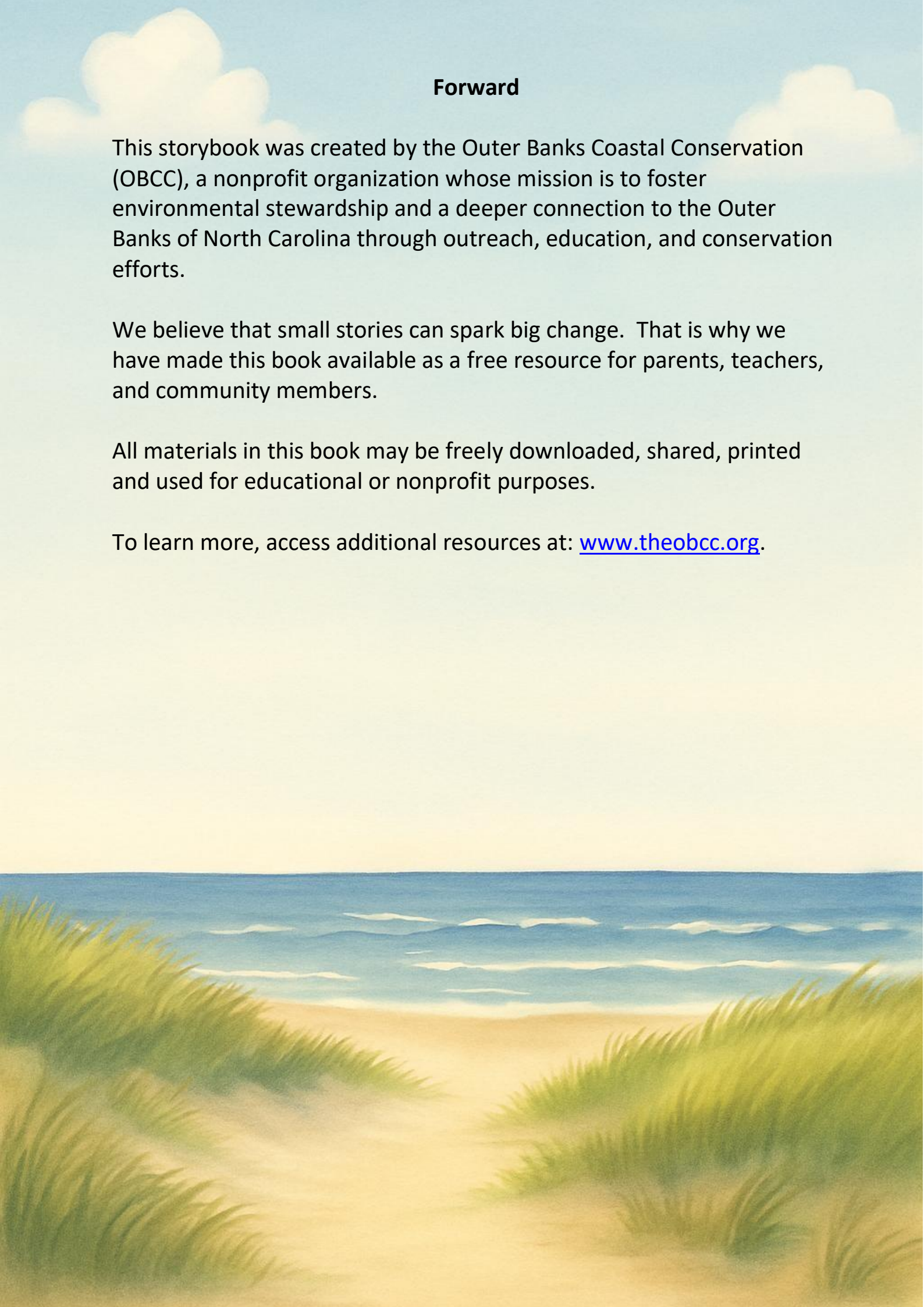
## Forward

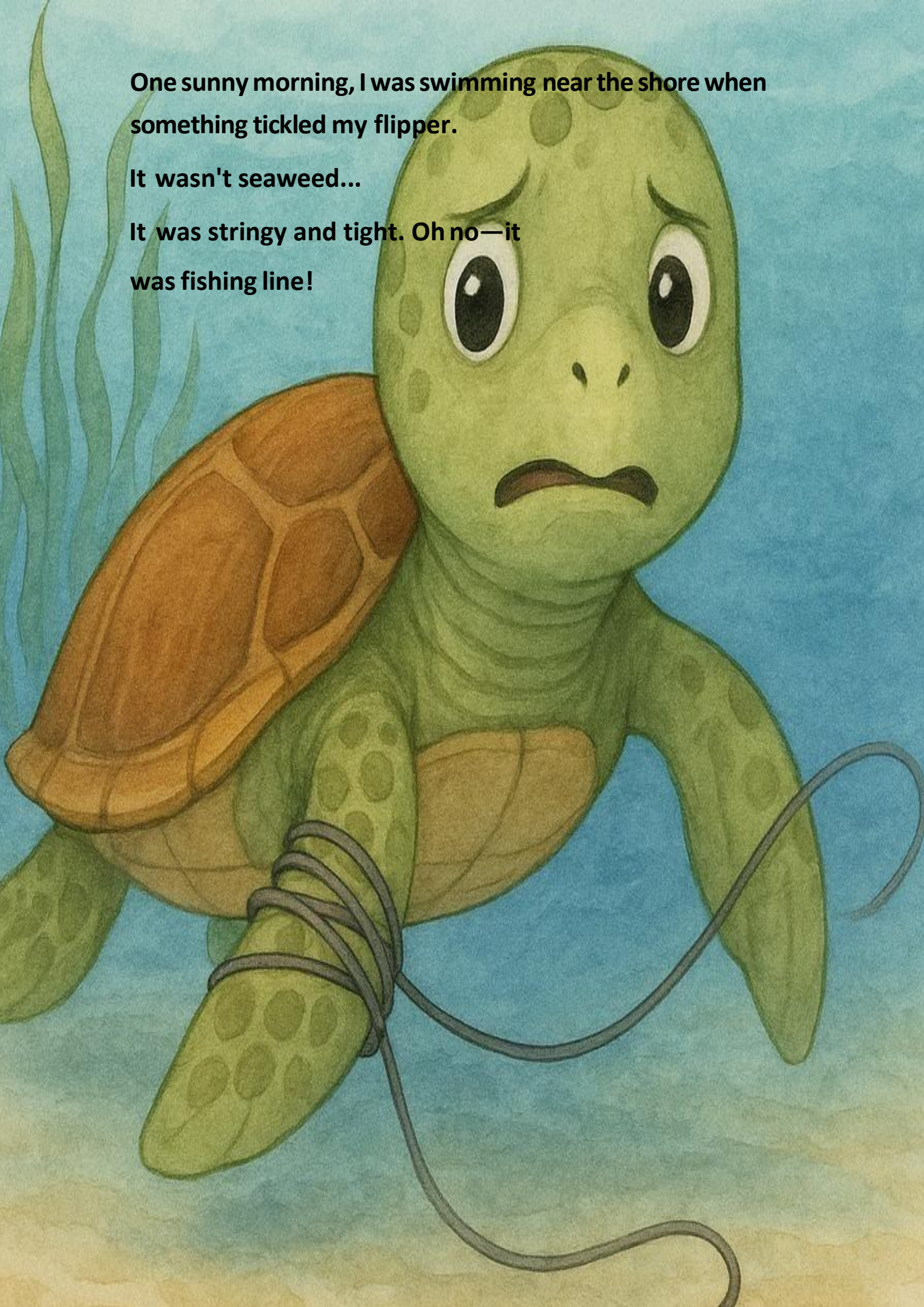




One sunny morning, I was swimming near the shore when something tickled my flipper.

It was stringy and tight. Oh no—it was fishing line!

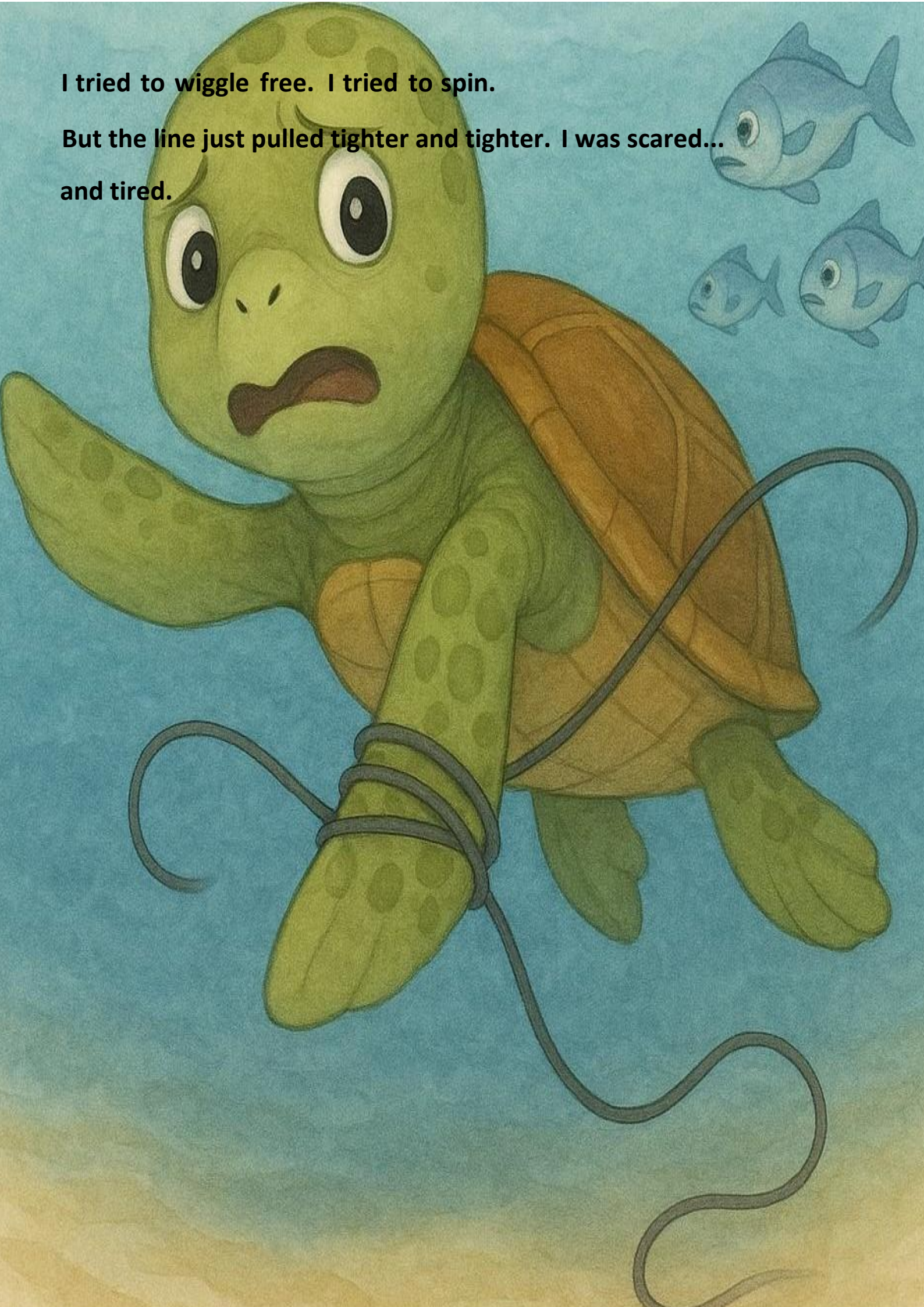




**I tried to wiggle free. I tried to spin.**

**and tired.**



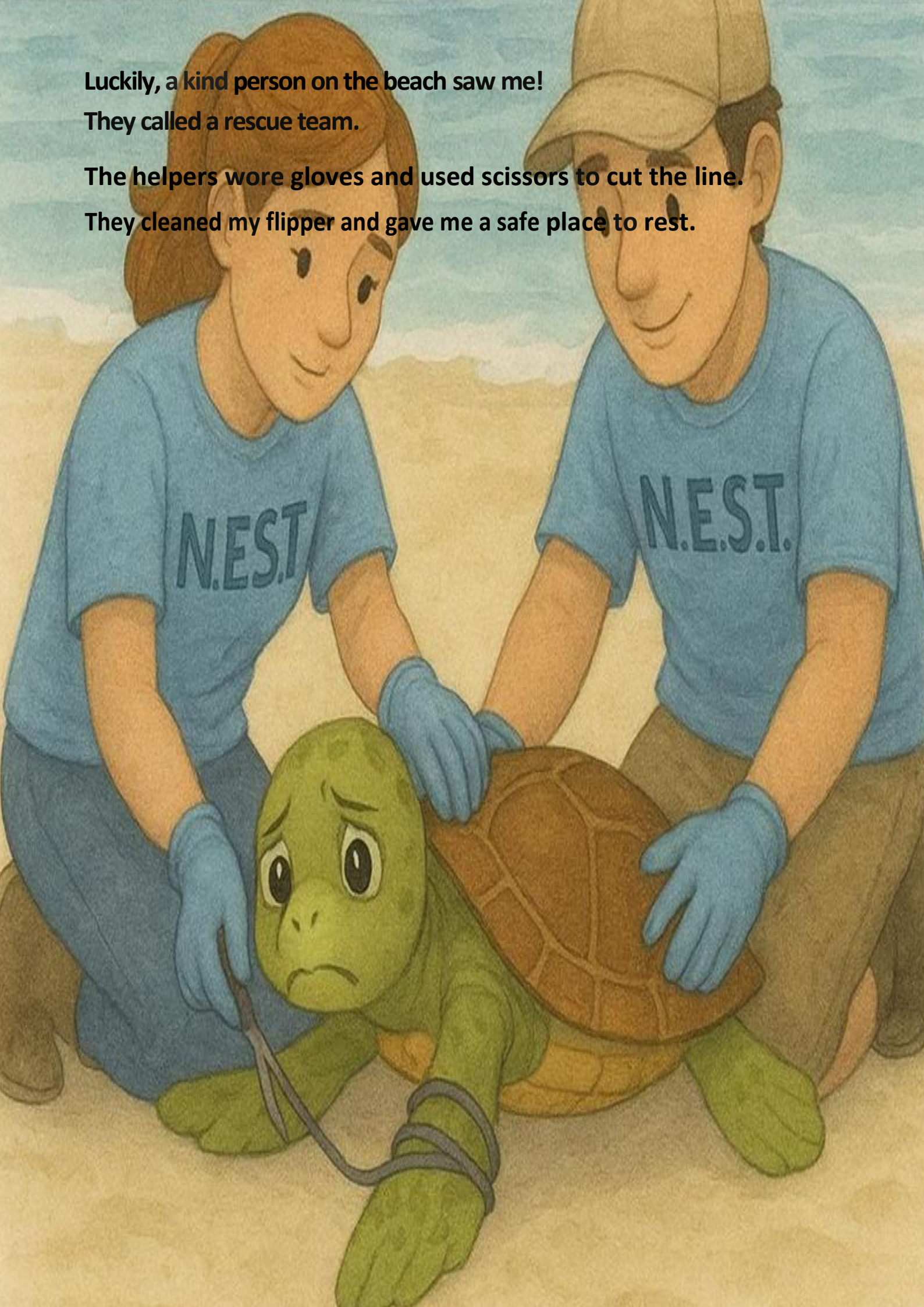


**Luckily, a kind person on the beach saw me!**

**They cleaned my flipper and gave me a safe place to rest.**





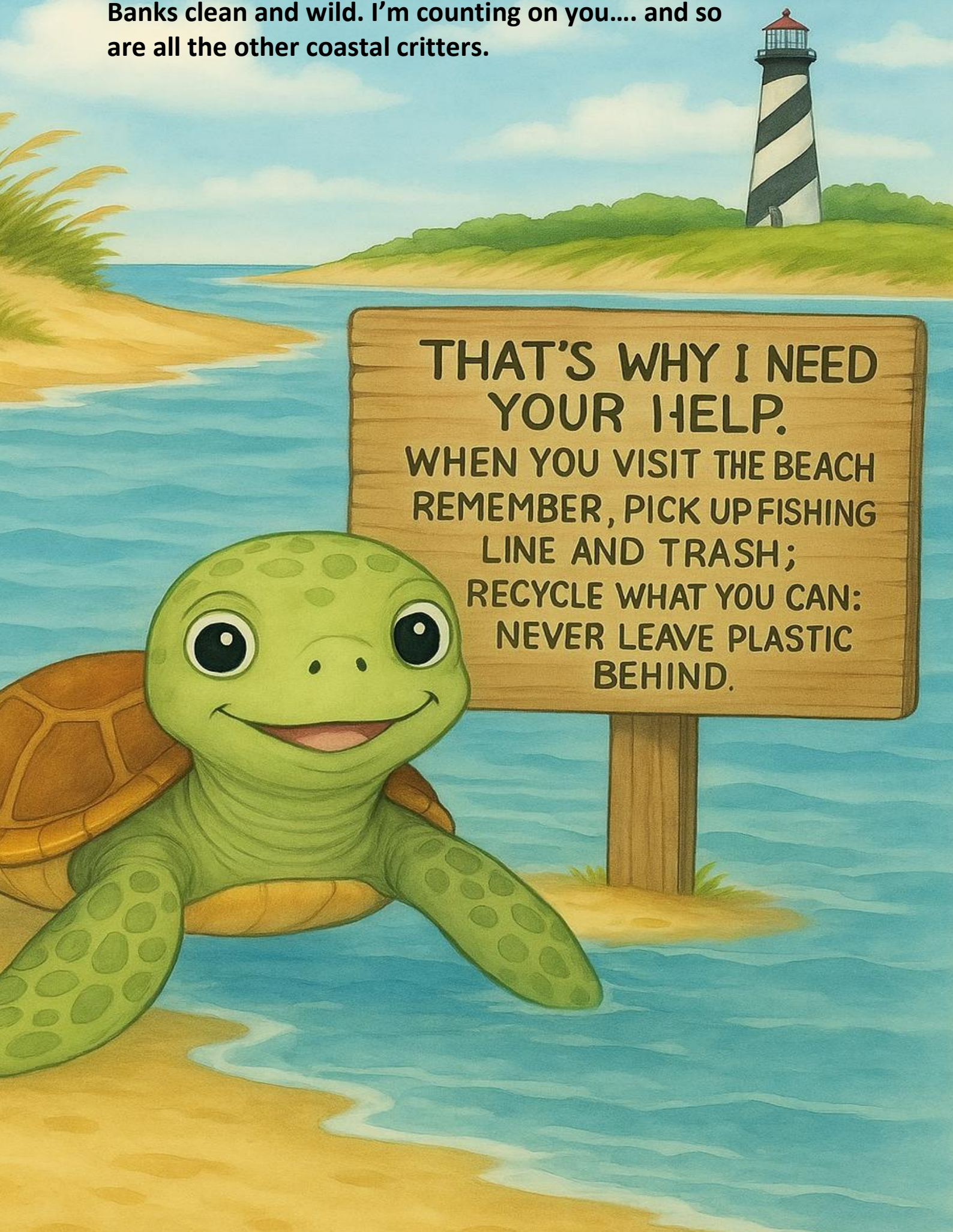
Every year, trash like fishing line and plastic ends up in the ocean. It can hurt sea creatures and other wildlife.

## Did You Know?

Every year, sea turtles like Tally—and lots of other ocean animals—can get tangled in fishing line.

It's thin, strong, and hard to see, so we can't always avoid it.

When it wraps around our flippers or fins, it can make it hard to swim, eat, or even breathe.

### You Can Help!

- **Pick up fishing line** you see on the beach.
- **Put it in a special recycling bin** or in the trash.
- **Never leave plastic behind**—it can blow into the ocean.
- **Watch for sea turtles** before you cast a fishing line.

When you keep the beach clean, you're not just helping Tally—you're helping dolphins, crabs, birds, and all the other coastal critters who share our Outer Banks home!
