Spinning into the Vortex: A Workshop with Sandra Bruce

Vortex. The word itself makes you think of swirling whirlpools, spirals of wind, maybe even a bit of chaos. In quilting, a "vortex" has a similar pull. It's a design that draws your eye into motion, whirling you around with movement and color. For the 21 adventurous ladies who joined Sandra Bruce's Scrap Vortex Workshop, it wasn't chaos at all – it was pure creative fun, with just enough unpredictability to keep things exciting.

Now, traditional vortex quilts usually lean on certain tried-and-true techniques:

 Geometric shapes (think log cabins with a twist, circles, curves) to give depth and motion









- Color progression to keep the eye moving
- Visual illusions that play with bold color and design
- Foundation paper piecing for precision with wild shapes

But Sandra Bruce wasn't here for tradition. Her vortex philosophy was much scrappier – literally. Scrap Vortex quilting is all about diving into that never-ending scrap bin (you know the one!) and letting it take you on an unpredictable ride. Forget rulers and rigid patterns. This

is improv quilting at its best: random, playful, and always surprising.

Sandra, a former calligrapher and illustrator, was naturally drawn to

the bold graphics and movement of scrap vortex quilts. She's since developed her own vibrant approach, guiding us with tips like:

- Mix in log cabin blocks (wonky or not, they both work!)
- Add curves and circles to soften transitions
- Frame a special fabric for emphasis
- Use orphan blocks and leftover "what-was-I-thinking" squares
- Toss in checkerboards, stripes, or random color blends for sparkle

And oh, did we have fun putting those tips into action! Patti Pane showed up with a giant tote of scraps that turned into a community "shopping spree." Anita Adriano's UFO stash – half-square triangles,

flying geese and crumb blocks galore – found new life in other people's projects. Jennifer Kerr braved circles (and nailed it!) while Lucy Saucedo played color whisperer for Ruth's design. Lois McKay started her vortex with gorgeous Asian-inspired fabrics, while Pam Gayle and Angela Faucett spun out vibrant purples. Across the room, Karen Cox, Trish Duffield, and Vicky Walters took a fiery path with reds, oranges and rusts. Each quilt was so different, yet equally magnetic.

Shoppers wandering through the Orange Quilt Bee couldn't resist stopping to watch the magic unfold. Their collective "oohs" and "aahs" were proof that this style of quilting captivates quilters and non-quilters alike.

Sure, Scrap Vortex quilting might look carefree, but it actually challenges you to make endless

decisions like where to place that scrap, how to balance color and when to stop adding. It's a dance between freedom and finesse.
And the reward? A quilt that's completely your own – unique, personal and brimming with movement.

Sandra wrapped up the Tuesday evening lecture with a few pieces of wisdom that sum it all up perfectly:

- Let the kid out
- Do something scary once in a while
- Take chances

So, to all of you reading: Take Sandra's advice. Grab your scraps, embrace the chaos, and dive

headfirst into the vortex. Who knows where it'll take you – but I promise, it'll be somewhere wonderful.

You have until fall to make blocks and have a chance to win a duffle bag customized for you. Remember, the goal is 200 blocks!

Fabric Selection:

Lights: neutrals in creams or whites. To increase interest in your block, please use a variety of fabrics in each block.

Darks: Select a single-color hue for all of your darker fabrics. Your block will be a neutral on one side and a color on the other. Think a range of blues or reds or purples or oranges or pinks or greens etc. The fabric should read as all that color at a distance.

Center square: The center square is one of your darker fabrics.

Opportunity Baskets



President's Challenge: The Log Cabin

To make 14-inch square log cabin quilt blocks, you will cut your strips to the measurements shown. The width of all strips should be 2.5".

To assemble the blocks, follow this diagram in this order: Start with piece 1 as your center, add piece 2, then 3, and keep adding pieces! Square your block to 14.5". There are hundreds of tutorials online to assist in assembly if you are new to making log cabin blocks!






All seams are 1/4" unless otherwise noted.


To strip piece this block, take one 2 1/2 x 8" (1 $1/4 \times 4 1/4$ ") of Fabric 1 and one 2 x 8" (1 $1/2 \times 4 1/4$ ") of Fabric 2. Sew these along the long edge (Diagram 1).

Make 2 of these units and join them together (Diagram 2). Next add the third $2 \frac{1}{2} \times 8$ " (1 $\frac{1}{4} \times 4 \frac{1}{4}$ ") strip of Fabric 2 (Diagram 3).

Press all seams toward Fabric 1. Trim the first edge of the strip set to square it.







Block Party: SEPTEMBER 2025

Cut this unit into three $2 \frac{1}{2} \times 9 \frac{1}{2}$ " rectangles (Diagram 4).




Piece one of the strip sets to a $2 \times 9 \frac{1}{2}$ " (1 $\frac{1}{4} \times 5$ ") of Fabric 2. Make 2. (Diagram 5)

Reference the block diagram for placement and join the two units together. Finish by adding the last strip set to the bottom of those units (Diagram 6). This will complete the center block.



To finish the block, add the 2 x $9 \frac{1}{2}$ " (1 $\frac{1}{4}$ x 5) of Fabric 2 strips to the top and bottom of the center, followed by adding the 2 x $\frac{1}{2}$ " (1 $\frac{1}{4}$ x 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ ") to the sides creating a $\frac{1}{2}$ 1/2" (6 $\frac{1}{2}$ ") block.

All seams are 1/4" unless otherwise noted.


Begin with one each of the $2\frac{1}{2} \times 10\frac{1}{2}$ " ($1\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{4}$ ") rectangles. Sew long edges together with Fabric 2 in the middle. Press toward center fabric. Sub-cut to $2\frac{1}{2}$ " ($1\frac{1}{2}$ ") strips to create four pieces. See *Diagram 1*.

Next, along long edges, sew together the Fabric 1 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (2 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 6 $\frac{1}{4}$ ") and the remaining Fabric 2 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (1 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 6 $\frac{1}{4}$ "). Sub-cut to strips 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (1 $\frac{1}{2}$ ") to create four pieces. See *Diagram 2*.

Draw diagonal lines on the wrong side of two Fabric 3 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (1 $\frac{1}{2}$ ") squares and place on one end of the two Fabric 1 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (1 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ "), then sew directly on the line. Trim seam to $\frac{1}{4}$ ". Press. See *Diagram 3*.

Repeat with the last two Fabric 1 rectangles and Fabric 3 squares, BUT ROTATE the square to make two units shown in *Diagram 4*.


Lay out all the segments using the block picture for placement. Stitch together each side, then join sides with a final center seam.




Fabric 2 Fabric 3
