White is a classic guide to writing in English. With sections on how to properly use different forms of words, as well as often misunderstood words or expressions, it's much more than grammar and style guidance. 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Rowling's very popular Harry Potter books are not only fun for kids to read, they are also novels that can really help improve your vocabulary. One of the great things about the language that Rowling uses is that the names of spells, people and places often come from Latin roots and describe what they should be called. Associations with Latin roots can help you better understand the meaning of other similar words. Author of UlyssesRenowned James Joyce uses about 30,000 unique words in Ulysses. This use of so many different words throughout the book is something that can help expand your vocabulary by simply reading one novel. Vitalize Your VocabularyMost books are today available in paperback, hardcover, audiobook and e-book formats, so you can choose those that fit your personal learning style. Once you have completed this list, increase reading, writing, and speaking skills even more with recommended grammar books to improve your English skills. While there are many ways to learn English, it's best to start with a few high-quality textbooks. In my own experience as autodidactautodidact: a person who teaches himself/self rather than being taught by a teacher, no other method offers so much information for so little money. No apps, no podcasts, no YouTube. Even free training materials are worth something: your time. The more time you spend on a poorly designed training program, the less time you have for other purposes and interests. I also believe that my students who are the fastest learners of English are partial autodidacts: they do extra self-towing at home and they spend their time learning from books - not movies or games. With that in mind, here are 8 books that I usually recommend to students who want to do extra self-study. I organized the list in three categories: If you plan to take IELTS, I also include 3 useful books specifically for IELTS training. Some of these books are a bit pricey: (unofficial) expensive - but if you think you'll study them and refer to them for weeks, months or years, they may be the cheapest investment you make in your education. The best books to improve English A very common way to learn a new word is to first think about a word in your native language and then search for its English translation (using Google or App). I can determine which students practice this bad habit because they struggle to speak fluently - even after years of learning English. When you hear about people who have been mutilated in English for 6 months, one of the reasons is that they use good books to learn new words in English methodically: done logically using a plan or system. English Vocabulary Builder (DK English for All) The fastest way to learn English (or any language) is through photos. After all, most of your brain is dedicated to processing visual information. It's also how children learn their first words. 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To speak natural English, you will need to spend some time studying collocations. The University of Cambridge (also known for its English experts) has created a series of books that can help you learn these complex phrases. They have similar books to study phrasal verbs and idioms, in case you want to expand your vocabulary even more. Oxford Advanced Student Dictionary (OALD) of the University of Oxford is famous for creating one of the largest English dictionaries (with 600,000 entries). More importantly, their experts also created Oxford 3000. This is a list of the most useful and most commonly used words in English-speaking countries. According to these experts, once you learn these 3,000 words, you can understand 80-90% of English conversations, websites, newspapers, etc. The newest edition includes 60,000 words and 109,000 examples. OALD includes a host of special features that you can't find in other dictionaries - like and collocing. You can also download a version of the app on your smartphone that lets you say the word you want to watch (in case you don't know how it's spelled - which is common problem with English words). The best books to study English grammar It is true that English grammar is not simple. But many books make this topic more complex and confusing than necessary. The three books below are great because they make English grammar as easy as possible - and sometimes even fun. The best thing about these books, of course, is that they can help you learn English at home, and quickly. (Note: If your goal is to consider English grammar before taking the IELTS test, it's best to get a specialized text.) English Grammar in Use (Cambridge) An excellent book for learning English at home is Raymond Murphy's workbook, English grammar in use. (Make sure you get a version with answers.) This is the most popular grammar book in the world, and for good reason. Each grammar theme is explained in simple words, with lots of examples and practical exercises. At the back of the book, there is a test you can take to determine which grammar topics are most difficult for you. In fact, the best way to explore this book is to start with the topics that you find most interesting or confusing. Note, however, that the intermediate book is written for B1/B2 learners, so if your English level is below or higher, you should consider getting beginners or extended books as well. The practical use of English (Oxford) The common problem with grammar books (in any language) is that they give the reader too much information. They are written by linguistics professors who are interested in the history, psychology or science of the language, so they do not explain the common problems for English learners. In contrast, the practical use of English is designed specifically for readers who want to learn English. It was first published in 1980 and has been improved several times over the past 40 years. For intermediate and advanced students, this is a great resource to have. Please note, however, that there is no exercise. It offers only explanations and examples. English Grammar: Understanding the Basics (Cambridge) If you feel confused about terms such as transitive and untranslatable verbs or demonstrative and interrogate pronouns, then another book to consider is Cambridge University's English Grammar: Understanding the Basics. Unlike the other two books above, this text explains English grammar step by step. This is especially useful if you have to do a lot of writing in English, but also a good read if you want to reach an advanced level quickly. With two other books, you'll like to correct your mistakes and build more sentences, but this book will help you understand picture of the English language. In the excerpt below (explaining the phrasal verbs), you get a taste of how clear and simple the book is. The best books to improve your speaking skills are certainly the best way to improve your speaking skills in practice with or some English-speaking friends. But you can also learn a lot about talking to a couple of good books like the ones below. English Conversation (practice makes perfect) If you want to feel comfortable chatting with English-speaking friends, colleagues or family members, a good book to study the practice makes perfect: the English conversation of an American publisher, McGraw-Hill. There are also examples of dialogues, practical exercises and games that you can play with a student partner, classmate or teacher. The best books to prepare IELTS Finally, if you want to go to an English-speaking university or get a visa to work in an English-speaking country, you may have to take IELTS. The three books below can prepare you to get the best score. The official Cambridge guide to IELTS In addition to creating many good self-ing enabling books, Cambridge is one of the creators of IELTS. So it's no surprise that they also publish a better book to prepare for the test. The official Cambridge IELTS guidebook is written for English learners with a minimum B1 reading, and offers tips on how to prepare for both versions of IELTS (Academic and General Training). In addition, the book includes many tips, explanations, exercises, audio and visual examples - plus 8 complete practical tests. Note, however, that this book does not teach you vocabulary or grammar. He focuses on listening, reading, speaking and writing skills - just like IELTS himself.
