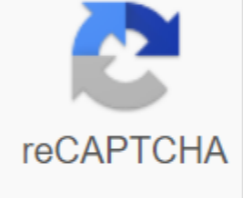

It can also be used for actions occurring one by one or in the middle of another. Form a simple past for irregular verbs, use past form (see list of irregular verbs, 2nd column). For the usual verbs, just add ed.
