






**Sandy, Scoot, and Shellby Dunehopper loved animals.

Mama for a pet.**





Papa Dunehopper's Pet Care Reminders

Dogs Depend on Us

- Dogs can't take care of themselves.
- They need people for food, water, shelter, love, and safety.

Food & Water Come Every Day

- Dogs must be fed on time and always have fresh water.
- Dogs shouldn't eat human treats unless an adult says it's safe.

Exercise Is Not Optional

- Dogs need walks, playtime, and fresh air every day.
- Walks help dogs stay healthy and calm.

Health Matters

- Dogs need vet visits, vaccines, and sometimes medicine.
- If a dog looks hurt or sick, tell an adult right away.

Cleanliness & Grooming

- Brushing, bathing, and cleaning up after dogs
- is part of caring.
- Picking up poop is a rule—every time.

Gentle Hands & Respect

- Never pull tails, ears, or fur.
- Never hit or tug a dog.
- Let dogs rest, eat, and have quiet time.

If a dog growls, or backs away, it means, "I need space."

A Dog Is a Long-Term Promise

- Caring for a dog means showing up every day.

Safety First


- Dogs should stay leashed or fenced so they don't get lost or hurt.

Papa placed a claw on Scoot's shoulder.


"That's why good beach neighbors always pick up after their dogs. Caring for your pet means caring for the beach too."
