



THE SEVEN BIBLICAL PRINCIPLES OF BUSINESS SUCCESS

1. SEEK GOD FIRST (DIVINE PRIORITY)

God honors effort that is consistent, disciplined, and excellent. (Proverbs 21:5).

4. BE A FAITHFUL STEWARD (MANAGE WELL WHAT YOU HAVE)

Before God increases, He examines stewardship. (1 Corinthians 4:2).

Principle: How you manage money, people, time, and resources determines your capacity for growth. Faithfulness precedes multiplication.

5. PRACTICE GENEROSITY (SOWING FOR INCREASE)

Kingdom growth operates on the principle of sowing and harvesting. (Luke 6:38).

Principle: Generosity is not loss—it is investment. Businesses that give (to people, community, and Kingdom work) create cycles of increase and favor.

6. BUILD RELATIONSHIPS AND WORK WITH CONNECTIONS (KINGDOM CONNECTIONS)

No business grows in isolation. (Proverbs 11:14).

Principle: Strategic relationships, mentorship, and collaboration open doors that effort alone cannot. God often sends growth through people.

7. WALK BY FAITH (TRUST GOD FOR EXPANSION)

At some point, growth requires stepping beyond what is currently possible or visible. (2 Corinthians 5:7).

Principle: Faith activates divine possibilities. Expansion, innovation, and breakthrough often require trusting God beyond current resources or conditions.
