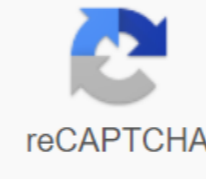




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Transitive and intransitive verbs worksheet with answers

In this transitive and untranslatable verb sheet, students must write T or I for transitive and non-translational verbs. As you know, transitive verbs act on the object. For example, in the sentence he played the piano, the verb played corresponds to the piano object. But for non-transitive verbs, these types of verbs do not belong to any objects. For example, in the sentence she slept all day, the verb slept does not coincide with any type of object. So let's put these concepts into practice with this transitive and untranslatable verb sheet. Is it a transitive verb (T) or a non-transitive verb (I)? Transitive and untranslatable verb table Answer to Key 1. When he arrived, no one was there to greet him. (I) 2. The train stopped abruptly. (I) The transitive and non-transitive verb sheet provides transitive and non-transitive exercises of the verb in order to learn to recognize the two functions of verbs. Leaf is one of the best ways to learn to recognize transitive and non-translational verbs. However, it is important to note these three tips in recognizing transitive and untranslatable verbs. The transitive verb has a doer (subject) and a receiver (direct object) of action. The non-transitive verb has no action receiver. Binding verbs are always untranslatable. It's also important to note the sentence template. This will help recognize the verb as transitive or non-translational. Please indicate whether the verb is transitive or non-transitive. Examples of transitive and non-transitive exercises 1. The boys played cricket in the street. 2. Bradley locked the door of the house. 3. The dog barks. 4. Rachel cooked dinner on Sunday. 5. The car suddenly stopped. ANSWERS 1. Boys played cricket on the street (played - transitive; direct object - cricket) 2. Bradley locked the door of the house (locked - transitive; direct object - door) 3. The dog barks (barks - non-transitive) 4. Rachel cooked dinner on Sunday (cooked - transitive; direct object - dinner) 5. The car suddenly stopped (stopped - non-transitive) Of course, these examples are very easy to identify. However, this will give you an idea of how to define transitive and non-translational verbs. Transitive verbs are verbs that have an object. Untranslatable verbs are verbs that do not have an object. Condition whether the verbs in the following sentences are transitive or non-transitive. Here the verb has an object (I) and therefore it is transitive. Here the verb has an object (cousins) and therefore it is transitive. Here the verb has no object and, therefore, it does not cross. Here the verb has an object (letter) and is therefore a transitive. Here's a verb verb two objects (her and flowers) and therefore it is transitive. Here the verb has no object and, therefore, it does not cross. Here the verb has no object and, therefore, it does not cross. Here the verb wake up has an object (I) and therefore it is transitive. Here the verb to discuss has an object (plans) and therefore it is transitive. Here the verb heard has an object (song) and therefore it is transitive. Here the verb borrow has two objects (me and pounds) and therefore it is transitive. Here the verb has no object and, therefore, it does not cross. Answers 1. She advised me to consult a doctor.
