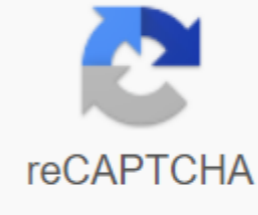

Aside from being fun to do quizzes and satisfying puzzle solving, there are other, less obvious benefits to these activities: First, the brain is an organ that works better with regular workouts, just like other body organs do. Think of workouts like this one as psychic aerobics! Regular exercise and problems for the brain will keep your mind healthy and active, make sure that there are active neural connections, improve mental associations and search pathways, and can prevent dementia later in life. The second advantage is that workouts like the one below are designed to carry different parts of the brain. They encourage you to think sideways, so you learn to look at problems from several different aspects rather than the obvious approach. It is the kind of mental training that can help you improve your approaches to problem solving in day-to-day life, and possibly improve your test scores.
