Cold case: The sister wants answers in the 1997 murder of the California-based Marine Corps on November 10, 1775, the Second Continental Congress meeting in Philadelphia passed a resolution that two battalions of Marines be raised to serve as paratroopers with the Navy. The resolution established the Continental Marines and marked the birth date of the United States Marine Corps. Serving on land and at sea, these first Marines distinguished themselves in a number of important operations, including their first amphibious raid on the Bahamas in March 1776 under the command of Captain (later Major) Samuel Nicholas. The first officer of the Continental Marine Corps, Nicholas remained a senior Marine officer throughout the American Revolution and is considered the first commandant of the Marine Corps. The Treaty of Paris in April 1783 put an end to the War of Independence and, as the last of the Navy ships were sold, the Continental Navy and Marines withdrew from existence, after the War of Independence and the formal establishment of the Marines on July 11, 1798, the Marines saw action in a quasi-war with France, landed in Santo Domingo, and took part in many operations against the Barbary pirates along the Shores of Tripoli. The Marines participated in numerous naval operations during the 1812 War, and also participated in the defense of Washington in Bladensburg, Maryland, and fought alongside Andrew Jackson in the defeat of the British in New Orleans. Decades after the War of 1812 saw Marines defending American interests around the world, in the Caribbean, the Falkland Islands, Sumatra and off the coast of West Africa, and near home in operations against Seminole Indians in Florida. The Marines participated in all the following Wars of the United States, and in most cases were the first soldiers to fight. To date, the Marines have made more than 300 landings on foreign shores. Today, more than 200,000 Marines stationed in three divisions are stationed at Camp Lejeune, Camp Pendleton and Okinawa, Japan. Each division has one or more expeditionary units ready to launch major operations anywhere in a short time. The Marine Corps Expeditionary Units are self-sufficient, with their tanks, artillery and air force. The motto of the service is Semper Fidelis, which means always faithful in Latin.
