How to Be a More Loving Church

- I. Celebrate Diversity: A thriving church mirrors the diverse body of Christ (I Corinthians 12:12), where each member is unique and plays a vital role. True diversity isn't mere tolerance; it's active appreciation and celebration of each individual unique backgrounds, experiences, and gifts.
- 2. Forgive: Conflicts are inevitable, but our response shapes our community. Following Matthew 18:15-17, approach disagreements humbly, seeking reconciliation and restoration. Forgiveness is the cornerstone of Christian faith. As Christ forgave us, we too must forgive one another (Colossians 3:13). Holding onto resentment hinders growth and unity. Forgiveness isn't condoning wrong actions, but releasing bitterness and anger, paving the way for healing and reconciliation.
- **3. Humble Service:** Jesus' act of washing His disciples' feet exemplifies humble service (John 13:14-15). Do the work that others would think is beneath them.
- **4. Pray Together:** Call others up to pray specifically for unity and harmony, in your church. This creates a powerful positive energy that spreads and brings change.
- **5. Be Hospitable:** Create a welcoming environment for newcomers, ensuring they feel valued and supported. A warm welcome fosters belonging and encourages deeper connections.
- **6. Uplift Each Other:** Let your words be sources of encouragement and inspiration (Proverbs 16:24). Build each other up. Speak life into others by offering affirmation and support. This strengthens community.
- 7. Active Listening: Practice active listening with empathy, genuinely hearing and understanding others' perspectives, as exemplified by Jesus (Luke 7:37-50). People will respect and trust you more for listening to them than for preaching to them.
- **8. Support the Vulnerable:** Offer strength and hope to the weak. Support and give more attention to those who are weaker and struggling, reminding them of God's unwavering faithfulness (Colossians 2:23)
- **9. Expressing Gratitude:** Express gratitude for the talents and contributions of others. (Philippians 1:3-5). Acknowledging each other's strengths builds appreciation and strengthens community bonds.
- **10. Share Burdens:** Offer practical and emotional support to those facing challenges, demonstrating Christian love, and reflecting Christ's sacrificial character (Galatians 6:2).
- **II.Accountability:** Hold each other accountable in love, promoting spiritual growth and holiness (James 5:16). Accountability, approached with grace and understanding, results in mutual growth and community.
- **12. Peacemaking:** Seek peace and pursue it, embodying the spirit of the Beatitudes (Matthew 5:9). Peacemaking requires effort.
- **13. Encouraging Spiritual Growth:** The church can grow only if its members grow. Growth is not the job of the pastor. Great sermons are not sufficient to grow any church. We all need to support and encourage one another's faith journey by deliberately helping each other grow. Do not hide your struggles and testimonies. Help people go through what you yourself have gone through.
- **14. Sacrificial Love:** Go out of your way for each other. Love till it hurts. This will provoke others to love, and the world will be drawn to the church when they see our sacrificial love.
