Financial Year Report 2023
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ABSTRACT

The year 2023 began with stress but concluded on a high note. Schools reopened in 2022 after two long years of COVID closures. However, the start of the new year revealed that some schools were not as good as we had anticipated. Many teachers had changed careers, leaving a gap of inexperienced staff. Additionally, there were alarming rumors of mistreatment of some children in school, prompting us to take swift action. In Jinja, we relocated over 100 children to another school, which posed a challenge in finding a facility that could accommodate so many while staying within our budget. Similarly, in Kampala, we had concerns regarding the management of a specific school, leading us to transfer around 50 of our children to a different institution with which we had a longer partnership.

Our founder, Stella, made four trips to Uganda to address all issues related to the schools and resolve misunderstandings within the team and community. Thankfully, we established transparent communication among all parties involved. We were also able to continue our additional programs.

A significant highlight was the construction of a school dormitory in Jinja, sponsored by “das Freiheitspaket.” We also received through fundraisers organised on the “Nomad Cruise” donations for extra computers and school sweaters for the kids.

In April and October, we organized Social Impact Trips with Stella, during which several sponsors visited the children they support. Among them was Serena Martinaux, who captured the beautiful photographs featured in this report. Additionally, Rudiger Walzer, the founder of our partner organization “Wir Helfen Sehen,” came to Uganda to advance our Eye Program.

Several children graduated this year, finding jobs and serving as a testament to the success of our initiatives. We did not enroll any new children in 2023 due to rising school fees and the necessity for many to attend boarding school. Consequently, we allocated \$20,000 from our general donations to ensure that all our children could remain in school. We are proud to report that all 485 sponsored children successfully continued their education.

Consequently, we allocated \$20,000 from our general donations to ensure that all our children could remain in school. We are proud to report that all 485 sponsored children successfully continued their education.

Our Small Business Loan program remained active, providing new loans to beneficiaries. The Music Program in Jinja thrived, featuring a blend of modern and traditional instruments, while in Kampala, we focused solely on traditional instruments. Both Kampala and Jinja continued to offer after-school Computer lessons. Our Nutrition Program maintained its Weekly Meals initiative. We progressed with our Local Leadership Program in collaboration with Dutch Business Consultant Joelle, welcoming volunteer Jennifer Dietz, who provided one-on-one coaching to the team. Finally, we successfully selected new students for the Optician School in partnership with Wir Helfen Sehen e.V., distributed glasses to children, and arranged visits to the Eye Hospital once again.

We remain deeply grateful to our supporters, whose generosity and belief in our cause make all our successes possible. Together, we are building a brighter future for these children, one filled with hope, opportunity, and endless possibilities. With this strong foundation, we are ready to embrace the challenges and triumphs of the coming year, confident in the knowledge that our shared vision will guide us forward.

A Recap of Our 2023 Achievements. Here are some of our highlights:

- We have changed over 150 of our children to better schools.
- We enlarged our Computer and Music program.
- We continued with our local leadership program and coaching of our team.
- We had Serena Martinaux visiting us who captured beautiful photographs that we can use for our reports and social media
- Rudiger Walzer, the founder of our partner organization “Wir Helfen Sehen,” came to Uganda to advance our Eye Program.
- We hosted a small Social Impact Trip for our sponsors to Uganda in April and October
- We have received several day-visitors throughout the year who wanted to learn more about 22STARS and our projects.
- We had 485 sponsored kids in our program.
- Founder Stella visiting Uganda four times, with workshops to strengthen the team.
- We started to build a dormitory in Uganda for our kids that need boarding section thanks to das “Freiheitspaket.de”.
- We got laptops and school sweaters for the children thanks to the “Nomad Cruise”.

Our total income in 2023 was € 281.440,33 and our cost were € 331.592,59. Our total assets and liabilities are € 35.424,76. Compared to 2022, there was a small increase in donations, even though we also had several sponsors who had to cancel their long-term sponsorship. We have spent more money in 2023 than what came in, because in 2022 we had money reserved that could only be spent on our projects in 2023.

In total, we raised € **108.771.34 through one-time donations**, of which we spend €138.592,09 on our programs. We kept € 34.470,04 as reservation for the year 2024 to pay our recurring program costs, already planned expenses and to have enough money aside for meals during another lockdown emergency crisis. We raised money for certain causes through specific campaigns that we set up through *Donorbox*. We had a campaign for gifts from the sponsors for their child, Overhead Costs, Christmas gifts, Weekly Meals, and several health campaigns for the children. We have received a couple of larger donations. Our biggest donation came from the *Freiheitspaket.de* and the fundraiser they have set up for us, collecting a total of 36.422.23 euro. And *Nomad Cruise* held a fundraiser collecting 15.607,64. We also received a donation from the German charity “*Wir Helfen Sehen E.v.*”, of € 6,075.00 which was specifically for our Eye-care Program.

We received € **172.668,99 from our long-term sponsors** for the children they sponsor. We spend € 193,000.50 on the children’s education in 2023. This was a bit more this year since the schools increased their rates. In addition, we had paid a part of term 1 2024 in December 2023. We remained hence with € 775,48 for 2024 to be paid for future school terms in 2024. We also had to use € **20.000** from our general donations for school fees in 2023 to make sure all kids could stay in school. Our total reservation for 2024 is € **35.424,765**.

Compared to 2022 we raised a little bit more, mostly thanks to the fundraiser of the *Freiheitspaket.de* and some sponsors who increased their donations. The workload for the 22STARS Foundation kept increasing this year even though schools opened, because we continued with our additional programs at our childcare centers, such as our Computer, Music, Small Business, Leadership and Nutrition Program. To keep our overhead costs as low as possible, we work as much as possible with volunteers and freelancers. And *Stella Airoidi* still does a lot of work as she is willing to do it for a very minimal rate. We set up specific fundraisers to recruit donors who are willing to donate specifically for our overhead costs. Since these costs are quite unpopular fundraising topics, but very necessary to keep the foundation growing. We are glad that we received specific donations for these, so we can assure that we keep growing in a healthy way and can spend the donations of our fundraisers and sponsorship money fully on the programs in Uganda.

Donors and sponsors, you made a huge impact in 2023

- Education program (Child-Sponsorship):
 - 485 sponsored children who received an education.
- Computer program:
 - A full year computer training, paying materials and teachers for our kids in Kampala and in Jinja.
 - We bought 16 student computers for Jinja
 - We bought 8 student computers for Kampala
- Music program:
 - Music training, paying materials and 2 teachers for the full year in Jinja to teach guitar, drums, and keyboard.

- Eye-care Program:
 - 4 students were sent to an Optician School and all costs were paid for them.
 - 49 Kids were sent to the Eye Hospital for treatment
 - Glasses for 9 kids
- Healthcare (&Basic Needs) Program:
 - Various smaller treatments for around 100 children.
 - Bigger medical treatments for 12 kids
 - 10 Mattresses for the children.
 - Extra support for children who became orphans.
- Extra Education Program:
 - Holiday studies for 81 children that struggle in school.
 - 300 Sunday outfits for the children in Kampala.
 - 220 Saturday outfits for the children in Jinja.
 - 76 School Sweaters for the Kampala kids.
 - Dormitory for our Jinja kids
- Leadership Program:
 - On side Young Leadership workshops with Joelle for the teenagers during their holidays in Kampala. The teenagers ended the sessions by cleaning up all the trash in Acholi Quarter and giving back to their communities.

Our small business committee, formed in 2022, has flourished beyond expectations. Led by Sam, with Susan providing translations into Luo, we have effectively distributed loans ranging from 50 to 500 euros to beneficiaries. The collaboration with the local council has ensured safety and support for our initiatives, and we are proud to announce that we have successfully distributed loans for the eighth time.

As we look forward to building a permanent kitchen at our center, the women are currently preparing meals in a temporary kitchen, showcasing their resilience and adaptability. Our commitment to providing nutritious meals remains unwavering, although we have had to adapt our offerings due to rising costs. The weekly lunches in Kampala and Jinja remain a highlight for the children, with beans and rice being staples, complemented by meat and vegetables once a month.

Additionally, Jennifer Dietz continued to provide one-time coaching sessions to our Ugandan team on the ground, focusing on strengthening their communication skills.

Education remains a shining beacon of hope. We are excited to announce that all our students successfully passed the Primary 7 exams, enabling them to advance to secondary school. In January, we received the results for the Primary Leaving Examinations (PLE), which serves as a crucial transition from primary to secondary education. We felt immense pride and joy as every one of our Jinja 13 sponsored students not only passed but excelled. Among them, three students—Kisakye Miriam, Sanya Eliot, and Kaleebi Joseph Derrick—achieved the highest honors with first-grade scores. Additionally, five students earned second grades, while the rest performed admirably with third-grade results. This achievement paves the way for a brighter future for our young learners, as they all qualified for secondary education.

Similarly, the start of the year in Kampala was marked by preparations for the new school year. The PLE results released at the end of January showcased an outstanding performance from our 13 sponsored students, who mirrored Jinja's success by all passing and qualifying for secondary school.

Among these students is Derrick, the son of Susan, who has completed his videography production course and is eager to launch his own photo and video studio. With a little support for his business, Derrick is well on his way to realizing his dreams.

2. April, May, June; Progress and Empowerment in Jinja and Kampala.

As we reflect on the second trimester of 2023, it is heartening to witness the significant strides made in both Jinja and Kampala. The completion of term one and the commencement of term two marked a time of growth and opportunity for our students, enriching their educational experiences and personal development.

In Jinja, the enthusiasm of primary school students was palpable as they wrapped up term one by April 28th, with secondary schools following suit by May 5th. The distribution of report cards was a moment of pride, shared with our sponsors, who play a vital role in supporting our mission. Evening computer literacy classes made a strong return, alongside the reintroduction of music classes, providing children with avenues to explore their creativity while acquiring valuable skills.

Parent engagement remained a cornerstone of our efforts, with meetings held in both Jinja and Kampala. These gatherings emphasized the importance of parental responsibilities, adherence to program terms, and the power of collaboration between parents and the foundation. Topics such as saving groups and shared responsibilities were discussed, fostering a community spirit that is essential for our collective success.

Nutrition continues to be a priority in our programs, with both locations actively providing balanced meals to our sponsored children. In Kampala, the initiative to serve Sunday lunches to 143 children has shown remarkable outcomes in improving their health and dietary balance. Additionally, our boarding school students, thanks to Susan's commitment, now also benefit from this program through weekly lunches delivered directly to their schools.

However, the trimester was not without its challenges. Health concerns arose, particularly in Jinja, where severe malaria cases necessitated swift medical attention. Our foundation took proactive measures, ensuring that children received the care they needed, with follow-ups established to monitor their recovery and well-being.

In addition, a landslide in Kampala led to the collapse of several homes in the community. Fortunately, one of our sponsors, Jascha Lang, responded swiftly to our fundraiser, ensuring we had sufficient funds to relocate the affected families and address their basic needs for three months while they began to rebuild their lives.

As we look back on the recent trimester, it's heartwarming to witness the remarkable strides made by our sponsored children in Jinja and Kampala. In Jinja, the academic year concluded with two examinations, marking an end to the primary school term two. Private schools wrapped up their sessions early, while public schools adhered to the Ministry of Education and Sports' schedule, officially closing on August 25th. The dedication of both students and teachers shone through, with evening music and computer classes continuing beyond regular hours, enriching the educational experience and fostering a love for learning.

In Kampala, our ongoing commitment to monitoring the well-being of sponsored children at Hope Land Boarding School was evident. Regular visits allowed us to assess their nutritional needs, health, and academic progress. The return to school in September marked a significant milestone, made possible by the unwavering support of our sponsors. While some children had to leave due to relocations, the spirit of community and collaboration among parents remained strong, as they engaged in discussions around their children's education and well-being.



The importance of nutrition cannot be overstated, especially for our growing children. Our nutrition program in Jinja and Kampala ensured that every sponsored child received balanced meals filled with essential nutrients. Hot meals provided a crucial foundation for their health, allowing them to thrive both academically and physically.


In Kampala, we are thrilled to share that Anena Beatrice received the support needed for her goiter surgery, funded entirely by the 22stars Foundation. Such initiatives not only improve individual health but also enhance the community's collective well-being. Our eye-care program enabled 17 children to receive essential check-ups, ensuring that their vision is not a barrier to their education.

The essence of our work lies in fostering a sense of community. In July, we welcomed Joelle and her family, creating a memorable Saturday filled with joy and connection for the children. This event was a reminder of the power of unity and the importance of nurturing relationships within our community.



Additionally, our successful maize harvest has empowered our nutrition program, allowing us to provide posho and further support our children's dietary needs. Fundraising efforts for dormitory construction in Kampala's Acholi quarter are underway, aimed at providing safe spaces for our orphaned children during school holidays, emphasizing our commitment to supporting them in every possible way.

Since its inception of our maize field project in August 2020, the Maize Field Project has been growing steadily and helping our communities and providing posho for our weekly meals. This transformative endeavor began with a small investment of four million Ugandan shillings, which paved the way for a beautiful journey, that started with ten hectares of land.

Phase 1: (2020): In this initial phase in August 2020, our commitment to making a difference in the community took root. We received a generous contribution of four million Ugandan shillings, which we invested in our first maize cultivation. Our maize garden flourished, yielding 3,500 kilograms of maize flour - an equivalent of 7 million Ugandan shillings. This way we could save money and be self-sufficient within our communities in the maize production.

Phase 2 (2021-2022): in 2021 we received a more substantial investment of 7.4 million Ugandan shillings for our maize project. This phase was designed to support two seasons of maize cultivation. The first season, which spanned from August to December 2021, resulted in a harvest of 4,000 kilograms of maize grains - 40 bags! The subsequent phase in 2022 yielded 3,500 kilograms of maize flour, further enhancing the project's impact.

Phase 3: (2023): In January 2023, the preparation for a new maize field harvest commenced, and we started with land clearance and plowing. A total of 8 hectares were identified and divided into two separate pieces of land, each measuring four hectares. The planting season kicked off in March, followed by another round of planting in early April. In August, the first harvest from the March planting yielded 40 bags, equivalent to four tons of maize grains. These grains were processed into 3 tons of maize flour, ready to be taken to hot hour projects in Jinja and Kampala. Our journey continues as we prepare for the next harvesting, scheduled for late September.

As we move forward, the Young Leadership Program continues to cultivate the next generation of leaders. Guided by mentors, our young participants are honing skills that will serve them and their communities well into the future. The Young Leadership Project aims to uncover and develop inherent leadership skills within individuals, emphasizing teamwork and stepping out of comfort zones. It challenges the notion that leadership is exclusive, encouraging participants to recognize and utilize their unique talents. Over six days, participants engage in activities that empower them to work on a community project, enhancing their leadership abilities and inspiring change. Success is measured by their awareness of personal growth and application in daily life. The program envisions a train-the-trainer model, enabling participants to mentor future groups, creating a ripple effect in developing young leaders. Gratitude is expressed to trainers, organizers, and donors for their support.

Our Young Leadership Project is about revealing & developing leadership skills that are already present and to use them together with each other as a team. Growing into Leadership has a lot to do with daring to make mistakes, leaving your comfort zone and entering the growth zone.

Everyone is a leader, and the key is to recognize and utilize individual talents. Many believe leadership is out of reach, but this program aims to empower participants over six days

through learning and engaging activities, helping them discover their unique abilities and contribute to their community. Participants will work on impactful community projects, inspiring change and becoming role models. Success will be measured by their awareness and application of learned skills in daily life. The program envisions a train-the-trainer model, allowing successful participants to teach others, creating a snowball effect in cultivating young leadership skills.

Ambassador Updates: Our ambassador Steffi Oeffner recently visited us in Uganda. Additionally, Ambassador Daniela Beck shared her experiences during the Social Impact Trip at “Die Wichtigste Stunde,” where she emphasized her long-term sponsorship of a remarkable girl named Kemisa in Jinja. Meanwhile, our ambassadors from das Freiheitspaket.de, Jan Doering and Timo Eckhardt, mobilized their community to raise an impressive 35k to support the construction of a dormitory for our school children. As more of our kids mature and can no longer stay in their overcrowded homes, the necessity for boarding becomes evident. Unfortunately, the schools we partner with currently lack the facilities to accommodate all students, which is why we are building a dormitory for them. Furthermore, Stella spoke at a conference hosted by Staatenlos about the privileges she has experienced in her life and how to inspire others to utilize their privileges to improve the world and raise awareness for 22STARS.

We also handed out new letters from the sponsors to the kids they sponsor. The letters really inspire them and the kids write back a reply which we scan in and email to their sponsor.

As we reflect on the past trimester, it's heartwarming to witness the tremendous strides made in our education, nutrition, health, and community engagement programs across Jinja and Kampala. Each achievement, each smile, and each act of kindness reminds us of the profound impact we can have when we come together for a common cause.

In Jinja, the education program has been bustling with activity, particularly during the end-of-year national examinations. In October, secondary students began their assessments, while Primary Seven candidates followed suit in early November. The results were encouraging, with most students successfully promoted to the next grade, a testament to their hard work and dedication.

Evenings were filled with music and computer classes, enriching the curriculum and fostering creativity among the students. In Kampala, the celebration of the Primary Leaving Examinations on November 11 marked a joyful culmination of the students' efforts. With dedication prayers and a festive party, families came together to honor the achievements of their children, creating lasting memories and a sense of community.

In October, Stella returned to Uganda with several visitors, including Rüdiger Walzer, the founder of the Wir Helfen Sehen foundation, which supports our Eye Program. Rüdiger previously visited us in 2018 and 2019, during which he explored the 22stars projects and

identified the need for improved eye health care. This led to the establishment of the Wir Helfen Sehen foundation which has since provided eye care to thousands of individuals. He has conducting eye tests for our children in Kampala alongside Martina, Theresa, and our own 22stars optician school graduates, Brenda and Simon, who trained at the optician school in Masaka. The warmth of visitors from Europe infused our programs with new energy and insights. Their participation in community activities brought a sense of global solidarity, reminding us that we are all part of a larger family dedicated to making a difference.

We surprised Susan Laker to celebrate her 41st birthday. At the time, Susan was already in her pajamas, believing that Stella had gone to the airport in the evening and left the country. However, Stella extended her stay by an extra day just to celebrate with Susan. Susan is our project leader in Kampala and the pioneer of 22stars. She has always been a force of nature, and Stella vividly recalls the day they first met in 2009. From the very beginning, Susan's vibrant energy, intelligence, humor, and undeniable passion captivated Stella's heart.

Our nutrition program has continued to make significant strides in both Jinja and Kampala, ensuring that children receive nourishing meals that are vital for their growth and health. In Kampala, hot meals were served every Sunday, reaching 134 children at the office and another 130 in boarding



schools. The variety of nutritious foods, including beans, vegetables, and posho, not only satisfied hunger but also contributed to their overall well-being.

The collaboration between Jinja and Kampala has been remarkable, as evidenced by the transfer of 1229 kilograms of maize grains, which were transformed into 600 kilograms of posho for the children. This initiative showcases the power of teamwork and generosity in nourishing the next generation.



Their generosity in providing sanitary pads and scholastic materials not only enriched the lives of the children but also reinforced the importance of community involvement and support.

Our computer classes in Kampala and Jinja are thriving, especially since we've acquired additional laptops for students. We envision every sponsored 22STARS child becoming proficient in computer usage, enabling them to thrive in today's digital landscape. We are passionately promoting the creation of knowledge societies where the power of information and communication allows individuals to access the resources they need to enhance their lives and reach their full potential. To cover the salaries of our computer teachers in both Kampala and Jinja, as well as to print exercise materials.







Notes to the balance sheet and the profit and loss account

General

The balance sheet and the profit and loss account has been set up by the executive chairman of the Foundation Stella Airoidi and has been checked by all other board members and the Uganda team. The annual year report is set up under Dutch guidelines of “Richtlijn C1 „Organisaties-zonder-winststreven” van de Raad voor de Jaarverslaggeving voor kleine rechtspersonen.”

Currency

All amounts are in € unless stated otherwise. In our excel sheets and administration we keep track of the payments in Uganda Shilling prices (UGX) as well with the corresponding actual exchange rates to €, so that we always have the actual amount paid in euro's.

General principles for the preparation of the financial statements

The valuation of assets and liabilities and the determination of result are based on historical costs. Unless stated otherwise at the relevant balance sheet, the assets and liabilities are recognized at nominal value. Income and expenses are allocated to the year to which they relate.

Principles for the valuation of assets and liabilities

Claims

Claims are recognized at nominal value less the provisions deemed necessary for the risk of un collectability. These provisions are determined on the basis of individual assessment. The term of the receivables included under the current assets is less than one year.

Capital

Reservation programs: If donors indicate that they want to spend their donation on a certain project, a reservation is made for this at the expense of the equity. This is in particular the case with regards to the long-term sponsors who sponsor a child long-term and hence pay already for future school terms of a child. And this is also the case with donors who wish to support a certain cause or project. As far as possible, efforts will be made to meet the wishes of the donors, but the foundation reserves the right to use the reserved amounts differently if it deems this desirable. The status of these reservations is inventoried annually.

Income

Income means the donations received in the year under review. We basically divide our Income in two types of Income. The first one is from **General Donations** which are received through our campaigns on Donorbox, through our bank account and PayPal account. Most of the time these donations are made one time and even when they are recurring, they could be stopped anytime. The second one is from **Sponsors**, who usually make long-term donations for the support of their sponsored child to enable him or her to go to school. Payments for this have been made through PayPal, Donorbox and direct bank transfer. These sponsorships are recurring and whenever a sponsor drops out, we put the child back on our website and try to find as soon as possible a new sponsor.

For the **ANBI Standard Requirement Form** we also highlighted the following categories: income from grants and income from donations. Additionally, we split the income over donations made by private people, by charities and by businesses.

Cost

We basically divide our costs over our two income streams: general donations from donors and sponsorship donations from our sponsors.

Our costs were made towards our programs in Uganda. These were the following programs: Education (Sponsorship) Program, Nutrition Program, Small Business Program, Health Program, Music Program, Computer Program and Local Leadership Program.

Within the **Education Program** the costs we have are related to paying the schools of the children, which includes the costs of school fees, registration fees, development fees, tour fees and school uniform fees. Additional necessary costs are payment to the project leaders in Uganda to collect all information of the children and guide them during our After School programs, which includes also providing them with meals during the work they are doing, the rent of the children center space where all our children come together for homework classes, weekend meals and other activities, the transport –to bring the children to school; the internet data to send information about the children over and the payment of part of the costs made by our Executive Director to manage the education program, the payment of for our Virtual Assistant, who assists in managing the education program by checking invoices, communicating with the Uganda team and sponsors.

Within the **Nutrition Program** the costs we have are related to the weekly meals that we provide to the children, as well as to extra food which we give by times to the families and the cooking materials and plates and cups for the children. By times we also need to buy extra plates or cups for the children, which we then include. Also since 2021 we have invested in a Maizefield and in 2023 we have built a kitchen for Kampala which falls under this program.

Within the **After School Program** the costs we have are related to sport activities, buying of books and toys, buying of gifts for the children from their specific sponsor, a x-mas party and x-mas gifts, holding a parent conference, renting the children's crèche in Kampala and Jinja

and buying the materials for the children's center. The children's center is very important as we cook for the children their meals over there and it is the place where they come together to eat. In addition, they come also after school to the center and in their holidays to eat, play and learn. We also buy for each new sponsored child a 22STARS "Education is the Key" outfits, so that the kids have a sense of community feeling and we know more easily who part of 22stars is.

Within the **Small Business Program**, the costs we have are related to providing the entrepreneurship trainings and monitoring of the beneficiaries and in providing the micro-loans. Once the micro-loans are paid back we immediately keep re-investing them into the small business program.

Within the **Health Program** the costs we made related to medication and doctor visits of sick children. We have had several malaria cases and children who felt sick from worms. Additionally, we have costs related to basic needs, such as providing the families with mattresses, beds, blankets, and clothes, which all are required for them to stay healthy and safe. Part of our Health Program is also our Eye-care project, which is also a new program, our costs had relation to bringing children to the Eye-hospital and get their eyes checked. Costs involved the transport to the hospital and food and drinks during that day. As going and coming back would usually take up a full day. We have paid for the eye medication, glasses, and eye operations of several children. Additionally, 'WirhelfenSehen' covered costs to send 2 students to an Optician School in Masaka and covered cost for having the eye-care intern in Uganda. This program is sponsored by 'WirhelfenSehen.'

Within the **Computer Program**, the costs we have are related to providing computer training to the children in both our centers, Kampala and Jinja. Costs involve paying computer teachers, buying computers for the kids, printing materials for them and maintenance of the computer. We also bought a printer and projector.

Within the **Music Program** the costs we have are related to providing Music Lessons to the children in both our centers, Kampala and Jinja. Costs involve paying the music teachers, buying music instruments and dance outfits. In Jinja we have music lessons with modern instruments and traditional ones. In Kampala we only have traditional instruments.

Within the **Local Leadership Program**, the costs we made related to brining Joelle Verkooijen to Uganda to the workshops with the team on the ground as well as facilitating them remotely. We paid for Joelle's flight and accommodation in Uganda. And we paid her a small fee for facilitating and preparing all workshops. As for Joelle this is a heart project as it is for a good cause, she put a lot of hours volunteering in without getting anything paid.

Our **bank fees** remain relatively high as we receive most of our donations through platforms like Donorbox which charge a platform fee and a Stripe / PayPal payment fee. However, using such a platform helps us tremendously in fundraising and having immediately an overview of our donations available and sending out automatic payment reminders to our recurring subscribers. And also, many of our sponsors chose to cover these fees. Additionally, we also must pay a fee when withdrawing money in Uganda from the banks and when we send the money.

Other costs that we have are payments for a Virtual Assistant to help us managing the programs. Other costs we made were related to our website, paying the yearly fee for the website and services such as Canva and Mail chimp.

We also get specific donations in to cover our Overhead costs, to make sure that the other donations go completely to our programs.

For the **ANBI Standard Requirement Form** we also highlighted the following categories: the *donations that went to the Programs* in Uganda (which is the total program costs of the sponsorships to send the kids to school and the donations to the other programs); then. The donations that went in communication costs (for fundraising); then the donations that went into bank fees (financial expenses) and the donations that went into admin and vacatiegeld (other expenses).

We also like to highlight that our administration costs are still low, because the policy-making board members did not receive any payment for their work neither the costs they have made. Our board paid fully their own visit to Uganda and in addition sponsor several children and made various donations. Executive Chairman Stella Airoidi went the previous years a couple of times a year to Uganda and financed her own travel costs, for 2023 she declared the flight costs that she had made (accommodation, food, transport she still covered up herself). The board decided to hire her as freelancer to maintain the website and create the content for social media, blogs and reports, as other freelancers were charging much more money with way less knowledge regarding the cultural context. Other than that Stella volunteers for the Foundation around 20 hours a week on average. Besides Stella we started to work with a couple of new volunteers who have been helping us mainly with translations. However, it also costs a lot of time to manage the volunteers and by times they are unreliable with their work and deadlines. We keep on improving in 2024 the impact of Volunteers on our organization.

Accounts

Since April 2017, we opened a bank account with ABN AMRO for the Foundation: Stichting 22STARS NL98 ABNA 0247199222. For our donors of the group “Teller Fuer Teller” for the Weekly Meals we also opened this NL30ABNA0247241962 Foundation Bank Account, where they can make their specific donations for meals to. We also opened a PayPal account with address: info@foundation22stars.org We have an extensive excel sheet with all the donation information.

How we make the payments of our programs

Uganda is a cash society, hence when we pay for our programs in Uganda we usually do it the following way:

- Through withdrawing money at the ATM in Uganda with our Dutch ABN AMRO bank card, this is done by Stella Airoidi to pay for certain programs of the foundation as discussed with all board members and the Ugandan team. As Stella is at least 3 times a year in Uganda we use this method to make the larger payments towards the various schools where the children are going to. Also, the exchange rate is much better when we withdraw in Uganda than when we send the money with the bank.

- Direct Bank Transfer to the Ugandan Bank Account of our project leaders in Uganda. These are Susan Laker in Acholi Quarter in Kampala and Aidah Wafula for the project in Jinja. Susan is the leader of the local community based organization 'Shooting Stars' and Aidah of the local Community Based Organization 'Shining Stars', who are our partner organizations in Uganda. We only send money to the programs that will also directly be spend for which we receive the invoices. We keep track in excel of the exact amounts we send with the current exchange rates and the transaction fees and the causes. The money can only be used for the assigned causes. We then request the project leaders to send us the invoices of the purchased goods/activities and take pictures of what has been done. As Uganda is a cash society it is by times difficult to get a receipt from the local taxi's and motorbikes for the transport and also from food and second hand clothes and other products bought at the local markets. In this case, we still request to our local project leaders to write us an invoice stating that they have received the money and what the money has been used for and to provide us with pictures of the bought goods. As the project leaders know best what is needed in Uganda they are the ones who let us know their current program needs. We work with several independent persons assessing these needs as well to make sure it benefits the whole community.
- Whenever we must purchase something outside Uganda, for example in The Netherlands, we pay from our Dutch ABN AMRO bank account, or we use our PayPal account. As our Foundation has no credit card we also use by times the credit card of one of our board members to make certain purchases that are only possible to be made by credit card (such as payment for Mail-chimp (our newsletter software) and Strikingly (our website software).

Fundraising

To fundraise money for our donations we decided to use the payment platform Donorbox as it allows us to set up easy campaign for our specific needs. For our USA/UK donors we started to use Global Giving. We also had a couple of sponsors who set up a birthday fundraiser for us. We reached new sponsors thanks to several talks Stella Airoidi gave at online conferences in Europe such as the Nomad Base, Staatenlos and Citizen Circle and to the talks of Stefanie Oeffner at the tour of her boyfriend Nick Martin and our new ambassador Daniela Beck. All events and speaking engagements were fully financed by the board members themselves. Additionally, we had a few one-day visitors, who shared about us within their network. We also organized again a Social Impact Trip for Sponsors to come and visit us in Uganda for 10 days. We invested also more in our online presence by having videos of our projects made that explain what we are doing in Uganda and by having better high-quality pictures taken at our project. We also kept improving our website to generate more income.

Board changes

The board has been unchanged in 2023 to the previous year 2022.

This aims to help our team in Uganda produce better reports and proposals, allowing our Fundraising team to concentrate more on securing donations. However, this remains a work in progress, as the Uganda team still requires considerable guidance and support to manage their tasks effectively.

It's essential that they communicate the impact of their work clearly through pictures and data, so we can accurately present all the efforts we are undertaking in Uganda with the support from our donors and sponsors. For the upcoming year, we hope that school fee increases will be minimal and that our current long-term sponsors might consider boosting their contributions. Our goal is to ensure that even more children have access to education. Over the past few years, we have witnessed the significant difference education makes in the lives of these children. Education truly is the key to combating poverty and disease!
