Charlene Tait Deputy CEO, Scottish Autism

Charlene Tait is Deputy Chief Executive of Scottish Autism. She has worked with and on behalf of autistic people for thirty years. In that time she has been engaged in direct practice, strategic development and academia.

He was previously a secondary school teacher in London and a local authority councillor in Islington before moving



into the charity sector. He now lives in Edinburgh with his partner and is a keen runner and podcaster.

Steve Billingham Grandparent with lived experience

Steve Billingham is Owner and Director of his own Business and Management Consultancy firm and a non MSP member of and contributor to the Cross Party Group on Autism at Holyrood. He is grandparent to a six year old autistic girl and has direct first hand experience of trying to ensure that his granddaughter gets the support she is entitled to in school. He has worked closely with both





national and local autism charities, and with other charities focused on supporting children and young people with other additional support needs.

David Nicholson comes from Fife. He was educated at Kirkland High School and Community College and Plockton High School. He went on to study law and politics at Stirling University where he graduated with a 2:1 Honours degree in 2012. Since then he has done various autism speeches and currently sits on the Scottish Governments Understanding Autism Steering committee. He is a member of the Scottish Fiddle Orchestra, a fiddle player, a curler with Largo Curling Club and enjoys spending time at the families smallholding.
