"How to feed the consumer of tomorrow? Students as a key enabler to make multi-stakeholder collaboration more effective"

In the multistakeholder project 'Wanted: Food for the future', he coached a team of students to identify barriers to change millennials' unsustainable food habits. The project brings together different partners with young people, experts and farmers to look for ways to feed the growing global population in a sustainable way. Additionally, the partners literally want to 'feed' the debate from practice by setting up three sustainable food chains.

Expect a workshop that will try to inspire you to collaborate successfully with different stakeholders to take on wicked challenges. By sharing experiences about challenges and difficulties we can get a head start in joining or starting similar projects. You will discuss in small groups on common wicked challenges and have a chance to use Lego Serious Play to find common ambitions.
