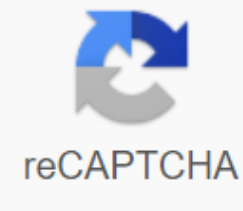




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Sports coach recommendation letter

Colleges ask for all different numbers of letters of recommendation. Each college sets its own policy, so it's always a good idea to double-check every school on your list to make sure you understand exactly what it wants. Typically, colleges want you to send a letter of recommendation from your counselor. They can also ask for one, two or, in rare cases, three letters from your teachers. This guide will follow a variety of guidelines so you know how many recommendations to collect when applying to colleges. First, let's look at different options. How many letters of recommendation are required for schools? You may need zero to four letters of recommendation. As mentioned above, most colleges want to see at least grades from your school counselor. In addition, many colleges, especially those that choose on the basis of academic merit, seek one or two teacher recommendations. Few colleges want to see three; Usually you only need three recs if you are applying to a military school. To find information about your specific colleges of interest, you can look at their reception websites. If you're using a shared app, your app should also be customized for each school and its expectations. While this guide does not cover every college in the US (there are thousands!), it will go to some popular schools and their recommendation requirements letters. Let's start with schools that have minimum requirements and work our way up to schools with the most. You're not on the hook for letters of recommendation in these schools. Popular schools with no recommendations there are some schools, including competitive ones, that do not require any letters of recommendation at all. Some may have a general no-river letter policy, but still advise you to check with your specific department or program. Others may ask you to send a letter of recommendation later this year. Some of you reading this may breathe a sigh of relief, while others may want to send rivers a letter and be disappointed. If you fall into the last group, should you send your email (s) anyway? Again, it is always a good idea to check your school's website for information or call the waiting room directly for advice. Some schools will read your emails if you want to send them, while others are pretty adamant about not sending any. Here are a few schools that, generally speaking, do not require letters of recommendation: Penn State University (unless specified in the program) UCLA Schools University of Texas at Washington now for schools that require one letters -- but only from your adviser. If you apply to any of the schools below, then a trip to your management department is fine. Popular schools that require one counselor's recommendation and no Recommendations These schools just want to see an assessment from your school counselor. As you can see, most of these schools are open to you sending teacher grades if you think it will be useful for your app. College of William and Mary (teacher recommendation is optional) Georgia Institute of Technology (teacher evaluation is recommended but not required) James Madison University (teacher recommendation is optional) University of Richmond If you decide to send a teacher rec when required, make sure that this is a strong, substantial letter that you feel will really help your candidacy. The general requirement of many four-year colleges is one consultant's recommendation and one teacher's recommendation. The following schools want you to send two letters of recommendation, as evidenced by the diesmbodied floating hand. Popular schools that require one counselor and one teacher recommendations These schools want to see one letter from your school counselor and teacher. The University of Delaware (one required, assumes that most applicants submit more than one letter) Georgia Tech Mills College NYU University of Maryland Wake Forest University More selective colleges typically require a letter from a rec counselor and two teacher recommendations letters. Check out some popular schools with this requirement below. Most college entrants are high school seniors, and most college application counseling there is directed at them. But as for schools that require two letters, do they have any requirements about who exactly you are asking to recommend you? Guidelines for your two teacher recommendations in terms of who you ask, colleges usually ask you to provide a range of perspectives, like a single letter from a science teacher or maths teacher and one from a humanities or social studies teacher (this includes technical schools like MIT and CalTech). Another general policy is that the school leaves the choice to you. Either way, you should ask two teachers from the main courses. If you are applying to an art or performance school such as Juilliard or the New England Conservatory, one of your letters should be an artistic recommendation from a private studio teacher, conductor, coach, or artistic mentor. As you've seen above, a few select schools, such as Dartmouth, Davidson and Wheaton, receive specific recommendations about additional peers or pastoral recommendations, but these are definitely exceptions. Now that you have a sense of college that wants two teacher recommendations, take a look at the few who want three (FYI, they're all military schools). Military schools that require one counselor and three teacher recommendations These schools also require nomination from a congressman, who is essentially considered another recommendation, resulting in a number required to five! U.S. Naval Academy U.S. Naval Academy (mathematics, English teacher and blue and gold officer) U.S. Marine Corps (West Point) Above, we briefly touched on whether or not you should send a letter, even if your school does not require it. On a similar note, should you ever send an additional email? Additional! Additional! Read everything about me! Can you send additional letters of recommendation? In terms of logistics, you should be able to send an additional letter of recommendation by mail or assign an additional recommender to your school application or general application. Many schools allow this option, but you have to be careful and make sure you understand your school's opinion about sending additional materials. Each has its own position on additional letters. If your school allows this, you'll want to make sure that the extra email adds something substantial to your app and comes from a reputable reputable as a community leader or spiritual leader with whom you have worked closely. Another circumstance in which an additional letter can be a good idea is if you attend a huge school and have not recognized your teachers or counselor very well. Again, make sure to learn about your school's policy. You don't want to play into the old confessions saying: The thicker the file, the thicker the baby. Admission officers usually don't look gentle on too much extra material. Instead of helping your application, excessive extra may just end up raising red flags about the strength of your candidacy. While studying the requirements of your colleges is an important first step in planning your letters of recommendation, there are several other factors that require your attention. Before inviting your recommendations to submit your emails online, you should be thoughtful about who you ask and how you make your enquiries. Be sure to ask the teachers of basic subjects who know you well, and give them all the necessary information at least a month in advance, if not in the spring of the junior year. To get the best email, some of this information needs to be a detailed summary and a show-off sheet. You can also make an appointment with teachers and counselors to talk about your goals and what you would like them to be included in your letter.
