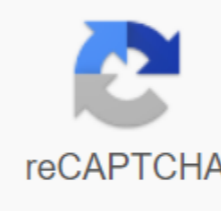




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Brussels walking tour map pdf

When we planned our visit to Belgium, we were told again and again that it would take us only 3-4 days to cover the whole country. After spending two days in the Belgian capital, couldn't help but agree more though! With beautiful architecture and city parks, an incredible selection of museums and art galleries and quintessential Belgian cuisine, this guide will help you plan your own Brussels self-guided walking tour (with the odd subway ride tossed to save those feet!), allowing you to soak up everything this fabulous city offers. First, though, let's get to you in the city centre itself and find you a place to stay... Transport in Brussels Getting from Brussels Airport to the city You have several options here, including Uber, taxis and buses, but one option that offers convenience, value for money (relatively speaking, of course) and timely train arrival. Follow the signs from the airport (going down to the lowest floor), pay 9 euros to the cashier and jump on until you get to Brookselles Central. As around Brussels we decided to add transport to our Brussels maps, allowing us to jump on any tram, bus or metro in their system - too easy! We loved being able to jump on any form of transport we encountered without worrying about whether it was value for money. If you prefer, you can pay for your transportation as you go. As the name of this post suggested, though, Brussels is an easy city to walk around and most of its time is likely to be spent wandering the streets. Despite the fact that we used public transport, we still managed to tick 20,162 steps (more than 14.88 km) in just a day! Where to stay in Brussels Brussels lacks quality accommodation, offering something to suit all travelers. Well connected by public transport, you can stay a little further from the central city if you want. Below are our recommendations in Brussels: Budget: Train Hostel - Sleep in the train cabin! Mid: Best Western Royal Centre Hotel - Incredibly comfortable beds, friendly staff and central location. This is where we stayed. Luxury: Rocco Forte Hotel Amigo is an incredible location right on the square! Recommended places on your Brussels self-guided tour to maximize our time in Brussels, we took a map of Brussels each. These magical little tickets provide visitors with access to 39 museums and galleries, discounts to be used throughout the city, and in our case, free public transport too. The following guide will guide you through each of the stops we have made, in the order we recommend. With the exception of one gallery, all the paid places we visited were included in our pass. Pis Icon on Brussels, this tiny bronze statue depicts a boy standing naked as he urinates below. The original was housed in the city in 1618 or or but the current statue (replication) has been in town since 1965. While in town, you can also track down zinneke pies (urinating dog) and Jeanneke-Pis (little girl does the same) - two more modern sculptural creations. Just don't ask us why this topic seems to be going through Brussels! Downtown Is the perfect place to wander aimlessly, picking up pommes fries, candy and Belgian beer! Grand Place Home to the Town Hall, the Museum of Belgian Brewers (where you get free local beer), horses and carts available for rent, and an information center that will help send you on your way, this square is the beautiful heart of the city. If you visit during the Christmas period, this is also where you will find towering Christmas trees and a stunning light show. Galleries St. Hubert's Beautiful Shopping Square, The Galleries of St. Hubert don't necessarily offer anything else in terms of shopping, but it's cozy and warm in winter and fun for the eyes. MOOF - The Museum of Original Living Dreams of Every Little European (and undoubtedly many adults), MOOF displays a range of original figurines, including The Adventures of Tintin, Smurfs and Asterix and Obelix. Catch the metro from Central Station to Porte de Hal and walk/tram forward between the next places... The Sewer Museum (Oguths Museum) is a working sewer, it is a strange but intriguing view of the invisible side of all cities. With the information clearly displayed, this museum becomes most interesting when you head underground. MIMA - Museum of Iconoclasm Museum with a strong emphasis on ethical and cultural issues, you will find a range of contemporary art located there. Largely based on the posters, you will come from MIMA with a new desire to make the world a better, more equal place. Catch the tram up to the blue metro line and then from the Heizel Atomium Most recognizable structure in Brussels, atomium was built in 1958 to mark the World's Fair, which took place in Brussels. Thanks only intended for a temporary exhibition, it soon became a must-see and remained in the city ever since. Towering 102 metres high, it is now a museum and home to a number of exhibits. Entry fee - 15 euros (less than 25% using the Brussels card). We decided not to prepare for The Atomim, instead enjoying it from the ground. ADAM - The Art and Design Of the Atomium Museum (Brussels Design Museum) Just down the road from The Atomium, ADAM has a number of interactive, attractive exhibits. Although I didn't go to myself, my friend Bex did and absolutely raved about it. Entry fee of 10 pounds (the only museum/gallery we visited that was not included in the Brussels Map). Subway back to the city centre Plaisirs d'Hiver - Winter Entertainment If you happen to visit Brussels during Christmas (and we we You try your best, especially if you are travelling during the winter season!), you will be treated to fantastic winter activities in the Dansaert area. With an ice rink, Christmas markets, light shows and a nice smattering of twinkling lights, this will help you in Noel's celebrations. While we are by no means experts in this field, we have put together our own self-guided walking tour of Brussels, thanks to the advice of fellow bloggers and the recommendations of our AirBnB hosts. As you will see, it was a rainy morning but we had a great time!2) The Royal Palace At the south end of the park, you will find the Royal Palace, which is only open to the public at the end of the summer. Walking through large halls, ballrooms and exhibits takes at least half an hour. Admission is free.3 and 4) Place Royale, View, and Meeting Center Clock This historic square is just around the corner from the palace. Keep going northwest from here and you get a charming view and then walk through the Meeting Center and Mont des Arts with its giant clock (or carillon) and bells. The clock is surrounded by twelve historical figures from Belgian history and located above it is a bourgeois figure, Jacquemart, who rings a big bell.5) St. Michael's Cathedral and St. Gudula This a giant Catholic church from the 11th century named after the patron saint of Brussels. The entrance is free and when we were there the gentleman played an impressively large organ. (Technically, if you want to do in a good cycle, you can visit the cathedral at the end and skip ahead to #6.) 6) Grand Place The Grand Place, or Grote Markt, is the central square of Brussels and perhaps the most impressive part of the city. This place of both historical and current, cultural events.7) Mannequin Pis This small, bronze statue/fountain of the little pooch has become a national attraction. Apparently, there is a non-profit organization that manages the weekly changes to the Manneken costume. When we were there, he was wearing Mexican clothes and a sombrero. (Jedd was completely embarrassed by the tiny boy attracts all this attention.) P.S. We used Yelp to find a good place and it led us one block from the statue, to Lombard, a waffle factory. Good stuff!8) Place de la Bourse The large, column building here is the location of the Brussels Stock Exchange. It's also the intersection of major shopping streets and a hot spot for events. It's also next door to the popular fries spot we've tried under the name Friland.9) Restaurants on De Boucher Street there are countless eateries in Brussels, but you'll find a high concentration on the Rue de Boucher. Often more tourist-oriented, you can choose to just pass to enjoy the atmosphere. It has a very similar feel to the Latin quarter in Paris.10) Les Galeries Royales de St. Hubert (The Galeries Royales (also called The Gallery de la Rhine, it seems) - a series of luxury boutiques located along the stunning covered track. Whether you're shopping or just enjoying the creative showcases, this place is a must see. Other Brussels Tours Bonus Route: Brussels Parks and Politics Walk Tour We took another day after our big sightseeing day to explore more sights that were east of the city centre. Whether you're going to see a see or you're a runner needing to exercise, this is another route we recommend.) The Area of Marie-Louise and Ambiorix In quarter de squares, these two adjacent parks offer a charming setting for relaxing or playing. At the bottom, The Square of Marie Louise, there is a beautiful pond. You'll also find a playground, dog park and gardens nearby.2) Parc de la Cinquentaenaire This massive park has a large Arcade du Cinquentaenaire next to gardens, sports fields, and a mosque. It is also home to the Royal Museum of Art and History and the Royal Military History Museum, as well as Autoworld. This park rivals those who are in any other major European city.3) Parc du Leopold and Parliament Besides beautiful park with a lovely pond and school downstairs, you will find some very important buildings. It is home to the House of the European Council, the Commission, Parliament and other key institutions. Parliamentarium there serves as visitors Berlaymont Building. Just from Schumann round about the cost of the four-winged Berlaymont building, which houses the headquarters European Commission, the executive branch of the European Union.
