I oversee the development and installation of the new Sea Mar Chicana/o and Latina/o Cultural and History Museum. I also manage, as well as promote and advocate educational opportunities for our Chicana and Latina community, through such programs as the Latina/o Educational Achievement Project (LEAP), the Youth Re-Engagement Program at Everett Community College, and the Seattle Youth Violence Prevention Initiative. I also administer all Sea Mar Affordable Housing Programs in Seattle, Des Moines, Vancouver, and Pasco, Washington. Under my supervision are 15 Sea Mar employees in four different units.

NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY, Flagstaff, AZ

**Professor with the Ethnic Studies Program**, 2015 to 2018

Teach courses including U.S. History from Colonial Period to 1877 and 1877 to the Present. Also, Introduction to Ethnic Studies, Chicana/Latina in U.S. Film, and Asian Americans in Film. Currently researching for two books and two articles, including a new monograph project based on a previously published article: *Mexican Cockfighting, Working Class Masculinity, and Culture*, exploring the hypothesis that Mexican males who participate in cockfighting have created a space of *homosociality* (male space) by which they challenge the concept of hegemonic masculinity by creating, through the cockfight, a form of “resistance” masculinity.

EASTERN WASHINGTON UNIVERSITY, Cheney, WA

**Associate Professor of History and Director of the Chicano Education Program and College Assistance Migrant Program**, 2009 to 2014 (Tenure Granted 2012)

Taught an increasingly diverse student body, including courses such in U.S. History, Chicano Culture, Chicana/Latina in the Pacific Northwest, Chicana/Latina in the U.S. Media, and Liberation and Social Change. Assumed directorship of the Chicano Studies Program even before promotion to Associate Professor. Pursued a rigorous research agenda and completed the monograph *Looking Like the Enemy*. Awarded multiple grants, including a \$2.1 million award for the Department of Education College Assistance Migrant program, 2007 -2012 and state of Washington \$104,000 DREAM Academy grant for adolescent youth. Supervised eight personnel, managed state budget allocation and federal grant.
