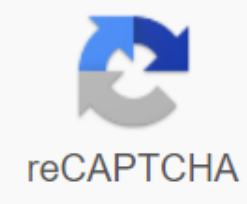




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## Things fall apart study guide answers

The Things Fall Apart project can be modified to fit the lesson in any book. This is considered an important work in world literature, although controversial , the book has been banned in some places for its critical portrayal of European colonialism. The book is divided into three parts, showing the reader the negative impact of colonization on the tribe of the main characters. It also shows how Christian missionary work to transform the African population has forever changed their culture. The book was written in 1958 and became one of the first books from Africa to become world famous. It is regarded as the archetype of the modern African novel. The protagonist of Okonkwo becomes a successful farmer and earns titles and respect in his community, although his lazy father, Unoka, was a disrespectful laughing stock. His father is a source of shame for Okonkwo, who aspired to be everything his father was not. He is imperious over his family as a result, and his shared desire to always seem courageous leads to his downfall. Okinkwo takes to the chamber, given to him to take care of as a peace proposal to avoid war with the neighboring community of Mbaino. The Oracle says that the boy should be killed, but Okonkwo is advised not to do it himself; it does it anyway. But it was after the accidental murder of a leader in his community that he and his family were expelled for seven years. When they return, they find that a lot has changed in their community because of the white missionaries who came to town. They set up a prison, a European-style court, a church, a school and a hospital. Okonkwo does not understand why the people did not rebel against these oppressors. Then, the benevolent Mr. Brown is replaced by a strict reverend who is not interested in the existing culture of people. Violence eventually ensues, and local leaders eventually whisk the colonizers. Okokwo can not cope and ends his life. These are the main characters of the novel: Okonkwo: the main character, whose fatal flaw is his inability to adapt to change and his reverence for the need to seem tough and courageous Ikemefuna: a smart, resourceful boy; Okonkwo's ward is given to avoid war; killed by him so Okonkwo does not seem weakNwoye: the son of Okonkwo, who becomes a Christian; Sensitive boy Ezinma: daughter of Okinkwo; Bold: Her father's favorite; EkwefiEfi's only surviving child: Okonkwook's second wife: Okonkwo's father, to whom Okonkwo strives to be the opposite; lazy and loves music and conversation; gentle, cowardly and unambitious, but he had no respect for the townspeople. Obierica: OkonkwoOgbuefi Ezeudu's best friend: senior UmuofiaMr. Brown: Missionary in Umuofia and Mbanta; a kind, respectful, open man who builds builds schools and hospitals in Umuofia both encourage literacy so that people do not keep up with the rest of the world; represents the colonization of theRev. James Smith: A missionary who contrasts with Mr. Brown in that he is strict and does not compromise; not interested in indigenous culture; also presents colonization In addition to the themes of the impact of colonization on African society and as a culture clash, there are also personal themes in Things Fall Apart. Readers can explore how the nature of people leads to their results, for example, how adaptable (or unsuitable) they need to change, and how this can be considered a kind of destiny. Studying the book can also look at human emotions and find common features and universality. The subject of fate can also be considered on a social level. Achebe illustrates the complexity of Igbo society and how it functions, unlike authoritarian encroaching, without a strong central government. So it's the fate of the people who were conquered? You can also learn how communities and people interact to find balance and function as a society. Fall Apart has become one of the most important books in African literature since it was one of the first major works to bring african perspective to a global audience and launched the continent's contemporary literature. It even made Western anthropologists realize that they got history wrong and led them to rethink their methods and scholarships on the history of Africa and peoples. Although controversial to write a novel in the language of colonizers, the book was able to reach more people in this way. Achebe was also able to work the untranslatable words of Ibo's talking so that people could understand them through context as they read, rather than the translator not achieving adequate subtleties of meaning. The book brought pride in history and community to people in Africa and led them to understand that they could tell their own stories. What's important about the title: Things falling apart?
