If the car is registered in the driving state, you can drive. Otherwise, you have to pay for it to be erred. Give the title to someone at the school who accepts responsibility for the car (like a shop teacher). Ask him to fill in the title and transfer ownership from you to the school. Give the key. If you donate to 501(c)3 organizations, wait to receive your tax receipt. Someone at the school will prepare a receipt showing the value of your donation. One of the biggest expenses for many middle-class families is their children's school fees. Many parents pay thousands of dollars each year to send their children to private schools. A 2014 comparison by real estate site Trulia found that in postcodes with top public schools, only 4% of children go to private schools. But that doesn't mean parents living in good school districts are spending less overall. According to Trulia's research, homes in these high-performance school districts typically cost much more than other homes in the same area - about 32% or more. So for many families, the additional cost of housing adds up to more than what they would have paid for a private school. This is because the parent who wantsThe best possible education for children has a hard choice to make: pay directly for private schools or indirectly for homes near good public schools. To know which is best, you need to know how these two costs compare and what options you have to keep costs down. Private School Costs About 4.5 million American children enrolled in private schools in 2011-2012, according to data from the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES). More than 80% of these students were in schools with some kind of religious affiliation. About 43 percent attended Catholic schools, and another 37 percent went to schools generally identified as Christian, Jewish, or certain Christian denominations. About 68% of private schools are religiously oriented and 32% are secular. According to NCES, the average cost of private school tuition in the 2011-2012 school year was \$10,740 per child. This is a huge burden for middle-class families. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the median U.S. household income in 2014 was \$53,657. This means that families who make a median income must send about 20% of their income to a private school and spend 40% on two children. However, tuition varies greatly depending on the type of school. The average cost of tuition was \$6,890 a year for Catholic schools, \$8,690 for other religious schools and \$21,510 for non-denominational schools. Therefore, families with average incomes would pay less than 13% of their income to send their children to Catholic schools, while non-religious schools would pay more than 40%. Public school costs The cost of private schools is easy to identify - a fixed number of dollars per year. Calculating the cost of public schools is much more complicated. You need to know which areas parents choose for school, how much it costs to live in those neighborhoods, and how the cost compares to the cost of living in other neighborhoods. First, the website Niche evaluates and compares U.S. school districts based on factors such as student test scores, graduation rates, health and safety ratings, and reviews from parents and students. Each year, Niche lists 10 school districts that it rates as the best school districts in America. In 2016, the number one school district on Niche's list is the Treadlyfln Easttown School District. Centered in the Philadelphia suburb of Tredyphlin County, Pennsylvania, the district has an A-plus rating for academic performance, teachers, and extracurrrrrant activities. According to Trulia, the median sales price for homes in the area is \$532,500. This adds up to a monthly mortgage payment of about \$2,610 based on a 30-year loan, a 20% down payment and a 4% interest rate. For those who can only make a down payment of 10%, their monthly payment jumps to \$3,072. In nearby Paoli, by contrast, Tornia says the median house price is just \$287,000, or \$1,407 per month. That's a difference of \$14,436 a year, about 34 percent more than the average cost of private school tuition for a child. So families with one child would spend less by living in Paoli and sending their children to private schools. But families with two or more children will spend less by living in the Lady Flynn County District, where the extra money paid for housing covers school fees for all children. A 2014 article on Money's school costs comes to a similar conclusion. This compares the cost of private and public schools for two fictional families living in eastern Massachusetts: One family spends \$2,120 a month on a median home in suburbale village, which has some of the best public schools in the country. Others spend \$998 a month on a neighborhood home with an average school and an average of \$782 a month on private school tuition. Combined, these two costs put private school families \$340 ahead per month. But if both families have two children, the math changes completely. In that case, public school families save a total of \$70,000 during both children's grades. Managing school costs generally seems to be a good deal for families with multiple children in public schools (even in expensive area schools), and private schools tend to be worth just kids. However, this rule does not apply to everyone. Parents who choose the right private school can lower tuition to an affordable level, even if they have several children at school at a time. Conversely, making smart choices about housing can make life in a great school district an affordable choice, even for one child. Private school options One way to make private schools more affordable is to choose schools with lower tuition fees. As mentioned earlier, religious schools (especially Catholic schools) tend to be much more affordable than non-denominational private schools. Based on NCES figures, families could send their two children to Catholic schools at an average cost of \$13,780 a year. That's a little less than the \$14,436 a year it costs to live in The Lady Flynn County Ward instead of Paoli. Another private school option is the Montessoli School. These schools take an educational approach that focuses on children learning at their own pace using their senses. Most Montessoli programs are for young children, but some have spread in early adolescence. According to a 2009 study by the Montessoli Teachers Association of North America, the cost of a year at monteseli schools varies widely, but the median number of primary school children is aroundAs such, montessoli schools are more expensive than typical Catholic schools, but on a par with other religious schools. Parents can also save money by starting their children in public elementary schools and transferring them to private high schools. According to Money's article, if their fictional private school family did this with their two children, they would save a total of \$71,000 compared to families in expensive school districts. Private school scholarships Families who have difficulty paying private school tuition may be within financial reach through scholarships and other financial assistance. Some schools have their own financial aid programs, while others participate in national, regional, or state scholarship programs. Funding sources include children's scholarship funds. The Children's Scholarship Fund (CSF), which originally began as the Washington Scholarship Fund, currently offers some tuition scholarships to low-income families across the country. The scholarship covers 75% of tuition, with an average amount of \$1,700 per child. It can be used for all kinds of schools, whether religious, secular, or homeschooling. To qualify for the scholarship, a child must be in elementary school and meet the income guidelines of the National School Lunch Program. In 2015-2016, we offered scholarships to more than 24,000 students. To apply for a scholarship, parents must contact one of CSF's partner programs in 16 states. The time it takes to process varies depending on the specific program. Young Scholars Program The Young Scholars Program, run by the Jack Kent Cook Foundation, offers first-class scholarships to middle and high school students. About 60 students receive scholarships each year and are available for boarding, day and parocia (religious) schools. In addition to financial support, young students gain academic advice, access to special enrichment programs, and other resources. Families with incomes of up to \$95,000 can apply, while most young scholars come from families with incomes under \$60,000. The application period is from January to April and we know if you are eligible for assistance by September. Better chance. The program is designed for students of grade 4-9 color who get good overall grades and are active in extracurrrrrrrrrrrable activities. The program doesn't actually offer scholarships, but it does mention more than 300 middle and high school students (religious and secular) across the country and help them apply for financial aid from those schools. A better chance says that most students who apply through that program receive financial aid, but that doesn't give a specific percentage. The application process begins February of the school year, which begins in 18 months. There are many other scholarships and school voucher programs that operate in certain states and regions of the country. Parents can learn about their local programs through the private school's website. Give homes near the best public schools In general, areas with great public schools are more expensive than other areas in the same general area. However, there are some notable exceptions to this rule. Neighborhood scouts compiled a list of the regions in the country's 20 largest metropolitan areas that combine affordable home prices with good schools. For each region, the median house price and school district rating are displayed on a scale of 100 points, based on factors such as class size and state test scores. However, to use this feature, you must subscribe to a site for \$40 per month, \$90 per quarter, or \$192 per year. Another way to buy a home in a top-notch school district is to deliberately choose to live in a small house. In The Ladyfln County, PA, for example, Zillow lists a three-bedroom home for just \$390,000. Such a mortgage payment would be about \$698 per month, or about \$1,912 per month, a saving of \$8,376 per year, compared to the median house price.
