Some people may never think about the fact that before writing many of his great works, Roald Dahl actually wrote many short stories that were influenced by his traumatic and interesting childhood; most of these stories were not as child friendly as one might imagine. One of the most significant examples would be in his story Beware of the Dog. In this story, there is a man who is in the Air Force who is fighting in World War II and lost his leg in a plane crash because he was shot down. The story he came up with may have been something he dreamed of during his six-month recovery in military hospitals because it is so similar to his own experience. This story was also published at a time when World War II was coming to an end, so everything that happened in the story was still relevant and fresh in people's minds. Many people still haven't been over the fear that such a war brings people. The connections between his past and his stories are also prominent in his longer works, which are also better known. Most people familiar with Matilda's story, about an intelligent little girl with special powers who is defiant of her school bully principal, Ms. Trunchbull. In many of his stories, the common thread is - offensive teachers and adults. This was due to the private schools he attended, which practiced corporal punishment (Hathcock). This aspect of his childhood seems to play a role in many of his literary works. There also seem to be many other small references to his childhood in his short stories. For example, when he was 3 years old, his father died of pneumonia; worked as a shipbroker (ROALD). This contributed to the plot of his story Dip in the Pool. In this short story, the plot is centered around the fact that the main characters are on a cruise ship. The character subsequently dies because of an ill-thought-out bet. Roald Dahl was a British short story writer and screenwriter of Norwegian descent who became a writer in the 1940s. Dahl's first published work, inspired by his encounter with C.S. Forester, was shot down over Libya. Today, the story is published as Toy. The story, about his wartime adventure, was bought by the Saturday Evening Post for \$900 and propelled him to a career as a writer. Its title was inspired by a very inaccurate and sensational article about the crash that blinded him, claiming that he was shot down instead of simply having to land because of low fuel consumption. His first children's book was Gremlins, about mischievous little creatures that were part of RAF folklore. The book was commissioned by Walt Disney for a film that was never made, and published in 1943. Dahl went on to create some of the most popular children's stories of the 20th century, such as Charlie and the Chocolate Factory, Matilda and James and Giant Peach. He also had a successful parallel career as an adult story writer, usually with a dark sense of humor and a surprising ending. Many of them were originally written for American magazines such as Ladies Home Journal, Harper's, Playboy and The New Yorker, then collected Dahl into anthologies and gained worldwide recognition. Dahl wrote more than 60 short stories and they appeared in many collections, some only published in book form after his death. The stories also brought him three Edgar Awards: in 1954, for the collection Someone Like You; in 1959, for the story of the Landlady; and in 1980, for an episode of Tales of the Unexpected based on Skin.
