Although we know little about the period in which it was composed and even less about the composer of the epic, the Iliad's influence on later generations of poets and writers is incalculable. The great Aeschylus stated that his works consisted only of scraps left by Homer; centuries later, writing a myth founded centuries later for the great Roman Empire, he took Homer as his inspiration and model. Homer's influence has been felt over the centuries, in Dante and Chaucer, Shakespeare and Milton; such is his power that the men who read read read word of Greek and who had no access to translations spoke of Homer and his epics with deep reverence. After 2,700 years, it remains unsurpassed as the West's greatest war story. The Iliad has its foundations in the rich mythology of Greece. Popular is the story of Achilles' invulnerability, with the fatal exception of his heel. This myth has no place in the Iliad: Achilles is as deadly as everyone else, and Homer explicitly tells us that this is the case. He does not owe his strength to the Styx River rituals performed by his mother during his childhood, and there is no mention of a vulnerable heel. The poem does not deal with the sack of, or the famous episode of the horse of, although the horse is alluded to in the Odyssey. Another myth holds that Helen's father, Tyndareus, feared that Helen's beauty would lead her suitors to war. To avoid war throughout Greece, she had the suitors swear to be on the side of the man chosen to be Helen's husband should she be kidnapped. There's no mention of this story anywhere in the Iliad. And another well-known story tells us that the Achea warfleet gathered in Aulis and could not sail because of the wrath of the goddess Artemis. To appease the goddess, Agamemnon sacrificed his daughter, Hyphigenia. Once again, myth is not part of Homer's story. Either he lived before these myths evolved or he did not find them suitable for his purposes. Archaeological evidence suggests that there was a large city near hellespont, on the site traditionally attributed to. It was destroyed by war around the 13th century BC. The Iliad probably has some basis in reality; there may have been a massive campaign by Greek-speaking peoples against a large city on the coast of Asia Minor. Homer himself was a Greek who lived in one of asia minor's colonies, but his epics deal with a time when no Greek lived in Asia. Given the evidence, it seems safe to say that his work attempts to reconstruct stories of a past that was already distant. In the time before the written history, the passage of a few centuries made the accurate memory of historical events almost impossible. Homer's Iliad is therefore more myth than history, although many ancient Greeks have understood his epics as somewhat factual. The heroes of the Iliad were very real to the Greeks, holding a place in their history, as well as their literature and religion.
