All materials in this book may be freely downloaded, shared, printed and used for educational or nonprofit purposes.







Hi! My name is Tally.
















## **Did You Know?**

Every year, sea turtles like Tally—and lots of other ocean animals—can get tangled in fishing line.

It's thin, strong, and hard to see, so we can't always avoid it. When it wraps around our flippers or fins, it can make it hard to swim, eat, or even breathe.

## You Can Help!

- **Pick up fishing line** you see on the beach.
- Put it in a special recycling bin or in the trash.
- Never leave plastic behind—it can blow into the ocean.
- Watch for sea turtles before you cast a fishing line.

When you keep the beach clean, you're not just helping Tally—you're helping dolphins, crabs, birds, and all the other coastal critters who share our Outer Banks home!
