The U.S. Marine Corps uses various leadership styles for officers to communicate orders to subordinates. These styles vary between two extremes where the commander is the only voice in the leadership structure to create a command model where subordinates are able to communicate with generals in shaping command decisions and military strategies. Autocratic leadership gives absolute authority to the commander-in-chief to make decisions and assign staff. The Marine Corps officer or soldier commissioned by a given unit is responsible for all aspects of mission parameters, and the execution of his subordinates. These subordinates have no power to offer opinions on given assignments and are not allowed to freelance outside mission orders. Democratic leadership gives every member of the unit or leadership structure an equal say in taking proposals for command decisions. It's the other side of the spectrum of an autocratic Marine Corps leadership style. Subordinates are free to make decisions within mission parameters. However, the ultimate decision regarding mission parameters is still being made by the commander, and subordinates may not change mission parameters simply to fit an action course. Telling is a variation of the autocratic Marine Corps leadership style. Leadership engages in one-way communication with subordinates to communicate mission details and specific assignments. This style of leadership is common in combat situations where orders need to be communicated quickly and clearly and not open to discussion. According to the military website, Training.net expect marine leaders to accept this style in crisis situations. Experienced marines can find this style demoralizing because leaders don't use them as a human resource in decision-making. This leadership style is a variation of democratic leadership and is characterised by minimal oversight with the commander providing mission parameters. Each marine is given the necessary authority to complete his given task so that the leader of the unit does not have to actively oversee every mission detail. An example of this style is a gun sergeant directed to oversee the firing of exercises so that the commander can pay attention to other matters. Two-way communication between subordinates and the command structure is a feature of this leadership style. The command structure involves the experience and opinions of its lower-ranking marines, and uses this information to form decisions and strategies. Battalion commanders often use this leadership style to e put together figures and estimates from staff to make effective combat decisions and move troops for optimal efficiency. You must meet a variety of criteria to qualify for the flight program and pass various training programs. According to the U.S. Marine Corps, flight training is the longest and most extensive training in the corps. Future pilots should be U.S. citizens. Officers are typically aged between 18 and 28; enlisted Marines who take officer training can be as old as 30. Like any other Marine, you must pass access fitness tests. If you get into flight school, you also take a flight physical exam and you must meet vision requirements. All marine officers must have a bachelor's degree. As an officer, you might not need to take the Armed Services Occupational Plant Battery tests if your SAT or ACT scores are high enough. You will need to pass the Aviation Selection Test Battery before you can start flight training. During the application process, potential officers should speak to an officer's selection officer. This program lasts six months and trains officers in how to be infantry platoon commanders. The Marine Air-Ground Task Force is organized into four elements: the command, land, aviation and logistics combat elements. Although not everyone considers the pros and cons of a particular branch of the military in the same light, there are some common facts about joining the Marines that can be considered disadvantages compared to joining other military branches. In terms of size, all other branches of the U.S. military, except the Coast Guard, have more personnel than the Marines - both enlisted and officers. That in itself creates limited availability for Marine jobs. Furthermore, the Marine Corps does not offer the same choice of work that some of the other branches have. For example, there are no medical staff in the Marines; the Marine Corps uses naval medical personnel when necessary, therefore those who spirize to become medicine are unable to do so in the Marines. All new entries, regardless of branch, must undergo some sort of basic training. The Navy calls it boot camp, the army calls it basic combat training, and the Air Force calls it basic military training. In the Marine Corps, it has the somewhat softer title of recruiting training. Nevertheless, Marine recruiting training is the longest in the duration, lasting 12 weeks. Boat camp in the Navy and Air Force is nearly a month shorter. Army basic training lasts about 10 weeks. Furthermore, only two locations in the country provide Marine Corps recruiting training: Parris Island, SC and San Diego, CA. Both of these locations are typically hot and humid, especially during physical fitness exercises. All military branches require enrolled applicants to be at least 17, but each branch determines the maximum entry age. The maximum age is 42 for the Army and 34 for the Navy. Marine Corps officials can't get their 28th when they have reached their and enrolled staff may not have reached their 29th birthday at the time of entry. Only the Air Force and Coast Guard set a younger maximum age of 27. The relatively young cut-off age could be a disadvantage to many wanting to join the Marines. The Marine Corps prides itself on maintaining combat readiness, which could lead to days starting early and ending late. A typical day starts with physical training - usually a run. Even when off duty, however, the Corps expects all Marines to execute themselves properly, bringing no dishonor to the corps or the title of Marine. Despite the tougher regulations and lack of work, Marines receive the same salary as those in other branches with equivalent rank and years of service. As of 2018, an E-1 earned \$1,514.70 per month in basic pay for the first four months and \$1,638.30 thereafter. An E-2 earns \$1,836.30 per month. Officers starting at pay grade U-1 earn between \$3,107.70 and \$3,910.20, and an U-2 earns between \$3,580.50 and \$4,955.10.
