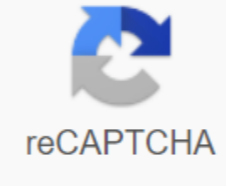

Appropriately structured 3. Clearly organized 4. Demonstrates critical reading, writing and thinking 5.
