There are lots of important things that happen in the series that lead up to the final events and most of them (especially those related to Rumplestiltskin) aren't even mentioned. So, my advice is: if you haven't seen season 1, just don't bother with this book. It's not worth it. It's chaotic, nostalgic, and reading this novelization of season 1 was just lovely. Don't get me wrong, the book is super mediocre and I wouldn't recommend it unless you already love the show. I was pleased to see Snow and Charming, the Evil Queen, and Red get their backstories fairly well done. Overall, it was nice to dive into OUaT's world once more! It really brought back memories of Sheriff Graham and Jefferson. Considering some elements were rushed or glossed over, I still enjoyed it as a decent companion piece. If you're a fan of the TV series or considering starting to watch it, this is a good read. However, I'd much rather rewatch the show. Reawakened reminded me of how much I loved the first season, which is my favorite. Unfortunately, this book doesn't have enough of Sheriff Graham and Jefferson, who made the show so interesting. Other things were missing, and the storytelling was a bit simplistic. As a novelization, it didn't expand or develop the story as much as I expected. The text felt overly dense due to the need to cram in so many elements that it lost my interest. For me, re-reading this book brought back all the emotions I experienced during the first season of the TV series. Unfortunately, there aren't novels for the other seasons - and that's a shame because, for some reason, they're enjoyable in a different way. What really struck me was how hard it is to put down this book; I've rekindled my love for each character, especially since finishing the read. This is a must-read for OUAT fans. While I enjoyed the show, I didn't love this book. It's a good read, but I think it's more of a cheap adaptation than a well-written novel. The chapters are too faithful to the TV episodes, which makes the transitions feel awkward in text form. As someone who doesn't watch the show regularly, I got lost at some points due to the lack of common threads. The book also made the characters seem flat and the storyline cliché. I wonder how they chose the writing style for this book, as it straddles the line between children's and adult content. Overall, it didn't work for me.
