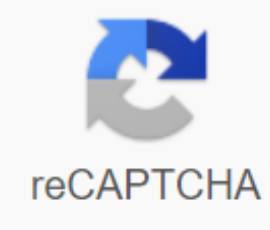

It can also be the same person who struggles to spell or calculate simple equations. When I interview prospective employees I always evaluate people's skills, communication and social intelligence above academic intelligence on the disability scale. Of course, I want knowledgeable, qualified and technically competent employees, but I am well aware that these three ingredients do not automatically equal a great coach, teacher, coach, motivator or employee. It is my experience that people with high levels of social intelligence are well suited to (numerous) careers that involve significant face-to-face contact and social interaction. Brian Garner notes that academicism is typical for academics who write for a highly specialized but limited audience, or who have limited idea of how to make their arguments clear and concise (Garner's Modern American Usage, 2016). The Tameri Guide for Writers defines an academic as an artificial form of communication commonly used in higher education institutions aimed at making small, inappropriate ideas seem important and original. The profession of academic is achieved when you start inventing your own words and no one can understand what you are writing. Dale wasn't a good writer. Believe me in this... Rather, we allow our point of speaking himself better than he knows to get out of the closet in the voice of a skeptical reader.
