The Recovering Perfectionist: Mending Workshop with Erin Eggenburg

Every now and then, it's good to pause and wonder, how did we get here? For many of us, quilting and stitching have a way of finding us through a winding path – full of happy detours and creative discoveries. For Erin Eggenburg, that journey has been just that.

Before embroidery entered her life, Erin wore many hats – social worker, grant writer, real estate agent – but what she really wanted was to find a hobby or craft that was portable, affordable, and satisfying. Enter embroidery! What began as a "simple hobby" soon blossomed into a big adventure: She once embroidered 15,000 custom handkerchiefs that she sold on Etsy! That massive project became the seed for something even more meaningful – combining her passion for textiles with a mission to reduce waste. Today, Erin's creative reuse work through Sashiko mending blends sustainability, art, and a healthy dose of imperfection.

After Erin shared her story at our



guild meeting, 25 curious stitchers joined her for a hands-on workshop to explore surface mending – a little embroidery, a little repair and a lot of play. Some of us were already familiar with Sashiko, some came from wool or crewel embroidery, and some were simply eager to try something new.

In the morning, we dove into Sashiko, learning how it differs from traditional embroidery. Sashiko thread, we discovered, is a sturdy, matte, single strand (no separating plies!) – perfect for reinforcing fabric and adding beautiful texture.

Erin encouraged us to embrace her guiding philosophy: "Perfection stifles joy, creativity and progress." So, we let go. We experimented with uneven stitches, mixed thread colors, and laughed at our wobbly stars, which,





by the way, turned out charmingly unique. Just like quilting, mending has its own meditative rhythm – a chance to combine color, texture and whimsy in ways that reflect you.

The atmosphere was full of laughter, encouragement, and delight. Erin remarked on how our group naturally celebrated each other's work – not a single judgmental word, only admiration and joy.

In the afternoon, we switched gears to sampler-making, revisiting some embroidery classics – running stitch, backstitch, split stitch, satin stitch, chain stitch, French knots and seed stitch. Erin invited









us to play with length, spacing and overlapping, turning each sampler into a tiny playground of texture and creativity.

Along the way, Erin shared some wonderfully practical mending wisdom to take home:

- Whether or not to knot your thread ends depends on placement. Skip knots for knees and elbows.
- Be generous with your patch size; you can always trim later.
- Match the patch fabric to the original garment fabric for best results.
- Skip the Fray-Check! Frayed edges add dimension and personality.
- Crayola washable markers make great design tools on denim and

- linen (and Sashiko rulers help, too!).
- Don't fear freehand designs.
 They add charm and individuality.
- For tricky repairs, use 100% Tshirt jersey cotton for crotch reinforcement, or donor denim for full holes. Stitch the patch into the seams for extra durability.
- Threadbare thighs? Reinforce early using quilting cotton or denim similar to the original fabric.

By the end of the day, we may have all become "recovering perfectionists," embracing imperfection, finding joy in the process and discovering the beauty in every uneven, handmade line.




We've Gone to the Dogs!





Fabric 1	3 ½ x 36"	2 - 3 ½ x 6 ½" 2 - 3 ½ x9 ½ "	2 x 18"	2 - 2 x 3 ½ " 2 - 2 x 5"
Fabric 2	3 ½ x 7"	2 - 3½" squares	2 x 4"	2 - 2" squares
Fabric 3	6 ½" square	1 - 6 ½" square	3 ½" square	1 - 3 ½" square


Directions

All seams are 1/4" unless otherwise noted.

Using the two Fabric 1 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (2 x 5"), sew one Fabric 2 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (2") square to each rectangle, press.




Using Fabric 3 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (3 $\frac{1}{2}$ ") square, attach the two Fabric 1 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (2 x 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ ") to opposite sides, press.

Snowball Star

Fabric Requirements and Sub Cuts


	12" Block	Subcut	6" Block	Subcut
Fabric 1	12 x 8"	1 - 7 ½" square 2 - 4" squares	7 ½ x 5"	1 - 4 ½" square 2 - 2 ½" squares
Fabric 2	20 x 8"	1 - 7 ½" square 1 - 7 ¼" square 2 - 4" squares	12 x 5"	1 - 4 ½" square 1 - 4 ¼" square 2 - 2 ½" squares
Fabric 3	8 ¼ x 4"	2 - 4" squares	5 x 2 ½"	2 - 2 ½" squares

Directions

All seams are 1/4" unless otherwise noted.


Place the 7 ½" (4 ½") squares of Fabrics 1 and 2 right sides together. Draw a line diagonally on the top fabric. Sew ¼" along each side of this line. Cut along the drawn line creating 2 HST. Press to the dark fabric.

Rotate one square, and place them right sides together. Draw a line diagonally on the top fabric making sure the line crosses through both colors of the HST. Sew $\frac{1}{4}$ " along each side of this line. Cut along the drawn line creating 2 hourglass blocks. Trim to 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (3 $\frac{1}{2}$ "). You will only need one of these to complete the block, but since you have 2, you might as well make 2 complete blocks.



Block Party: DECEMBER 2025

Using the Fabric 2 7 $\frac{1}{4}$ " (4 $\frac{1}{4}$ ") square, and Fabric 3 4" (2 $\frac{1}{2}$ ") squares to create 4 flying geese using the No Waste Method for Making Flying geese on the next page.




Using the Fabric 1 and Fabric 3 4" ($2\frac{1}{2}$ ") to create 4 HST, similar to the first step.

Sew one HST on opposite ends of two of the flying geese according to square image.




Sew the two remaining flying geese on opposite sides of the hourglass block.

Finally sew the three rows together to create the Snowball Star.

NO WASTE METHOD FOR MAKING FLYING GEESE UNITS

(Makes 4 geese units)






NOTE: These instructions give the formula for making Flying Geese units and do **NOT** give a particular cutting size. Just remember that the width of the finished unit is always twice its height.


Size to cut squares:

Fabric A: Finished widthofdesiredgeese unit + 1 1/4" (1.25)


Fabric B: Finished heightofdesiredgeese unit + 7/8" (.875)









From Fabric A (the geese fabric), cut ONE (1) _____ square From Fabric B (the sky fabric), cut FOUR (4) ____ squares




With right sides of fabric together, lay two of the smaller squares on the larger square, as shown. Using a ruler, draw a light pencil line diagonally from top left corner to bottom right corner.






Stitch a scant ¼ inch on both sides of the drawn line. Cut apart on the center drawn line.

Note: If your machine does not have an accurate ½ inch foot, draw your stitching lines using a ruler and pencil.





Press seams toward Fabric B. Draw a diagonal line on wrong side of smaller square. With right sides together, lay one of the marked squares on the sewn unit and stitch ¼ inch on both sides of drawn line. Cut apart on drawn line. Repeat with the remaining unit and the remaining smaller square.

Press your 4 geese units open and use them in your favorite quilt blocks!
