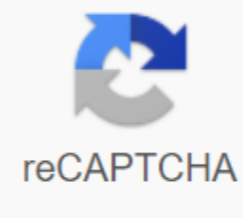

The film tells the story of the crew of the Soviet tank T-55, who died during the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan. The film enjoys cult status, despite the low box office statistics. Plot In 1981 in Afghanistan, a Soviet tank unit brutally attacked a Pashtun village, where a group of mujahideen fighters is located. After the assault, one of the tanks under the command of the ruthless commander Dascal (George Dzundaza) makes a wrong turn through the mountain pass and enters the blind valley. Taj (Stephen Bauer) returns to discover a destroyed village, his father is killed, and his brother is killed after being crushed under a Dashcal tank. As the new Khan after the death of his brother, Taj was spurred to seek revenge by his cousin Mustafa, an opportunistic scavenger. Together, they lead a group of mujahideen fighters into the valley to chase the Dashcal tank (which they call the Beast), counting on the RPG-7 anti-field weapons they captured to destroy it. Forgotten, isolated, and with their radio damaged in Attack, the tank crew went to find Kandahar Road and return to the Soviet line. During the sleepover, Afghan communist crew member Samad (Eric Avari) brings up a reluctant tanker Konstantin Koverchenko (Jason Patrice) about the Pashtun People's Code of Honor pushtunwali; especially the naga, who demands that the enemy be given sanctuary if he asks. Along the way, the crew suffers several setbacks and ambushes from the Taj group. Suspecting Samad of betrayal, Daskal kills him in front of his men; Koverchenko threatens to inform Daskal to Daskal about illegal murder. At a short stop, Koverchenko reports that their tank is breaking down; Dascal accuses him of rebellion and orders gunner Kaminsky (Don Harvey) and the driver Golikov (Stephen Baldwin) to tie him to the rock and leave with a grenade behind his head as a booby trap for the mujahideen. Wild dogs eventually attack Coverchenko, but he is rescued when the grenade rolls off a cliff and explodes, scaring them off. Taj's group reunites with several vengeful women from the village and searches for Coverchenko, who begs for a nabata. The mujahideen give him food and shelter. Koverchenko befriende Taj after repairing a broken RPG-7, and agrees to help him destroy the tank. The rest of the tank crews realize that they are trapped in the valley until a Soviet helicopter (search for water) appears and offers to save them. Taking care of his tank more than his men, Daskal refuses the offer, has the car's gasoline topped up, and the crew heads back to the narrow mountain pass from which they came, which the helicopter pilot says is the only way out. They drive all night, and eventually return to a hole in the water they had previously poisoned with cyanide to try to kill the Taj group; there they find the helicopter crew dead after drinking from the same pool. Mujahideen and Coverchenko catch up with the tank, and chase it through the mountain pass. Koverchenko finally fires an RPG after a tense chase, only to damage the tank's main gun. Just as it seems the tank will escape, the village women (armed with explosives) blow up the cliff side by dropping boulders on the tank and disabling it. Koverchenko waited to leak the tank's gasoline, forcing the crew to bail out; he begs the nanawatai on their behalf, and Taj reluctantly agrees. Kverchenko confronts Daskal because of his cruelty and wants him to live to see the Soviets lose the war. Kaminsky and Golikov run on foot, but Daskal is persecuted by village women and killed; they return his bloodied Tudge uniform as trophies. Terrified, Coverchenko looked like an incoming Soviet helicopter to escape. Taj stops Mustafa from shooting Coverchenko, who salutes Taja as he is lifted by a harness, waving a musket of tyazil Taj, just gifted to him. Several actual T-55 tanks were used in the film; however, the helicopter used in the film was not a real Mi-8, but an Aerospatiale SA.321 Super Frelon. The tank in question in the film is actually an Israeli modification of the Soviet T-55, captured by the Israelis from the Arab armies, redesigned under the T-67 and equipped with a 105 mm main cannon instead of the original 100 mm cannon, which led some to error in relation to the T-62. Many of these conversions were used by the Israelis during the lom Kippur war in 1973. The film's military adviser, Dale Dai, wrote that he was negotiating to buy tanks for a drink with IDF officers at a Tel Aviv hotel. The language spoken by Afghan characters is Pashto. The soundtrack Original Music Soundtrack was released by CBS/Columbia Records shortly after the film's debut, written and performed entirely by Mark Isham. The back of the album involves two tracks (Badal and Nanawatai), but there are, in fact, ten. Available in 12-inch LP vinyl, CR2 cassette and DDD CDS. Used copies of CDs have quite high prices, as a limited number was released, despite the celebrity status of the composer Mark Ishem. In addition to the soundtrack, the song of the Russian rock band Kino was heard on the radio during the scene. However, it was released only in 1983, two years after the events depicted in the film.
