"Do not abandon yourselves to despair. We are the Easter people and hallelujah is our song." ~ St. John Paul II

This month we celebrate Easter Sunday symbolizing the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The 40 days (about 1 and a half months) of the Lenten season leading up to Easter Sunday are times of fasting, repentance, and almsgiving. What did Pope John Paul II mean when he referred to us as 'Easter people'? On Sunday, November 30, 1986, when he visited Australia during a period in the middle of the Cold War, many wondered what he meant by 'Easter people' in his speech. The following excerpt sheds light on these words and helps us connect with his message:

We are aware of darkness and sin, of poverty and pain. But we know Jesus has conquered sin and passed through his own pain to the glory of the Resurrection. And we live in the light of his Paschal Mystery – the mystery of his Death and Resurrection. "We are an Easter People and Alleluia is our song!" We are not looking for a shallow joy but rather a joy that comes from faith, that grows through unselfish love, that respects the "fundamental duty of love of neighbour, without which it would be unbecoming to speak of Joy." We realize that joy is demanding; it demands unselfishness; it demands a readiness to say with Mary: "Be it done unto me according to thy word."

May his words resonate with us as we celebrate our Easter tradition on March 31st (see Lenten Schedule on last page of this issue). Please join us for all our Holy Week observances, including our Holy Saturday Easter basket blessing. If you have ever wondered about the traditional foods found in a Polish Easter basket and their symbolism, we share the diagram and explanations below:

THE TRADITIONAL POLISH EASTER BASKET

BUTTER (*Maslo*) • We often see butter formed into a lamb (*Baranek Wielkanocny*) or cross. It symbolizes the good will of Christ we should have toward all things.

EASTER BREAD (*Babka*) ● A round or long loaf topped with a cross or fish, symbolic of Jesus, who is the Bread of Life.

HORSERADISH *(Chrzan)* • This is symbolic of the Passion of Christ still in our minds.

EGGS (*Jajka and Pisanki*)• These are often decorated with symbols of Easter and represent new life and Christ's resurrection from the tomb.

SAUSAGE (*Kielbasa*)• This food is symbolic of God's favor and generosity.

HAM (*Szynka*)• This meat symbolizes great joy and abundance, and some prefer lamb or yeal.


SMOKED BACON (*Slonina*)• This represents the overabundance of God's mercy and generosity.

SALT (*Sol*) • It is a necessary element in our physical life, representing prosperity and justice and a time to remind us people are the flavor of the earth.

CHEESE (Ser) • This food symbolizes moderation Christians should have at all times.

CANDLE • A candle represents Christ as the Light of the World.

LINEN COVER • A linen or other cloth cover is placed over the top of the basket and removed in time for the priest's food blessing on Holy Saturday.

ST. MARY'S PREP & ST. JP II LITURGICAL CENTER SPONSOR DETROIT HISTORIC CHURCH PILGRIMAGE



On Saturday, January 27th, 40 enthusiastic Orchard Lake Schools employees and

friends embarked on an exciting pilgrimage to visit five magnificent historic Catholic churches in downtown Detroit. The pilgrimage began with a 9:00 AM Mass celebrated by Fr. Bernard Witek in our Shrine Chapel. Subsequently, tour participants boarded a bus bound for downtown Detroit. From beginning to end, the pilgrimage was religiously inspired to include Fr. Witek leading the recitation of the rosary on the way to Detroit and recitation of the Divine Mercy chaplet on the way back to OLS.

The pilgrimage included the Catholic Basilica of Ste. Anne de Detroit, Greektown's Old St. Mary's Catholic Church, Sweetest Heart of Mary Catholic Church, the Capuchin St. Bonaventure Catholic Church and Solanus Casey Center, and the

St. Joseph Catholic Shrine. Although every church visited was architecturally awesome and historically significant, perhaps the most spectacular and most beautifully and elaborately Christmas decorated was the Sweetest Heart of Mary Catholic Church on Russell Street, one of the oldest and grandest Polish Catholic churches in Detroit.

Upon seeing these churches, one cannot help but feel awestruck at the obvious deep faith that the hundreds of thousands of immigrants to this area sacrificed, so much of their time and money, to build such magnificent edifices to honor God.

This pilgrimage was months in the making. It was a very harmonious combined effort between the Prep and Liturgical Center. Maysa Anwar, the Information Technology teacher at the Prep, conceived the idea last October, and asked Joe Majcher, Liturgical Center Chairman, if the Liturgical Center would agree to advertise and permit ticket sales for the pilgrimage bus tour on its website.

Special thanks to Fr. Witek and Maysa Anwar for organizing this special day. We're also grateful for the Prep faculty, Ashley Yenor and Hannah Kenrick, for assisting in the effort, and the student volunteers, parish representatives, and Solanus Casey Center staff and volunteers, all of whom so graciously made this experience so memorable for all who participated. We look forward to this opportunity again next year in addition to offering other collaborations between the Prep and the St. John Paul II Liturgical Center.

Through the last 20 years of war, we have learned so many lessons about what it means to send an entire generation away to defend our great nation against those who may choose to do it harm. For many of us, this patriotism is often linked to a vision of watching the towers fall on 9/11. For those who were either not born yet, or were too young to remember what this felt like, that patriotism may not come so naturally. It is thanks to educators like you, who remind these children of the cost of true freedom, that gives me hope for the next generation.

The repercussions of the reality of what our veterans and first responders experience day in and day out is not always an easy discussion, especially not to school age children... in some cases, not even to adults. We are more than willing to send our young men and women to the frontlines so that we may live safely, and it is our responsibility to take care of them when they return home. For our veterans, this may be when they return from overseas, but often...the battle in their mind lives on long after they have returned from foreign soil. won the league going undefeated with a 10-0 record and Varsity won the league, also going undefeated with a 12-0 record.



💉 ST. JOHN PAUL II LITURGICAL CENTER UPDATE

This year the month of March ends with Holy Week, which is the most solemn of all weeks of the Liturgical Year, because it commemorates the final days of Our Lord's life. It opens with Palm Sunday, Jesus' final entrance into Jerusalem. The three days from the evening of Holy Thursday to the evening of Easter Sunday are referred to by different names as the Easter Triduum or Paschal Triduum. The word "triduum" comes from Latin and means "three days." These three-days are considered one great festival, a summit of the Liturgical Year and the culmination of the Paschal Mystery is Jesus' Resurrection, "therefore Easter is not simply one feast among others, but the 'Feast of feasts,' the 'Solemnity of solemnities." (The Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1169).

For St. John Paul II, the mystery of redemption celebrated in the Paschal Mystery was one of his core teachings and therefore his fist Encyclical Letter was Redemptor Hominis published on March 4, 1979. Let us read the first paragraphs below.



IN THE WORDS OF ST. JOHN PAUL II:

THE REDEEMER OF MAN, Jesus Christ, is the centre of the universe and of history. To him go my thoughts and my heart in this solemn moment of the world that the Church and the whole family of present-day humanity are now living. In fact, this time, in which God in his hidden design has entrusted to me, after my beloved Predecessor John Paul I, the universal service connected with the Chair of Saint Peter in Rome, is already very close to the year 2000. At this moment it is difficult to say what mark that year will leave on the face of human history or what it will bring to each people, nation, country and continent, in spite of the efforts already being made to foresee some events. For the Church, the People of God spread, although unevenly, to the most distant limits of the earth, it will be the year of a great Jubilee. We are already approaching that date, which, without prejudice to all the corrections imposed by chronological exactitude, will recall and reawaken in us in a special way our awareness of the key truth of faith which Saint John expressed at the beginning of his Gospel: "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us" (Jn 1:14), and elsewhere: "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life" (Jn 3:16).

We also are in a certain way in a season of a new Advent, a season of expectation: "In many and various ways God spoke of old to our fathers by the prophets; but in these last days he has spoken to us by a Son..." (Heb 1:1-2), by the Son, his Word, who became man and was born of the Virgin Mary. This act of redemption marked the high point of

the history of man within God's loving plan. God entered the history of humanity and, as a man, became an actor in that history, one of the thousands of millions of human beings but at the same time Unique! Through the Incarnation God gave human life the dimension that he intended man to have from his first beginning; he has granted that dimension definitively-in the way that is peculiar to him alone, in keeping with his eternal love and mercy, with the full freedom of God-and he has granted it also with the bounty that enables us, in considering the original sin and the whole history of the sins of humanity, and in considering the errors of the human intellect, will and heart, to repeat with amazement the words of the Sacred Liturgy: "O happy fault... which gained us so great a Redeemer!" (Exsultet at the Easter Vigil)




LITURGICAL CENTER HOSTS HEALING MASS & ADORATION

Recently, Fr. Bernard Witek arranged for Fr. Augustine Mundackatt, V.C., an internationally recognized Catholic priest, faith healer and inspiring homilist, to celebrate a Healing Mass, Adoration, and anointing on February 20 at 7:00 PM in the Archdiocesan Shrine of St. John Paul II. Fr. Mundackatt expressed how privileged he felt to be on campus where the great saint Pope John Paul II walked many years ago, and prayed at the relic of St John Paul II before Mass.

Fr. Mundackatt currently serves as the Global Evangelization Director and Counselor General of the Vincentian Congregation in charge of retreats and centers across the globe. Previously, he was editor of the *Vicar Provincial*, a popular Indian Catholic renewal magazine published in seven languages, and director of retreat centers in Calcutta, India. Responding to the world evangelization call of Pope John Paul II over 25 years ago, he has travelled to more than 40 countries preaching the Gospel. Throughout the course of his faithful ministry, numerous signs and healings have been reported.



During the enthusiastic Holy Mass, Fr. Mundackatt called upon the Holy Spirit to come down upon the congregation to heal not only physical ailments, but also social, family, and psychological problems. He also celebrated his Healing Mass and Adoration at five other local Catholic Churches in the Archdiocese within the 10 days following his visit to OLS, all just days before returning to India. We, at the OLS, were very fortunate to host his visit here. Over 300 faithful and fervent people from the surrounding area attended the February 20, 2023 event on campus. Participants left with a sense of peace and hope. It was indeed an inspiring and moving experience!



On February 14, the Polish Institute of Culture & Research was happy to receive back a group of eight paintings sent out for cleaning and restoration. The work was accomplished by Detroit's Conservation and Museum Services under the direction of master restorer Kenneth B. Katz. The eight works are some of the most important paintings in the Institute's collection, including two paintings by Zofia Stryjeńska, two by Wlastimil Hofman, and one by Jacek Małczewski.

One of the Hofman paintings was a recently discovered miniature winter landscape found amid some papers left at the Orchard Lake Schools by the late Msgr. Zdzisław Peszkowski, who taught theology and Polish at SS. Cyril & Methodius Seminary and St. Mary's College. He was a well-known faculty member for many years and a friend of the famous artist.

The conservation work was the result of a generous donation by the Mark Levandoski family. Institute staff are preparing a second group of paintings to go out for restoration in March, thanks again to our kind benefactors.

The restorers cleaned and re-varnished some of the paintings and did repairs on some of the original

frames. Stryjeńska's Adoration of the Shepherds was also strip lined, a process by which additional strips of canvas are added to reinforce fragile edges of a canvas. This allows the painting to be safely reframed in a way that prevents damage to the painted surfaces. Stryjeńska's painting is well-known and loved at the Orchard Lake Schools and has been used for Christmas cards and announcements for holiday programs for many years.


WELCOME, DR. ALINA KLIN

She is a member of many Polish organizations: first vice president of the Friends of Polish Art; director of the West Side Detroit Polish American Historical Society; and Kościuszko Foundation, Michigan Division; and member of the North American Association of Teachers of Polish.

In 1990-1992, Dr. Klin was first a writer and later the associate editor of the Polish Weekly/Tygodnik Polski. It was then that her interest in journalism and Polonia affairs developed.

Dr. Alina Klin is very much looking forward to working for the Polish Media Center as she hopes to chronicle our local Polish American life, as well as continue to research and highlight the importance of Polish contributions to the building of the "American dream."




