A program of activities, service and commitment to Guide Promise supports the mission statement. The Promise and Promise of The Law of Guidance form the principles of guiding. A guide gives her promise at a special Unit ceremony where she receives her Promise Badge which is worn on her uniform. The guide promises every girl and adult who is a member of Guiding worldwide makes a promise. The words may be slightly different from country to country, but the spirit and meaning of the words are the same no matter where Guiding exists. The Australian promise is: I promise that I will do my best to stay true to myself and develop my faith to serve my community and Australia and live by Guide Law.The Guide LawGuides adhere to a set of laws that provide a framework and philosophy for living. The Australian Guide Act is: As a guide I will strive for: Respect myself and others Be considerate, honest and trustworthy Be kind to others Make choices for a better world Use my time and abilities wisely Be thoughtful and optimistic Live with courage and strengthThe motto of Girl Guides in Australia is: Be preparedCode of ConductThis ethical guidelines set the standards of behaviour expected of all adults participating in Girl Guiding in Australia. It is designed to ensure that all adult members, volunteers and staff of Girl Guides Australia (GGA) and State Girl Guide Organisations are aware of their obligations and responsibilities. As an adult involved in Girl Behave in the spirit of The Girl Guide Promise and Guide Law.Adhere to the laws of Australia and the policies and procedures of Girl Guides Australia and my State Girl Guide Organisation.Contribute to a safe, friendly environment and culture where all people are safe from emotional, physical, verbal and sexual abuse. Treat all people fairly and do not tolerate discrimination of any kind. Respect the rights of others to privacy and the confidentiality of their personal information. Perform myself in a way that a reasonable person would consider appropriate. Represent Girl Guiding in the community in a positive light. GGA and State Girl Guide Organisations reserve the right to take action regarding violations of the Code of Conduct. Download the code of ConductMembershipMembership of a State Girl Guide Organisation is voluntary and given to any woman who:has achieved the age of five years; and have given the guidance pledge, or who is working to give the guidance pledge, or who accepts the principles and beliefs of guiding; andhas paid an annual fee as determined by the State Girl Guide Organisation.A Guide is any girl or woman who has made Guide Promise.Where a group exists that does not consist solely of members of the State Girl Guide Organisation and where an annual fee is required to belong to this group, as membership of the group does not provide membership in the State Girl Guide Organisation.Youth MemberA youth member of a state girl guide organization is a woman aged five to seventeen years inclusive who satisfies the requirement of Membership. Adult memberAn adult member of a state girl guide organization is a woman aged eighteen years or older who meets the requirement for membership. Adult members include: Trefoil Guild members who have given Guide Promise or Scout Promise, or who are prepared to do Guide Promise.Life Members of State Girl Guide Organisations who may not pay an annual fee. Qualification and conditions of life membership are determined by the State Girl Guide Organisations.Patrol System Patrol system was originally defined by its founder, Baden-Powell, as the method to be used in units. This is the method by which Guides are trained in self-government and leadership. It can be adapted to meet the different needs of girls. It can be used as a management tool for Girl Guides Australia.UniformFinancial members wear uniform to create a sense of unity and to identify them as Guides.A. variety of uniform options are available (Uniform Booklet (2013)). Guides should determine the best options for your device. Girl choice is the basic basis of uniform selection, provided it is suitable for the occasion. Uniform FAQs.Uniform should be used for all guide activities. A guide activity is one that is held in Guiding at local, region, state, or international level. But members can wear casual outfits (including non-uniform items with the Guide logo) for some activities, such as camping, rappelling, canoeing, which the organizers deem appropriate. Members travel to and from events, including regional, state, Australian and international events, in uniform unless wearing a uniform is deemed inappropriate. No members should be discriminated against on the basis of uniform. But for some activities, the organisers, District, Division/Region, State Girl Guide Organisation or Girl Guides Australia may require specific uniform elements to ensure appropriateness for the occasion, such as ANZAC Day, presentations. Therefore, the formation of a clothing pool is encouraged locally, regionally and/or state wide. When in uniform, members will wear as their lower garment, an element of length and style to suit the occasion. The object should be navy blue in color or made of blue denim. No clothes should be torn or seem badly faded. Faded.
