MARY KAYE NEUMANN SHARES ADVICE ON THE NEXT CHAPTER

Excerpt from Commencement speech to the Girls Division Class of 2025:

"... You have been spending the last four years developing, embracing and believing in God. Family. St. Mary's. This base will guide you down the many paths you will be taking, the many chapters you will be writing in your life. However, it will now be God. Family. Community ... a great piece of advice which you can put in your tool belt, in a pocket labeled advice . . .

Today I have three pieces of advice to share with you that may be useful as you embark on your journey. First, my father always said to work hard; hard work pays off. At first, I thought I would work hard at my job and the payoff would be money. The more I work the more I make, but I learned that it is not always the payoff. We must work hard in every aspect of our lives. We must work at our faith, and the payoff is the feeling of spirituality, peace and resilience. We must work hard at our relationships with family and friends, and the payoff is safety, security, trust and love. We must work hard in our community by volunteering, giving back and helping for the payoff is a sense of belonging, commitment and satisfaction.

Second, my mother always said, "This too shall pass." Any time you feel anxious, confused, concerned or whatever is going on in that moment, remember this too shall pass. At first, I remember being confused but I realized "This too shall pass", is about making mistakes. You will make mistakes, and I encourage you to learn from them so that you will not make those mistakes again. It is okay to make mistakes, when we do, we feel anxious, confused, and concerned. We need to embrace the mistakes knowing "This too shall pass". It is about trusting your gut... There will be big decision making in your future, major problem solving, trying to find solutions and when you find yourself in this situation remember to listen to your gut, trust your gut and know: "This too shall pass".

Third, this advice is from me, self-care, take care of yourself. If you do not take care of yourself, you cannot take care of others. If this means to breathe, count to ten, exercise, walk, run, read, listen to music, binge watch Netflix, get your nails done, yoga, meditate, go to therapy, have an ice cream, bag of chips, window shop, go on a trip, go for a car ride, ride a bike, whatever your interest is, take the time out to pamper yourself. One needs to pamper themselves to alleviate stress, anxious feelings and re-energize to keep moving forward . . .

"When you look back, you'll see that every situation
God has brought you through has either changed you, helped
you grow, made you stronger, taught you a lesson or made you
a better person. Everything He does has a purpose if you trust
God's plan.."



CHAD BUSH'S WORDS OF WISDOM FOR THE CLASS OF 2025

". . . This is a full-circle moment for me. I graduated from Orchard Lake St. Mary's in 1994. And today, I get to stand here not only as an alumnus, but as a board member, and as someone who's had the privilege of watching many of you grow — both on the field and off — through my work broadcasting your sporting events on The Prep. There's something powerful about this place. And if you've spent enough time walking these halls, through campus, training on these fields or lake, or living in these dorms...you know exactly what I mean.

When I was your age, I didn't fully realize what I was walking away with on graduation day. Yes, I left with a diploma. But I also left with something more important: a fantastic foundation. The tradition of this epic institution carries on through our leaders, educators and coaches that continue to come back and show up. OLSM taught me what it means to show up — not just when it's easy, but especially when it's hard. You're stepping into a world

that is as full of opportunity as it is uncertainty. But here's the good news: you're ready.

You've already accomplished something exceptional, something you should be extremely proud of: The academic achievements of this class are record breaking: 5 students accepted to UDM dental. 3 boys were accepted at UM engineering and a couple were accepted into the Ross School of Business, which typically takes 700 students a year. 2 students were accepted to Northeastern University. 1 student accepted to NYU, 1 going to UNC Chapel Hill. Less than 800 out-of-state students were accepted to UNC Chapel Hill. Students were accepted at some of the most selective Catholic colleges including Villanova and Notre Dame. A couple of students are pursuing aviation, a few are pursuing the trades, and a few will turn professional immediately and enter the workforce. Senior students in the boys division placed in the Wharton school of business youth global leaders challenge. Senior students raised \$13,000 for mental health research. Some are finalists in both the Coca Cola and Elks National Scholarship competitions, which seek the brightest students in the nation. These are both national awards. It is fair to say that this is the most academically successful class in the Ann Bartus Era at OLSM. The athletic achievements are impressive too: 9 League Titles, 6 Catholic League Titles, 10 District Titles, 10 Regional Titles, 1 State Runner Up, 3 Scholastic Rowing Championships and 2 MHSAA State Championship Teams.

You've passed the tests. You've endured the workouts. You've lived and studied with people from different backgrounds, another thing I'm thankful St. Mary's really prepared me for. You've learned what it means to compete with honor, to study with discipline, and to represent something bigger than yourself. That doesn't just

prepare you for college, that prepares you for life.

And life, as I've come to learn, will test you in ways that don't always come with a scoreboard or a report card. It's going to ask you questions like: Can you keep your word when no one is watching? Can you bounce back

after a setback? Can you lead when others want to quit? And thanks to this place, to your teachers, your coaches, your brothers, I believe you can. I want to leave you with



this thought: Success doesn't always come to the most talented; it comes to the most prepared. It also comes to those that are courageous and take a calculated chance. You don't need to have all the answers yet. But if you can keep showing up, like you did at OLSM, and if you stay grounded in the lessons you've learned here, you'll find your way. Walk out into that sacred grotto proud. Walk out of here confident. And know that you will always have a home here at Orchard Lake. Congratulations, Class of 2025. The next chapter is yours to write. And I, for one, can't wait to see how it goes. I'll be following and rooting for you. Go Eaglets!"

BACK-TO-BACK CHAMPS

The OLSM Rowing Team hosted the 15th Annual Laddie Cup Regatta on Saturday, May 3rd. This year's regatta saw 16 teams from Michigan and Ohio competing. OLSM turned in a stellar performance and was able to capture the Men's Points trophy, Women's Points trophy and repeat as combined points champion ensuring the Laddie Cup will stay on Orchard Lake for another year! Back-to-back champions! Congratulations to our student athletes, coaches, and parents for a job well done.





The Michigan State Crew Rowing Championships took place May 17-18 at Kensington Park, and for the second year in a row, the combined excellence of the Orchard Lake St. Mary's Crew Team earned the State Championship. Over 1000 athletes from 24 highly competitive teams came together in fierce competition. The Boys division finished in a closely contested second place to the powerhouse of Northville. And the heroic efforts of the Girls division saw them earn the State Championship with a convincing margin over Skyline that helped carry our school to victory. Our efforts earned 5 Gold medal finishes, 6 Silver, and 2 Bronze, cementing OLSM as the most formidable crew team in Michigan.

The weekend of May 23-25, four of our crews and a total of 31 athletes traveled to New Jersey to test themselves against the most accomplished rowing teams in the United States by competing at the Scholastic Rowing Association of America's National Championships. These included the Freshmen Girls 8+, Mens JV 8+, Women's JV 8+, and Men's Senior 4X. All earned their spot by medaling at the Midwest Championships (May 16-18) where the Women's JV 8+ Crew won gold and took home the Joe Tewkesbury Trophy.



they defeated Cranbrook. They compete in the State Championships at Bedford Valley June 6-7).






ST. JOHN PAUL II LITURGICAL CENTER UPDATE

The month of June is traditionally dedicated to the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus. A series of solemnities follow the Easter Season, they are Pentecost Sunday, the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi), and ending with the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus. This is a movable feast depending on the date of Easter, and is celebrated on the second Friday following Trinity Sunday. Therefore, it generally falls in June (its earliest possible date is May 29; the latest possible date is July 2). This year, we celebrate it on June 27. St. John Paul II was a great devotee of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and during his visit in Vancouver (Sep 18, 1984) he made the following meditation of this mystery:

IN THE WORDS OF ST. JOHN PAUL II

"My soul, give thanks to the Lord, all my being, bless his holy name" (Ps 103:1).

With these words of today's liturgy, dear brothers and sisters, I wish to address myself, together with all of you, to the God of Love. And I wish to do so through the mystery of the Heart of Christ.



The words of the Psalm—"My soul give thanks to the Lord, all my being bless his holy name"—say that our human "heart" addresses God in all the unimaginable majesty of his divinity and his holiness and, at the same time, in his wonderful "openness" to mankind: in his "condescension".

In this way "heart" meets "Heart"; "heart" speaks to the "Heart".... This is our faith. This is the teaching of the Church about the Divinity of the Son. This Eternal Son, true God, the Word of the Father, became man. These are the words of the Gospel: "The Word was made flesh, he lived among us" (John 1:14).

In the Creed we profess: "For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man". Here we more directly touch upon the reality of the Heart of Jesus. For the heart is a human organ, belonging to the body, belonging to the whole structure, to the spiritual and physical makeup of man: "And the Word was made flesh".

In this make-up the heart has its place as an organ. At the same time it has a meaning as the symbolic centre of the inner self, and this inner self is, by nature, spiritual.

The Heart of Jesus was conceived beneath the heart of the Virgin Mother, and its earthly life ceased at the moment Jesus died on the Cross. This is testified to by the Roman soldier who pierced the side of Jesus with a lance.

During the whole of Jesus' earthly life, this Heart was the centre in which was manifested, in a human way, the love of God: the love of God the Son, and, through the Son, the love of God the Father. What constitutes the greatest fruit of this love in creation?

We read it in the Gospel: "He came to his own domain and his own people did not accept him. But to all who did accept him he gave power to become children of God..." (John 1:11-12). Here is the most magnificent, the most profound gift of the Heart of Jesus that we find in creation: man born of God, man adopted as a son in the Eternal Son, humanity given the power to become children of God.

POLISH INSTITUTE UPDATE

REMEMBERING A HISTORICAL VISIT TO HONOR A REMARKABLE PROFESSOR

Near the front door of the administration building is a small bronze plaque. It is easily overlooked, but it recalls a memorable event in the history of Orchard Lake Schools. Recently the staff of the Polish Institute of Culture & Research at Orchard Lake was able to identify previously unknown photos in our collections that document this event and its circumstances.

Bishop Woznicki was the first graduate of the Seminary to become a bishop and had just recently been made auxiliary bishop of Detroit. On May 2, 1938, Poland's Ambassador to the U.S.A., Count Jerzy Potocki, visited Orchard Lake. Although his visit help mark Poland's Constitution Day holiday (May 3), his main purpose was to award one of our own faculty, Romuald Piątkowski, one of Poland's highest honors, the Order of Polonia Restituta. Professor Piątkowski had taught Polish at the Polish Seminary and St. Mary's Preparatory and College since the early 1900's, beginning his career at the original site on St. Aubin Street in Detroit. He was also a founding faculty member of Alliance College in Pennsylvania and participated in the recruitment and training of American volunteers for the Polish Blue

Army. He was a renowned teacher, scholar, and translator who translated the very challenging work of the German philosopher Emmanuel Kant from German to Polish. He resided on our campus for many years.

A few months earlier in March 1938, Professor Piątkowski had received another major award when the Archbishop of Detroit Edward Mooney came to Orchard Lake to award him

a Papal Knighthood of the Papal Order of St. Gregory for his services rendered to the Catholic Church. It was likely that he was being given these honors because his health was failing. The last picture we have of the professor from March 1938 shows him being helped to walk after the ceremony. He passed away in 1939 and is buried with other Orchard Lake faculty and priests at Holy Sepulcher Cemetery in Southfield.

Count Potocki served as Poland's Ambassador to the U.S. from 1936 to 1940. He was a supporter of the Orchard Lake Schools, and he donated to us one of the most important pieces of art in our collection, a painting by the Polish Master Jacek Malczewski titled "The Last Insurgent." The painting came from his personal collection

and was brought from Poland just before the German invasion at the start of World War II in 1939. Count Potocki was never able to return home to Poland due to the communist regime installed by the Soviet Union after the war. He died in Switzerland in 1961.

POLISH INSTITUTE MAY REFLECTIONS & LOOKING AHEAD

Their performance of Chopin's nocturnes and Moszkowski's polonaises struck a deep emotional chord. Tomoko reflected on Chopin's exile and his wish for his heart to be returned to Poland—a gesture that resonates across generations. The concert was beautifully suited to the Galeria's atmosphere, and it remains one of the weekend's most memorable moments.

On display throughout the weekend was the 2nd Annual Polish Language Student Art Competition, featuring original works from students across Michigan. Centered on the theme "Famous Poles," the entries honored figures such as Saint John Paul II, Maria Skłodowska-Curie, Irena Sendler, Józef Piłsudski, and Iga Świątek. The talent, thoughtfulness, and care in these pieces speak volumes about the next generation. The exhibit remains open in the Galeria through the end of June. Sunday's Mass at the Shrine of Saint John Paul II was followed by our Akademia, presented by students from four Polish language schools: the Polish Language Center in Ann Arbor, the Polish School of Saint John Paul II in Hamtramck, the Polish School of Father Józef Dąbrowski in Orchard Lake, and the Adam Mickiewicz Polish School in Sterling Heights. The students offered heartfelt tributes through poetry, song, and performance, honoring Poland's constitutional legacy with sincerity and care. We're deeply grateful to the teachers, directors, and families who made the effort to be present and help keep this tradition alive.

This month also brought recognition of several leaders within our extended community who were named to the Top 25 Polish American Leaders of 2025 by the Piast Institute. Among them are Richard Walawender, Chairman of the Polish Institute of Culture & Research and Regent of Orchard Lake Schools, and Ann Bankowski, Trustee of the Polish Institute and Regent of the Orchard Lake Schools. We extend our warm congratulations to all recipients and thank them for all they do to support and promote the Polish community.

Looking ahead, we hope you'll join us on Friday, June 28, for a summer concert with pianist Jacek Kasjan, featuring his signature program "Three B-flat". His performances have moved audiences in Poland and across the U.S., and this evening promises to be no exception—a compelling blend of musical mastery and reflection at Orchard Lake. Though the school year is ending, our commitment to Polish language and heritage continues. Enrollment for the 2025–26 school year is now open, with several strong Polish language programs offered throughout Metro Detroit. tribute to the endurance of our Polish spirit—celebrating health, history, and unity with every step.




EVENING ELEGANCE: CLASSICAL CONCERT IN THE GALERIA



2025 WORLD PARA ICE HOCKEY CHAMPIONSHIP TEAM TRAINS AT OLS HOCKEY ARENA

CHINESE NATIONAL SLED HOCKEY TEAM TRAINED FROM MAY 8-18th AT St. Mary's Before the World Championship in May 24-28.

David Zhu (P'13), a liaison for the Chinese Ice Hockey Association, brought the Chinese National Sled Hockey Team, ranked 3rd in the world, to campus to train at the SMAC for the 2025 World Para Ice Hockey Championships in Buffalo, New York May 24-31. When the team needed a facility to drill prior to Worlds, Zhu reached out to Brian Klanow, OLSM Hockey Head Coach, who went into action to provide the ice time and training facilities for the international athletes.

"David played OLSM hockey, works directly with the Chinese ice hockey association and this is his assignment . . . it's all part of their national hockey program," said Klanow. "He has always stayed close to his alma mater. In addition to his ice hockey role, he does a lot of tours and helps bring families in from China to view the school as a possibility for students to enroll here."

"This is really a tremendous opportunity for this team to train here on this beautiful campus," said Zhu. "Many of the athletes on this team are here in the U.S. for the first time. They feel so welcome, and the hospitality is incredible. They're preparing for the Buffalo competition, an eight-nation tournament with some of the best hockey players in the world. Coach Klanow did so much for us to get our team training up and running prior to Worlds."



PROFESSIONAL MURALIST & OLSM ALUMNI SPEAKS TO ST. MARY'S ART STUDENTS

ED IRMEN (P'06) returned to campus on Friday, May 2, to speak with all the art classes about his journey to becoming a professional muralist. 
Sue Amatangelo (C'84)




FR. JOHN RAKOCZY (P'44, C'47)




Maysa Anwar


legacy and safety infrastructure while coaching multiple championship teams.
