Installing a TV with a DVD player in a car has become common for many people. The next level is the installation of a game system. There is no standard method for installing one, but it is possible. The most important things are finding a safe location for the game system in the car and a way to connect the power supply to the electrical system. Install a TV in the car if it doesn't have one. The TV needs input ports that will work with the game console; most use RCA composite plugs. Most car TVs get into a seat headrest; Cut a hole in the back of the headrest and fall within the TV frame in it. Mount the game console in a safe place. If there is enough free space, under the passenger seat is fine. You can also mount it on the dashboard if it is not in the driver's view or in the path of airbags. Velcro adhesive strips will hold it in place. If there is nowhere else, try storing it in the glove compartment. Connect the console to the TV using RCA cables. If the TV is in a headrest, direct the cables through the seat upholstery. This works best if the console is under the seat. If it is in front, route a cable long enough under the seat and up through the upholstery. Connect the console's power adapter to the machine's electrical system with a DC inverter. Place the inverter in a corner of the passenger floor and connect it to a cigarette adapter. Run the console power cord under the seat (or along the edge of the dashboard) and connect it to the inverter. Store games and system controllers in a secure container. Just last November, investment banking firm Bear Stearns reported that games as a category would grow considerably faster than television, radio, movies, music, and newspapers, and they seem to have been on something: Americans spending on video games last year reached an incredible \$4.6 billion, more than the total amount spent on movies (rental and theater combined). Today's games are far from the classic 1970 Atari, which created the most gurus of modern games. Three-dimensional characters move in all directions in amazingly detailed cartoon worlds, using complex movements that would make Bruce Lee a disgrace. So this may explain why more than 90 percent of today's games are purchased by someone over the age of 18 (for themselves or for other members of the household). Three rock systems currently rock the gaming world: Sony PlayStation 2, Nintendo GameCube, and Microsoft Xbox. These are all hits for different reasons, so you just have to choose which features appeal to you. And rest easy: your purchase will not be exceeded by the moment you get home; Dramatically different systems are not expected for about two years, although fun new accessories are hitting the daily market. PlayStation 2 PlayStation 2: The Leader of the Pack Sony PlayStation 2 (PS 2) (\$199) is the overwhelming leader with more than 11 million systems sold in North America alone. It can play titles developed specifically for it, in addition to those made for its predecessor. (This model is now repackaged and sold as PS One for \$49.) The combination means that PS 2 players can choose from more than 1,200 games, four times the number available for GameCube. Many of these games, of course, were a long time ago and do not live up to today's standards. PS 2 is a steal, because it can play DVDs and CDs and boasts dolby 5.1 surround-sound support. GameCube GameCube: The Smallest Nintendo GameCube (\$150) is the cutest in the bouquet, measuring about 6 inches on each side, and includes a built-in handle. It uses a proprietary mini-CD so that it cannot play standard CDs or DVDs. It has no hard drive, so it uses a memory card like PS 2 to record settings and scores. And although it has the lowest number of games, the ones available include exclusive offers like Pokemon, Zelda and Mario (such as Super Mario Sunshine, which sold over 350,000 copies in the first 10 days it was available in stores). Xbox Xbox: Microsoft's most powerful Xbox (\$199) has an internal hard drive, a built-in network jack, and claims to have the most powerful processor and the best graphics processing of the three systems. It uses standard-sized CDs; to play DVDs, you will need to buy a \$30 adapter. It's compatible with high-definition TVs, and some new TVs are now even complete with built-in Xbox support. Three's Company: What they have in common You will find similarities between the three systems. All boxes simply connect to the wall and in the TV.
