We will consider any article that contains strong legal arguments relating to sustainable development, infrastructure, environmental law, energy law, climate justice, or other sustainability-related content.

SDLP accepts submission of timely articles that have already been published elsewhere, so long as permission of the previous publisher is received.

SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS

- Articles or abstracts should be submitted to sdlp.wcl@gmail.com.
- Articles should be between 6,000 and 10,000 words excluding footnotes.

- Articles should be submitted electronically in Microsoft Word or a Word-compatible software program using 12-point Times New Roman font.
- Articles should attempt to follow the format presented in previous issues of SDLP and cite in accordance with the 21st edition of the Bluebook.
- Articles should include a 3-4 sentence biography of the author and an indication of whether to include the author's email address with the published articles.
- Article submissions should include an up-to-date resume of the author and contact information.
