualties. However, Nuke survives his attack, and the Avengers arrive at the scene to take Nuke into custody. Captain America, dismayed that Nuke has a tattoo of an American flag on his face, explores his past. When the military authorities give him evasive answers, he breaks into top secret records and discovers that Nuke is the only surviving test subject from several attempts to recreate Project: Rebirth, a project that has strengthened the captain's own body. Nuke is out of custody at the same base. He is stopped by Captain America, but Kingpin gives the order to kill Nouk. A nuclear bomb was shot by the military. Daredevil, hearing word of Nuke's escape while stealing money to rebuild the diner, grabs Nuke from Captain America and takes him to the Daily Bugle, hoping to get him to testify about Kingpin. He is not fast enough, and Nuke dies before he can provide any evidence. Trying to get Nuke back from Daredevil, Captain America instead stumbles upon one of the killers who sent Nuke to kill. Killer names Kingpin for Nuke's attack on Hell's Kitchen, creating a wave of lawsuits. Although Kingpin is able to fight most (but not all) of the charges, his image as an honest and respectable businessman is destroyed, and his lieutenants lose confidence in him. His obsession unabated, he ignores the role of Captain America and plans to avenge Murdoch instead. As for Murdoch, he lives in Hell's Kitchen, content with his life with Karen and vowing to fight for justice in his neighborhood. The themes and symbolism of Born Again makes intense use symbols, primarily from Roman Catholicism (although the name evokes a common Protestant Protestant the phrase itself was uttered by Jesus in the third chapter of the Gospel of John to indicate that the old life must end for the beginning of a new life. While the story takes place during the Christmas season, it follows the Easter theme almost exclusively. The splash pages of the first four chapters all show Matt Murdock lying down. In chapters 2 and 3, he is in the position of the fruit, followed by him, suggesting the posture of the crucified Jesus Christ in chapter 4. Chapter 5's Splash page shows what he stands for, a representative of the resurrected Jesus. In Chapter 3, he wanders through Hell's Kitchen parallels Jesus' walk to Calvary, including the three waterfalls presented in the Stations of the Cross, before culminating in a depiction of Pite. Sister Maggie takes on the role of the Virgin Mary, and the pigeon (traditionally used in Christian works of art to represent the Holy Spirit) is put above her. All chapter titles, with the exception of the names of the history of the arc in #232-233, are the names of Christian concepts. The reception of David Mazzucchelli's autographed copy of the artist's edition of The Story on June 28, 2012 signing at Midtown Comics in Manhattan The first issue storyline was recognized as the 11th of the 100 Greatest Marvels of All Time by fans in 2001. In 2012, IDW Publishing published David Mazzacelli's book Daredevil: Born From Above: The Artist's Edition, a 200-page hardcover story line printed in the size of original art, 12 x 17 inches. The art for the book was scanned by Mazzucchelli himself, and in color, according to other books in the IDW Artist's Edition series, in order to mimic how to view actual original art, complete with things such as pastes, blue pencils in art, editorial notes and artistic corrections. Mazzucchelli appeared at a signing event for the book at Midtown Comics on June 28, 2012. The signing was preceded by a discussion with other chip kidd creators and a WA session with fans in attendance. The sequel to Last Rites in Daredevil #297-300, although written and drawn by a completely different set of creators (except for the colorist Kristy Schiele), is, to some extent, a thematic sequel to Born Again. The plot of Last Rites focuses on the daredevil, systematically destroying Kingpin's reputation and worldly possessions, just as Kingpin did with him in Born Again. In an apparent acknowledgedgerability of this parallel, the deranged Kingpin mutters born-again... in the final game. The story also sees Murdoch finally unravelling the frame of the job from Born Again, the back-up license of his lawyer. In Born Again, Kingpin hires Foggy Nelson for one of his firms. When writer Frank Miller left the series, this plot thread was temporarily abandoned before it was finally resolved in Daredevil #248-256. In other ways Information Director Mark Steven Johnson expressed interest in directing the sequel to the 2003 film Daredevil with the storyline Born Again. In June 2011, it was reported that Fringe screenwriter Brad Caleb Kane was adapting the Born Again storyline for the film. In August 2012, it was reported that Fox had given up the role of director Joe Carnahan in the film based on the film Born Again. On October 10, 2012, the film rights returned to Marvel Studios. Elements of the Born Again storyline are teased in the second and three seasons of Netflix's Daredevil. After escaping from Frank Castle prison Wilson Fisk is seen in his prison cell and asks for files on Matt Murdock. The series features Dex Poindexter (Wilson Bethel), while Fisk watches the news of Dex's first attack from the wall of monitors. Fisk has previously tried to drive Matt into the East River in a taxi, and Big Ben Donovan uses Fisk's There's No Dead Body line when news comes of Matt's death. Matt's entrance was also filmed, with Matt seemingly killed in the destruction of Midland Circle at the end of the Defenders, alive and recovering in the convent.
