Henry David Thoreau was born in 1817 and spent most of his life in Concord, Massachusetts. He was sent to Harvard, where he did very well and in 1837, graduated in the top half of his class. Despite his high job and economic depression, lack of jobs and Thoreau's lack of interest in an affordable career, he began teaching at Concord Public School. He left two weeks later because of disagreements over how to discipline students. From there he started working in his family's pencil factory. In 1838, Thoreau and his brother John opened and ran the school until it closed in 1841. His second stint in the pencil factory ended when Thoreau was invited to work and live with his mentor and friend Ralph Waldo Emerson, which led to aspirations to write. Emerson gave Thoreau permission to use a plot of land he owned at Walden Pond. During Thoreau's two years behind the pond, he wrote one of his most famous works, Walden, which examines his time spent in transcendental ideals, and he found inspiration for his essay Civil Disobedience when he spent a night in prison. Thoreau spent the rest of his life working in a pencil factory, surveying, lecturing and publishing essays. He died of tuberculosis in May 1862, leaving behind many unfinished works and notes that his sister and friends were edited for publication posthumously. In honor of Thoreau's birthday, we made ten poignant quotes of Walden. 1.
