Anti-slavery organization Made in a Free World attracted much of the Internet's attention with The Slavery Footprint, a website that estimates how many slaves were involved in creating products we use and carry every day. But how to turn all the ensuing anti-slavery feelings into action? In mid-June, Made in a Free World announced a partnership with the U.S. State Department to create a tool for assessing the supply chain for businesses. Called FRDM (Forced Labor Risk Determination & Mitigation), its purpose is to detect hotspots where forced labor can be present. These hotspots are evaluated based on made in a Free World's database of risk factors, services, raw materials and products. The tool will also offer recommendations to eliminate slavery from supply chains, using best practices, securing better supply contracts and gaining access to slavery-free providers. We've wanted to build a market identifier for over five years. When the slavery footprint came out we created the Made in a Free World brand to be that identifier. We then spent the last two years learning about how global corporate procurement works. What we learned is that most companies have no idea what risks are behind their first level provider. This has simply not been a priority for businesses. So we built a tool that will open optics in supply chains while allowing business ways to get involved, writes Justin Dillon, founder and CEO of Made in a Free World, in an email. FRDM will offer its tool for free or charge a fee based on company size, according to Dillon. The only instructions I got in advance of my one-day immersion experience as a pret A Manger team member were these: Wear jeans and black shoes. When I arrived before dawn at the Pret store on Kingsway in west London, across the street from the London School of Economics, I was shuffled into a small dressing room and handed a long-sleeved white button-down shirt, a maroon cap featuring Pret gold star, and a maroon scarf. I would cyclethrough the kind of routine that a Pret job seeker endures on his or her her test day — an opportunity to work with most of the team members at a given store and to get a taste of the different tasks they perform. After a regular test day, employees vote if they think an applicant would make a good addition to the team. Since many of Pret's bonuses are based on service quality — and because no one likes to work with a geek — it's in the team's best interest to hurt people who seem outrainable or unpleasant. Ewan Stickley, Pret's head of education, had informed me that about 75% of applicants who pass an initial interview and come to a training day are hired. The crew of Kingsway Pret is optimistic - they are on the eve of a long Christmas break - and multicultural. Many of them have moved to London from places like Spain, Italy, the Netherlands and Sierra Leone to learn English. After a quick 7:15 AM team meeting, I am told to make sandwiches in the kitchen, as other team members scamper around in the front, baking croissants and readying the cappuccino machines in advance of the store's 7:30 AM opening. I spend most of the morning assisting in the kitchen, assembling sandwiches. We do them in rounds of 20 or 40. Most Pret menu items are made on the day they are sold, with ingredients delivered to the store in the morning. (Unsold product is donated to food banks and homeless shelters at the end of the day.) Sometimes, the kitchen feels like a scene from a Pret training video, with team members singing along to American oldies playing loudly on the stereo and shouting encouragement at shy Claudine as she shakes her hips to the music. Hey la, hey la, my boyfriend's back, so so so. The only downer is washing dishes after each batch of sandwiches. The importance of spreading all the sandwich ingredients to the edge of the bread is drilled into me. Customers do not like sandwiches that are deprived of fillings in the first piece. Sandwiches also have to look good after they slipped into their triangular cartons. They eat with their eyes, these customers, said Dutch-born Johannike.Sandwiches are checked twice by our group leader, Salome: only when they are still open and on the counter, to make sure we haven't omitted any ingredients, and again when they're in the boxes, for one last aesthetic nod. Salome quietly picks two of my Coronation Chicken sandwiches from the tray before making it out onto the shelves. It can't just be good ingredients; it must look good, explains another team member, Davide, who had bravely tried to doctor my defective grub before the inspection. After a free lunch — I studiously avoid the sandwiches I've made and opt for a baguette with brie, tomato and basil — I go out front and help the two baristas with their afternoon cappuccino making. I keep a close eye on the thermometer when I get the milk in a can be frothy, but at one point forget to turn off the steam nozzle before I pull the jug away, spraying hot milk on myself, the counter, and the machine that lines start growing for the first time in the day. I remember something that Stickley told me the previous day about the importance of customers getting their coffee less than 60 seconds after they pay for it. At the end of the day, when I turn in my uniform, store manager Diana assures me that if I want a job with Pret, I would likely be approved by a team member vote. You probably enter into business contracts every week. But do you understand the contract basics? Can you interpret standard rules? Are you sure your contract is enforceable? Learn what you need to know about business deals so you can avoid making common contract mistakes. Timing is all in terms of labor, but do you know how to track contractions correctly? Here's how to monitor contraction distance and duration, which will let you know when to go to the hospital. Contractions happen when your uterus tightens in preparation to deliver your baby. Timing the duration of contractions, as well as the space between them, helps parents-to-be track stages of labor. But whether you're using a stopwatch or a timer app, improperly monitoring contractions can mean spending extra time in the hospital before your birth, rather than relaxing at home. Or you can cut it close and get to your hospital or maternity center just at the last moment. RELATED: What Labor Contractions feels from the beginning of birth Here's the scoop on exactly how to measure your labor contractions so you can give your caregiver an accurate picture of your work progress. You should time from the beginning of a contraction to the beginning of the next contraction, said Paul du Treil, M.D., director of maternal and child health at Touro Infirmary in New Orleans. It shows how far apart your contractions are going. Generally, the early contractions are pre-labor type of stuff, and can last 20 to 30 seconds at most. Dr. du Treil says. But when they start to be closer to a minute, and they're consistently about four minutes apart, and they're consistent that way for an hour—that's when you're at work. If you are at work, your contractions will last for about a minute each. But while the timing of it is important, so is the intensity. The most important part is the energy of contraction, not just the timing of it, said Siobhan Kubesh, a certified midwife with OB-GYN North in Austin. You need to pay attention to the length of it, but you also need to pay attention to whether the energy increases for each one. The General Advice been waiting until the contractions have been five minutes apart for an hour before calling and making your way to the hospital. But talk to your health care provider to figure out what works best for you. Each provider will have a slightly different approach, depending on the individual risk factors for pregnancy, Kubesh says. Some first-time moms may have a long labor, while for a second child a woman may not be aware of the intensity until much closer to transition. Your place may also come into the picture-if you live almost an hour away from the hospital, your doctor may recommend leaving sooner rather than later. Let your doctor know if your labor contractions seem wrong. If you can't time the gap between contractions because there is no gap, it's time to call the doctor. If it's a continuous pain, rather than a pattern of coming and going, that could pose a problem, said Dr. du Treil. If so, don't delay in calling the doctor. 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
