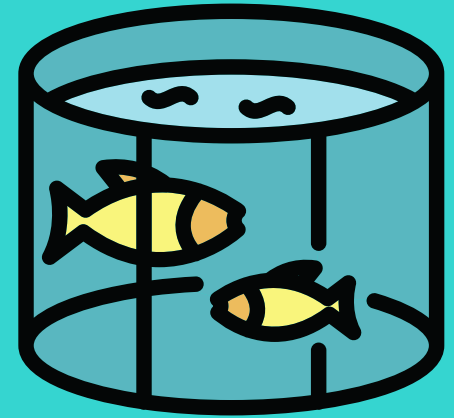

Fish Farming - Vocabulary



aquaculture: raising water animals such as fish for food; fish farming. (noun)



Aquaculture is another name for fish farming.

manure: animal dung used for fertilizing land.

fry: young, small fish. (noun)



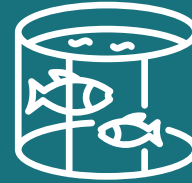
The hatcheries take the young **fries** to fish farms.



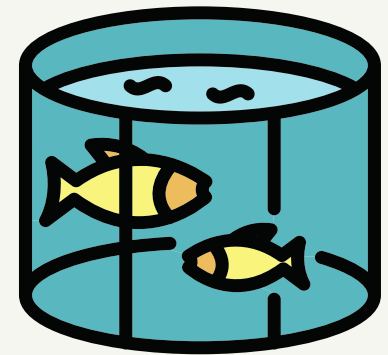

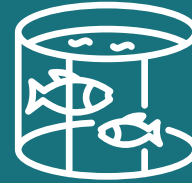
Fish Farming



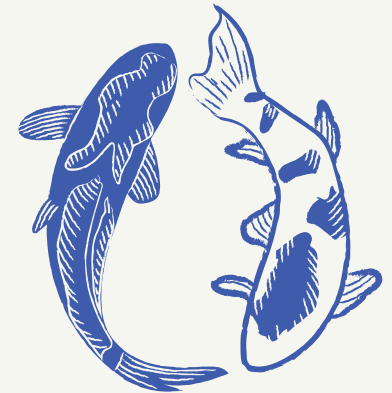
Fish Farming, also called aquaculture, is the fastest-growing type of farming in the world. About half the fish eaten by people in the world are raised on fish farms. China produces 33% of the world's farmed fish, followed by India and Indonesia. Over 600 different types of fish and other animals are raised on fish farms, but the most common are salmon, tuna, cod, trout, and halibut. There are many small fish farms, but now there are huge farms raising thousands of fish in small areas.



Fish Farming



Fish farming started over 4,000 years ago in China. The first recorded history was from the Zhou Dynasty around 500 BC. An official described carp, which are a symbol of good luck and fortune, as being farmed for food. During the Tang dynasty, around 618, Emperor Li, whose name means 'carp,' forbade farming the fish that bore his name. The Chinese then started raising other fish. They also learned to take manure from different farm animals and put it in the ponds to grow algae, which the fish would eat.



Fish Farming



In the 1700s, Germany learned how to take eggs from fish and hatch them in **hatcheries**. Then, they raise the baby fish, called a **fry**. Now there are hatcheries all over the world that supply both fish farms and the wild with fish. Hatcheries are very important to keep fish populations high. Farmers and scientists try to keep the fish populations high enough to feed the world as the world population grows.
