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Bitter root judgement

Bitter-root judgments are the judgments we make about the pain we have experienced, that we have not given up on the Cross. Jews 12:15: See it that no one comes less than the grace of God; that no root of bitterness causes trouble, and many are desecrated... The root of bitterness comes from unforgiveness and can lead to resentment, which corrupts our relationship and our ability to love, as Joshua loves. Bitter roots grow when we cannot provide God's grace to forgive. Bitterness and unforgiveness are the driving force behind the emerging problems, patterns and destruction in our lives. We have to forgive. As soon as we experience pain, we must immediately turn to the Lord with this pain so that we do not get hurt. Two of the most important people we have to forgive are our mother and father (Exodus 20:12). Bitter-root judgments may be judgments that we have made towards our parents because of the pain we have suffered during our upbringing. Certain patterns are formed from the womb, which opened the door for us to form unhealthy judgments and strong opinions about ourselves and others. Whenever we make a decision as a result of the pain that we have suffered that we do not bring to Joshua we have begun the movement of forces that make us reap in the same decision that we project on others. (Galatians 6:7-9) Through heartache, I learned that my strong opinions and my two cents are best left on the threshing floor. Whenever I am presented with a situation in which I could make a decision on someone, I choose to hold my opinion and pray for the person instead. In life, we can either take on the role of a law enforcement officer or intercession, I choose the latter. Not all of us had the best parenting experience. Some of us have experienced abuse. Some of us have experienced abandonment and neglect. But to honor our parents is to forgive them and accept their humanity. We all have our own stories ... Hurt is real. The pain is real. Yeshua does not reject the wrong thing that has been done to us. However, we miss God when we demand revenge... Well, you say someone has to pay... Yeshua has already paid. Yeshua covers the crime, the abuser and the wronged by His precious BLOOD – and if we remain in His presence, He will lead us to a place of lasting peace. Romans 2:1-3: So you have no excuse, O man-each of you who judges. For no matter what you judge the other, you condemn yourself. For you who judge the practice is the same. We know that God's judgment of those who practice such things is based on truth. But are you, oh man, judging those who practice such things, but do the same as you think you will escape the judgment of God? Revealing bitter roots: Bitter roots can affect your relationship and ruin your future. Often our wounds go deep. Often to the lord heal, and eradicate bitter roots. Pray and ask God to reveal the judgments you have made against your parents and others. This may take some time. God will show what you need to know when you need to know this. Look for models of fear, doubt, rejection, heartache, jealousy, or anger. These patterns may be from the judgments you have made against others. Notice situations where you repeat the same behavior over and over again. Some examples of bitter roots that may indicate judgments towards your parents include: perfectionism, addiction, critical spirit, emotionally inaccessible, hostility, manipulation, working constantly, failure, uncontrollable anger or rage, bitterness, rejection, and performance orientation. I've been a believer for 30 years. I had a very cruel childhood. Over the years, God has taken me through layers of forgiveness. God has walked the winding path of integrity with me. Every time I remember a painful memory, I let go of the pain to God. It's been two years since my mother died. Although my mother is not here to be physically reconciled, I say forgiveness in my prayers. I forgive you. I love you. I am from the liberation of you in love and redemption. I have reconciled all the pain, pain, disappointment, fear, rejection, the Cross. Bitter roots bear bitter fruit. When we judge others. We condemn ourselves. We have to forgive! Luke 6:37: Don't judge and you won't judge. Don't judge, and you won't be judged. I'm sorry, and you'll be pardoned. How to abolish bitter-root judgments? There is an old saying: what happens around is going around, but God calls it the law of sowing and reaping (Galatians 6:7-9). We need REPENT, FORGIVE, and RELEASE! We will not let the sun sink into our wrath. When we harbor resentment, we open the door to the enemy to reap the bitter reward. Yeshua came to free us from bitterness and re-establish our default. Below are some very useful steps to help us cope with bitter roots. Admit your bittersweet judgment. Name who you tried and for what you tried. Pray for forgiveness, repent and give up your sin. If others have judged you severely, forgive them and let go of your pain to God.Ask God to meet needs that have not been met in you as a child. Some of the basic needs for adults and children are unconditional love, acceptance, value and value, safety, recognition, parenting, emotional nourishment, and comfort. Ask God to show you how this bitter root has affected your relationships with others. Pray for God to heal this relationship. Thank God for your reciprocal prayers. Prayer: Father, I repent for not saying life over myself and my loved ones. Lord, please forgive me for not understanding the high calling and privilege of intercession and words of righteousness are no doubt and no fear. Father, please remove all the bitter-root judgments that have entered my life as sternly judge others. Father, I ask you to eradicate any bitter roots in my life that have entered through the wounds of rejection. Please heal me from all rejection, pain, trauma, shock, fear, horror and shame. Father, you have not given me the spirits of rejection, bitterness, or shame; but love, strength and sanity of mind. Father, please let me feel the depths of your love. Please come and establish your domination of the world in my life and show yourself so that I know you are with me. Father, from now on, I will walk in the light of your love. You filled all the empty space in me. Your love permeates every sphere of my life. Father, I believe in your power to manjanimus to save me, to heal me, to bless me, to provide for me, to protect me, to support me, to establish me, to promote me, to help me, to guide me, to deliver me, and to give me an amazing inheritance. In a figurative sense, emotions such as extreme enmity, resentment, hatred produce bitterness in the heart of man, which manifests itself through words uttered by bitterness of anger, sharpness, severity of temperament. The Bible warns us not to let bitterness take root in our hearts: look at it so that no one can reach the grace of God; that no root of bitterness causes trouble, and so many of them are desecrated (Cheb. 12:15). Bitterness is a spiritual strongman who connects with forgiveness, resentment, anger, hatred, violence and murder. Do you have people in your life that you haven't forgiven? Who are you offended and angry at? By refusing to go to the Lord and receive His grace when we are hurt, we hold on to our grievances, allowing them to fill our hearts with bitterness. We care for our grievances, anger, desire for revenge, they turn into hatred, violence and murder. The law of judging makes judgment leaves bitterness in the heart of the person who made them. There is a spiritual principle that says not to make judgments against others, otherwise what we get back in life is due to what we sowed. The judgments I make against others will come back to me. The law of the court says that what we give out, we get. There's no judge not to be tried. For with what You judge, you will judge; and by your measurement standard, it should be measured for you (Matt 7:1,2). Don't speak against each other, brothers. Whoever opposes a brother or judges his brother is against the law and judges the law; but if you judge the law, you are not the judge of the law, but the judge of it. There is only one Legislator and Judge, the One who is able to save and destroy, but who you are, who judges your neighbor (James 4: 11-12). The law of sowing and reaping our judgments deposit seeds in our heart, which by law will someday reap. Natural and spiritual laws are similar: for each action there must be an equal and opposite reaction. Don't be fooled, God doesn't scoff; for whichever man does not sing that he also reaps (Galatians 6:7). Interestingly, the Sandfords (1982) suggest that the law of sowing and reaping was designed by God to multiply blessings rather than punishment. However, the law of sowing and reaping also works to lead to destruction. Sow yourself in righteousness, reap mercy (Hosea 10:12). They are who plot lawlessness, and sow wickedness, reap the same (Will 4:8). Sowing courts against parents when we make a decision that will dishonor our parents, we sow seeds that by spiritual law will someday reap. The law of honoring parents honors your father and your mother, as the Lord commands you, that your days can be extended, and that he can go well with you on the earth that God gives you (Deut. 5:16). Honor of all men. I love brotherhood. Be afraid of God. Honour of the King (I Peter 2:17). You are trapped in what you said, trapped by the word of your mouth (until 6:2). For in your own words you will be acquitted, and in your own words you will be condemned. (Matt. 12:36-37). In other words, everything will be fine with us in areas that we have honored our parents. They won't go well for us in areas that we've dishonored them, judging by them. We will reap what we sowed (Sandfords). Courts against parents cause darkness within us According to the Scriptures, the judgments we make against our parents as children can cause darkness in the withus. Whoever curses the father or mother, his lamp will be caught in the dark (until 20:20). Our judgments against others will block our ability to clearly see ourselves, others, the world around us, and God through the eyes of light. Making judgments against others and holding them in our hearts obscures our inner lamps, blocking our ability to see clearly both within and around us. The concealment of bitter judgments and unforgiveness causes our hearts to harden and turn into stone, rendering us incapable of being gentle and merciful. Block Our ability to see God He also blocks our ability to see God and know His presence within us. Blessed are the pure in the heart, for they will see God (Matt. Beloved, let us love each other, for love is from God; and everyone who loves is born from God and knows God. Those who do not love do not know God, for God is love. This showed us the love of God that God sent His only born Son into the world so that we could live through Him. This is love, not that we loved God, but that He loved us, and set His Son to be merciful for our sins. Beloved, if God loved us so much, we must also love another. No one saw God at any time; if we love each other, God is in us, and His love is perfected in us. By this we know that we are in Him and He is in us, because He has given us His Spirit (I am John 4:7-13). And we learned and believed the love God has for us. God is love, and the one who is in love is in God, and God is in Him. And there is no fear in love; but perfect love makes fear, because fear involves punishment, and the one who is afraid is not perfected in love (I am John 4:16-18). We love it because it was the first time he loved us. If someone says I love God and hates his brother, he is a liar; for someone who does not love his brother, whom he has seen, cannot love a God whom he has not seen. And we have this commandment from Him that those who love God should love his brother as well (I am John 4:19-21). The development of the Bitter Root Court often begins in childhood, when our parents could not love us with God's love. Perhaps they did not remember their promises, abandoned us, did not give us time, did not actually see us and did not listen to us, were inconsistent in education and love for us, could not provide warmth, security and a sense of belonging, or even abused us. In other words, we've been betrayed by a relationship. The bitter root court produces negative expectations of the heart of the child angry, and he cherishes resentment in his heart. Because it is not good to be angry with parents, a child can bury a grudge in his heart and forget them. As a result of the pain of the court, he develops negative beliefs and expectations by making internal vows about what he will or will not do. Some part of his heart becomes difficult and stubborn and unable to apply faith in a loving God or feel His presence. He opens himself up to hatred, anger, revenge, murder, violence, becoming very bitter. Bitter judgments against parents hinder marital relationships These negative expectations lead to an inability to treat our partners in marriage. If your father abandons you and you form a judgment against him, you will most likely believe that all men will abandon you, even God, the Father. Negative duration allows you to treat your partner in trust. Bitter Judgments Against the Father: Unable to Come to God These judgments and vows, rooted deep in his heart, prevent him from seeing God as a loving God and it. No pain strikes more deeply in a person's heart than being abandoned emotionally or physically by a father. Therefore, no pain beckons the saving power of the Father of God. The Father's wound is a wound of absence, so it is harder to heal than another wound and more destructive. Many men, desperate for masculinity, are angry that they do not get from the pope what they need, and they take refuge in techniques and grips after control (Source unknown). A father's wound is typical of people who like to challenge the idea of a loving God, saying such things: Why doesn't He stop all evil in the world? Why do children starve to death? Doesn't he care? This type of theological debate is very often the result of a wounded, impure heart that holds anger, resentment, and hatred for a father who dislikes them with God's love. When asked to tell them what their fathers were like, they describe them as cruel, insensitive, critical, or deserted. As adults, these people still hold resentment, hatred, and anger in their hearts because of the failure of their earthly fathers. Their hearts were wounded and scarred and informed by the reaction to their earthly father and project it to God (Sandfords). The story of Jerry My husband Gre W in a Christian family with Bible reading and prayer after eating. They never missed church. However, he grew up not wanting to be too close to God or serve Him. He didn't think God loved him very much, and he really didn't like God that well either. In the workshop, Jerry painted a picture of God with his eyes and mouth, frowning at him and measuring stick in his hand. Jerry saw that his picture of God looked just like his father's face. He describes his father as disapproving, subjective, harsh, critical, without grace or mercy. He gave him no approval, no approval, no love, no comfort, or warmth. In response to his experience with his father, Jerry believed that no matter what I do, it would never be good enough. Healing Bitter Root Courts Every Sin Requires Permission. There is no cheap grace. Forgiveness does not mean that God has looked the other way or changed His laws. Jesus told us not to think that He had come to repeal the Law or the Prophets, but to fulfill it (Matthew 5:17). Our hearts must be cleansed of bitter judgments, resentments, anger, forgiveness, etc. Invocation to the Lord from the pure heart (I Ti. 2:22). Create a pure heart in me O God... Don't throw me away from your presence... (p. 51:10). The grace of Christ on the cross delivers to us... The full legal requirement of the law of sowing and reaping was fulfilled with pain on Jesus' body in the suffering in the heart and soul and spirit of our Lord on the cross. However, the cross is not automatic. If we do not repent and confess, we reap in full, despite the fullness of mercy available on Statements. ... by forgiving us of all our transgressions, by cancelling the certificate of duty consisting of decrees against us and hostile to us; and he took it aside, nailed it to the cross (col. 2:13-14). Forgive from your heart We must make peace in our hearts with all who ever hurt us and get that cleared up before God. We must forgive your father or mother and all other family members for what they have done or have not done in our lives. Pray by asking the Lord to teach you forgiveness. ... delivered him to the tormentors until he

had to pay all that was associated with him. Similarly, my Heavenly Father will do so to you, if you, from your hearts, forgive not each of your brother your sins (Matthew. 18:34-35) the Lord makes it clear that forgiveness of others is a condition for receiving the desires of our hearts for our healing. Some sobering thoughts: According to the Lord's prayer, we will not be forgiven if we do not forgive others for their sins against us (Matthew 6:9-15). Forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors. And to lead us not to temptation, but to lead us away from evil... (Matt. 6:12-13). For if you forgive people their sins, your Heavenly Father will also forgive you: But if you forgive not the people of their sins, and your Father will not forgive your sins (Matthew 6:14-15). And whenever you stand to pray, forgive me if you have anything against anyone; so that your Father, also heavenly, can forgive you your transgressions. But if you do not forgive, your Father, heavenly, will not forgive your transgressions (Mark 11:25-26). If you forgive the sins of anyone, their sins have been forgiven by them; if you preserve the sins of anyone, they have been preserved (John 20:23). The principles of forgiveness forgiveness are the key to our own healing, so it is important that you understand what true forgiveness is. Pray by asking the Lord to teach you forgiveness. Here are some principles of forgiveness. Genuine forgiveness from the heart Real forgiveness must come from the heart. The heart must be a posture with the attitude of forgiveness to the person: ... if each of you will not forgive your brother from your heart (Matthew 18:35). Separating man from sin Forgiveness becomes easier if you can separate the person who hurt you from the sin he did against you, just as the Lord did for you. He loved you even in your sin because He was able to separate you from your sin. This means that we too can forgive others for their failures, but love them. Jesus said, 'The Father will forgive them; for they don't know what they're doing' (Luke 23:34). I tell you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you (Matthew 5:44). Love your enemies and do good... be merciful, just as your Father is merciful (Luke 6:35-36). Stop saying evil against others when we say evil against we bring the curse to ourselves. Think about the following scriptures: Every person of you who decides that you judge the other, you condemn yourself... (Rom. 2:1). Don't judge not to be a judge. For in the way you judge, you will judge; and by your measurement standard, it will be measured for you (Matt. 7:1-2). Pray by asking the Lord to seek your heart Ask Him to show you any judgments and negative expectations at work within you. Ask Him to show you bitterness, resentment, anger, fear, etc. in your heart. I have to forgive them for: I need to stop judging ... Then find out why you should stop judging them: Do they hurt you? What have they done to you or not done for you that makes you judge them? Did you forgive them? Doing business with God: Transforming bitter root judgments Begin by welcoming the presence of the Holy Spirit to guide and empower you. Spread your heart in humility before the Lord. Come before the Lord, tell him the question of the heart you bring to Him. Give your heart to God now; Let Him have access to your heart. 1. Repentance from dead works and faith in God: Confession and forgiveness Accept the decision to forgive all other people who have ever hurt you, recognizing that carrying bitterness produces death in you and in the people around you. Then verbalize your decision by saying aloud, Lord, I forgive... and name the person or persons involved and wither specifically that their sin. Declare your complete dependence on God to free you. Ask God to release and forgive you sin; out of state your desire to turn away from him and receive His grace. Also ask God to forgive you for judging others. Make your wish to turn away from this sin and receive His grace. Say words of forgiveness out loud. Confess specifically what sin is; declare your complete dependence on God to free you. Ask God to release and forgive you sin; Of your desire to turn away from him and receive his grace. 2. Act Act Heavenly Father, I need You to make me clean and whole. I go to you to recognize my sin of unforgiveness as a sin. I renounce all the sins associated with my carrying unforgivable against..... And..... I give my right to be angry with them and let them go into your hands. I thank you that your blood is enough for every sin committed against me. Now I get your forgiveness I choose to forgive..... For (Name what they did to you)..... I ask you to forgive me for judging etc. (name the man and what you judged them). I choose to waive my right to be angry with them. I know that it is a sin to judge this man, and I ask you to cleanse me of him and fully forgive me for it. Please make me clean and whole and free me from this sin. I know that I am helpless in overcoming it on my own, and that I need you. If you don't free me, I'll never be free. In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, I thank you. Amen.
