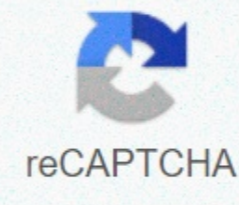

This documentary makes history entertaining as well as educational. Beautifully photographed, using reenactments, paintings, maps, ceramics, metalwork and living statues to take the viewer on a vicarious journey through ancient Greece. Episode one, the Revolution, begins at the beginning of democracy in 508 f.Kr., with the revolution of the ordinary people against aristocratic rule. The film then travels further back in time to chronicle the main events leading up to the revolution. As the camera roams ancient ruins, the Greek countryside and ancient stone roads, the viewer learns that the inhabitants of Greece once lived in mud houses without sewage and often became victims of disease and warfare. Unable to write, they remembered their works of literature to pass them on to the next generation. Over time, their afflictions and learning hissed their appetite for freedom. After being ruled by tyrants of the aristocratic class and a struggle for power, Cleisthenes (570-507 f.Kr.), himself an aristocrat, sided with the ordinary people of Athens and brought democracy to stay. From the beginning, Western democracy developed and flourished. All the while during their early maturation to a <https://>power, Athens and other city states had to live with the threat of war from expansionist Sparta as well as the great Persian empire. But democracy had taken root, and in the long run it turned out to be a greater force than the most powerful armies. The Greeks: Crucible of Civilization is a two part documentary conducted by the BBC that describes the rise and fall of one of the world's most vibrant societies, the Greek city-state of Athens. Part 1 describes the birth of a radical new form of government in the village of Athens in 508 f.Kr., and the subsequent rise of this society to the most powerful force in the eastern Mediterranean and its showdown with the global superpower, Persia. Part 2 begins with the Golden Age of Athens and ends with the destruction of Athens at the hands of the Spartans in 415 f.Kr. In less than a hundred years, Athens would transform itself from a village to become leader of the Mediterranean world, would make contributions to the language, science, mathematics, culture and politics that are still felt today, and would then be defeated and subjugated.
