It remained unpublished until its publication on 7 October 2009. At the heart of this effort was his legendary Red Book (Rote Buch, in German; the Red Book, a voluminous, illustrated and skin-related manuscript that he wrote between 1914 and 1930, containing the core of his later works., and was unavailable for study and went unnoticed by the public. The letter can be better described as the psychology of work in a literary and prophetic form. This is perhaps the most influential unpublished work in the history of psychology. Its publication was an important milestone, which became a new era in understanding the life and work of Jun. Years.. when I was chasing internal images, it was the most important moment of my life. Everything else comes from him. It started at the time, and later details hardly matter at all. My whole life consisted of developing what gradually broke out of the unconscious and flooded like a mysterious current and threatened with overflow. It is a substance and material for more than one life. All that was later was just scientific development and integration into life. But the cloud start that was all there was then. The volume of the folio (15.35 by 11.57 inches; 38.99 by 29.39 cm) consists of 205 pages of imperious handwriting of Chung and, from his skilful brush, impressive paintings. For about five years, beginning in 1907, Jun Context was associated with Sigmund Freud. The original Liber novus Content The Red Book was a product of a technique developed by Jung, which was called active imagination. As Jun describes him, he was visited by two figures: an old man and a young woman whom he identified as Elijah and Salome. They were accompanied by a large black snake. Over time, the figure of the soul. The numbers, according to Jun, led me to believe that there are other things in my heart that I don't do, but happen for myself and have my own life. Philemon's drawing represented excellent knowledge and communicated through mythical images. The images did not seem to come from Jun's own experience, interpreting them as products of the collective unconscious. In addition to the words of Philemon and other figures, the Red Book contains detailed illuminations on two 300 pages. Some of them are reproduced in Aniela Jaffe's book K.G. Jung: The Word and Image. [11] the fantasies that were presented at the time were first written in Schwarzenegger B'black (Black Books) and then deciphered them to rot Buch (Red Book), extended illustrations, one of them that of the philemon himself. Aneila Jaffe explains that Schwarzenly Bohern consists of six volumes bound by red skin, contains the same fantasies, but in retouched form and language and in calligraphic Gothic writing, in the manner of medieval manuscripts. Jun will include in his memoirs (Memories, Dreams, Thoughts) two independent works by Schwarzenegger Bohern and Rote Buch: On the sermon hell Mortuos (1916). Ulrich Hulrich Hriney, Jung's grandson who manages his archives, decided to publish it after three years of Shamdasani's conviction. W. W. Norton produced a facsimile version of the Red Book, in the original German version, with English translation and extensive annotation. Since 2010, the respective versions have been published in Japanese, Portuguese, Spanish, Italian and Czech, as well as in French and Romanian. On the initiative of Soledad Costantini, The El Hilo de Ariadna brand for Malba - Fundaci'n Costantini published in November 2010 the Red Book of K. G. Jung in Spanish, in collaboration with Norton, under the care, translation and commentary of Dr. Bernardo Nante and the human Vocation team of scientists in Buenos Aires. The publication has the same quality as the original; it includes a facsimile of a beautiful German manuscript with all its illustrations, research and notes by its editor, Sonu Shamdasani, to which Bernardo Nante's comments are added. Its world presentation took place on November 10 and 11 in Madrid and Barcelona, respectively, and on December 15 in Malba.
