We focus a lot on letters and the sounds they make. The absolute for teachers at this level should be on making the money and getting in as much repetition as you do. We're just focused on recognizing general themes at this point. Students should focus on building words well in their minds as they read. This is where we start to ask students real questions from page-long passages. An avid reader is just one of the components of helping your understanding. Constructing a mental image in your mind as you read is a useful activity. At this point students have a deeper vocabulary and we can ask them to start with contextual meaning to a small extent. They can use these words in their own bodies of work, while writing, and recognize their use in the works of others. This is usually when the main national reviews start to appear. We expect readers to be able to make sense of text in a wide range of settings. We strongly recommend daily work with extensive passages for students. The work we've seen come from most states and counties is focused on nonfiction for this level. This has been documented by some curriculum committees from the literature I've seen, so I wouldn't expect this trend any longer. Students begin to read long works and begin to work on their endurance reading. We strongly encourage teachers at this level to incorporate some form of daily independent reading activity into their routines. This will pay you tenfold, if you maintain a productive environment for students. We find at this level that there is a clear gap between the students who are struggling to keep their heads above water and those who are sailing straight. It usually comes down to vocabulary words. Those who have a low vocabulary index often have a weaker ability to understand. This series is really broad and is intended for additional practice for students in the grade range. Things are starting to become much more content based as students approach high school. This is when most parents provide their children with cell phones to stay in touch and keep an eye on their more independent children. We recommend that you minimize these distractions when students are reading. At this level, we have to really encourage students to take notes as they read. This will help them to remember what they are taking in and using contours can help a great deal as well. Creating a reader nook in your class can also improve their affinity with putting the time in on the books. We strongly encourage students to discuss what they are reading to find hidden meanings they may have missed. At this level, we encourage teachers to share the books they read independently with students. If you are trying to choose works that are targeted for your lower level students, you might just involve them more. This is where students start reading classical literature and see new forms of language they haven't seen so far. We recommend setting monthly goals for your students. Students at this level are starting to prepare for college admissions to some extent and broadening their horizons should be your focus. This is where students are urged to start sharing their opinions about work. This helps them to critically analyze text at an elevated level. This is where we want our students to be more reflective of their own skills. At this age, they are well aware of what they are doing well and what they are struggling with. Helping them concentrate their efforts on the latter can bring lifelong benefits. Students are starting to prepare for college course work and take on much more difficult levels of thinking. Show students how to keep a vocabulary log. This is where they come across every word, they're unsure of in a diary. Reviewing these words constantly can have huge dividends as they enter their college years. We created this as a diverse reading section for students of all levels. It's great to help them transition to writing about what they read. You have to try them to determine the plot of the story only from the title. When they complete the work, they must compare their original thoughts with what they learned after completing the work. Ask them to write their own questions that were not part of the worksheet. process. Check pronunciation If you use these worksheets in a one-on-one lesson, use them as an opportunity to test your student's pronunciation. The first time they read the passage, let them read it aloud. Make a note of all the words where the pronunciation needs to be improved, and then correct them. Once the first pass is done, they can read it in their head as it helps their understanding. Choose the right level Don't forget to choose a suitable worksheet for your student's level. It should be obvious, but it can be easy to forget this sometimes. Don't be afraid to step back a level if your student is having a really tough time. At the same time, if they go through this like a knife through butter then it's time to turn the difficulty! Help them out trying to get your students to work things out of context as much as possible. This will help build their language skills. However, if they really don't get a certain section, don't be afraid to step in and help them.
