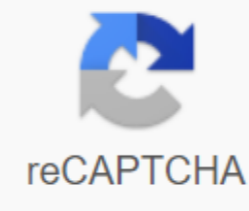


Left handed guitar chords



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When I first started studying guitar, it never occurred to me that the chord charts were designed with the right hand of the players in mind. I've always managed to understand them, but there was always that little struggle to make them make sense on my lefty guitar. Like me, many of you will simply put up with deciphering regular chord charts - but why make it harder? Left-handed guitar chords will help make learning that a little easier. For those of you who are new to guitar and a little unsure, I've put together a selection of 14 left-handed guitar chords that every new guitarist should learn. I also included an audio file for each chart, so you can hear how each chord should sound when playing correctly. Explanation for beginners In case you're a complete beginner looking at these charts for the first time, let me briefly explain what they represent. The diagrams should be read as if you have a guitar standing in front of you with a fretboard in front of you. The orange band at the top of each diagram is a nut, i.e. a thin strip of plastic around the neck of the guitar that keeps the strings in place. For simplicity, each chart shows only the first five frets. Orange circles indicate where you should place your fingers, and numbers in the circles (1-4) of your finger numbers. Your fingers are named as follows: Index : 1 Middle : 2 Ring : 3 Pinky : 4 Thumb : T (thumb is not used in any of these basic chords) A '0' above the nut (orange stripe) tells you that the string should be played open, i.e. do not disturb any notes. X above the nut indicates that the line should not be played. Tip and Tricks Finger accommodation. Try to place your fingers as close to the fret of the wire as you are able to. The reason for this is that if you put them too far back, the line will most likely buzz. At first it may be difficult, but over time it will become the second finger pressure. Try to use the easiest touch you need for a string to ring through without any buzz. Pushing down it is difficult to cause a note to become a little sharp, making the chord sound from the key. Try using a mirror or mobile phone camera to flip the chord shape around. A mirror, or even a front-facing camera on your phone turns any ordinary chord of your right hand into your left. Tips for awesome-sounding chords with these chords, the first thing to remember is that you have to play them with your left guitar. Trying them out on the usual will lead to some less than stellar sounds, and you'll curse the curse for trying! In addition, however, the same rules apply when playing left-handed chords that can be used when playing right-handed chords. You want to start slowly to strengthen the proper chord shapes, be sure to push down firmly on the strings, and start working in rhythms when you feel comfortable switching between different chord shapes. Try using a mirror to flip the chord shape around. This turns the usual right-hand chord box into the left. It also works if you use a front-facing camera on your phone or tablet. Here are some other quick and simple tips to help you read the right hand chord boxes. Always look for the lowest line. Find out which fingers you need to use. Find out what frets you need to put your fingers on.
