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STRIKING A BALANCE: THE STRUNGGLES OF STUDENTS WITH PART-TIME JOBS IN MANAGING SCHOOL AND WORK

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ABSTRACT

The experiences of senior high school upperclassmen who work part-time while maintaining their studies have been minutely examined in this descriptive research study. Information were gathered from 100 student employees for purposes of exploring the impact of part-time employment on academic performance, the ability to manage time, general wellbeing, and institution as well as home support. In the same way, guidance and counsel from teachers and school counselors assist students to balance their educational requirements with work commitments. Based on these findings, the research recommends that students set proper organizational and time management skills, achieve

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enough rest, and seek help from family members, educators, and employers when needed. Besides, employers and institutions of learning should provide flexible working hours and support systems.
