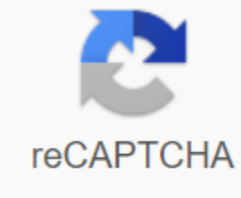




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Gene expression transcription answer

For a dollar per minute of audio, Rev will give you a well-formatted transcript. For 25 cents per minute (a little lower for large volumes), Trint will give you a transcript riddled with bugs, but will help you fix it with a sophisticated editing tool. And for 10 cents per minute, a brand new CheapTranscription.io will give you a no-frills text document with even more errors. Depending on your needs, you can use all three. Here's how to choose. For public transcripts: RevSay you put out a podcast with a few voices on it and you would like to publish transcripts for each episode. Or say you need captions for the video. Or say you interviewed someone and want to print all the interviews. If you can afford it, Rev is the best solution. Price: HighRev charges \$1/minute for transcripts and video captions in English. Video captions include time stamps. G/O Media can get commissionBuy for \$100 from Best BuyThis adds up quickly if you're transcribing a weekly hour-long podcast out of your pocket, but it's cheap enough for a corporate budget. I also used Rev to make high quality signatures for my personal creative video projects. There's no minimum fee, so I even run a three minute YouTube video through Rev. These flat rates, at no extra cost for more speakers. You can pay extra for things like including every verbal tick, or for including a tag on the transcript. Rev also offers translations for 10 cents/word on written documents, \$3-7/minute for audio and video recordings. Transcript quality: HighUpload audio or video rev, and they will return within 24 hours, with careful transcription, each line defined by the speaker, and with ums and other verbal tics edited. Any incomprehensible words will be marked. They are usually minimal, maybe two to five in an hour-long phone call. Rev transcripts can accurately write out both sides of a phone call, or a private interview with average background noise. They can work with a fairly wide range of accents, though if you have a problem hearing something in your own audio recording, they will probably also have a problem. It's not magic. So most of the time, you want to do at least a very easy skim to check names, and for any inserts is promiscuous or unintelligible, or a few too many faithful interviewer transcripts butting with Right and About! Rev delivers its transcripts in the editor's interface, which includes a player for the original audio. The editor can directly edit the text, change the names of the speakers, comment on certain passages, and share the transcript with other users. You can export your text as a docx, PDF or txt. Update: 3/27/2019, 9:30 am ET: Rev recently made a major update to his transcript editor. Much like Trint, Rev now matches the original audio transcription word for word, so you can easily correct the errors. This change is not retroactive, so any transcripts you ordered prior to the update will still use the old editor described below. The new editor makes Rev a much better option than before. Previously: Annoyingly, the Rev audio player is out of sync with the cursor in the text, and does not highlight the relevant text as the audio plays (at least in our Tests on Chrome). So if you need to find a certain line to fix, you will have to hunt around in the record. This is an embarrassing oversight from an otherwise top shelf service. When you don't need Perfection: TrintIf you need to dig into a record, but you don't really need to publish it (or you have time to edit it), you don't need to pay a high rate for human transcription. Machine learning has become very good at speech recognition, and while automated transcription services are not as accurate, they are good enough for many uses, and they are much cheaper. Our favorite, and the one we use in Lifehacker, is Trint. Emmy Award-winning journalist Jeff Coffman covers some of the biggest news stories in the world for ABC.... More Than trit was founded by war correspondent Jeff Coffman (whom I interviewed for Lifehacker) and it's calibrated to be useful for many back-end transcription needs. This is a great solution for journalists who have to hunt through the record for a certain quote, or who want to publish a partial transcript, or want to build a full transcript in less time. Price: LowTrint charges 25 cents per minute of audio or video, the fourth part of Rev's bid. And because it's automated, the turn time for transcription is usually under an hour. Like Rev, Trint charges a flat rate, regardless of multiple votes or accents, and additional time stamps are included. If you transcribed more than 3 hours of audio each month, you can subscribe to a slightly lower rate of 22 cents per minute. At 10 o'clock in you only pay 20 cents per minute. The subscription includes the use of a great Trint transcript editor, which is a real killer product. Transcript quality: Average In these rates, transcribing weekly weekly is relatively affordable, but it will take some extra work. Trint's automatic transcripts are not as accurate as anything that was done by a man. They are easy to travel on phone calls. But if you have a direct recording of each side of the conversation, even with cheap microphones, then Trint will get the transcript basically right. And when you read the transcript, you may notice that a lot of smart, articulate people fill their speech with little ums and likes and you know. I recently interviewed Steven Wolfram, creator of programs like Mathematica and WolframAlpha, one of the smartest people I've ever spoken to, and I'm currently editing a transcript at Trint. I had to remove the annoying word filler in every sentence he spoke. Barely noticeable in speech, very noticeable in the transcripts. (Actually, too literally a transcript is a great way to make someone sound silly, so a little editing is an ethics issue.) Editor: The Editor of GreatTrint is a real advantage of the service. Put the cursor anywhere in the transcript and you can start playing audio from this exact point. This allows for quick accurate editing, and will help you interpret many incomprehensible misscriptions that Trint will do. The editor lets you check the paragraphs as you finish them, add bookmarks and comments, and teach Rev specific words, names and phrases. There's also a find and replace feature. There are granular playback elements using shortcuts, and once you learn them, you'll have a smooth workflow, with the audio smoothly attached to the written word. You can export text as docx, xml, edl for Premiere, HTML player embedded with Trint player, or subtitles srt or vtt. Even if you need a blank transcript worthy of publication, you'll spend a lot less time editing the Trint transcript than you would when you manually decipher the sound from scratch. You'll have to measure your own performance, but you'll probably pay far less for it saved time than your own hourly wage. And if you can use the organizational budget, it's absolutely worth it. That's why Lifehacker's publisher, Gizmodo Media Group, bought a blanket Trint subscription for its journalists. When you just need Gist: CheapTranscriptions.ioMaybe you want a good enough transcript just to get the gist across. You don't care about editing software and you don't mind if there is at least one wrong word in every sentence. Maybe you just need so you can manually scrub through an audio interview for a specific quote. Maybe you just want your podcast episode to show up in appropriate Google searches. In this case, you can get away with CheapTranscription.io, the new fast and dirty dirty Transcription of the service from tech journalist and podcaster John Biggs and developer Tom Prinyt. Price: Very lowCheapTranscription is really cheap, charging 10 cents per minute with a minimum of 50 cents. Download your sound (in our test the site did not accept the video), and in a few minutes you will receive a text transcript. Now there is no export function, so you have to copy-paste the transcript in the text editor. And there are no Times-tampoms. Speakers are divided, but with common names in mind. Transcript quality: LowAnecdotaly, CheapTranscription seems to make more mistakes than Trint, as you would expect from the new service. Like Trint, it includes every verbal tick, which makes reading transcription very annoying. But you can still get the essence of the passage without any editing, and you can usually tell which words are errors. Still picky, but sliding to nonsense. And that's the real problem: Trint will help you fix your work. If you want to edit a CheapTranscription transcript, you'll still want to use a dedicated transcript editor like oTranscribe or Otter. You'll still get better results than the free option: running audio via YouTube and capturing transcripts. At this point, you approach gibberish. Most of us don't need to transcribe audio too often, which means paying for the service.... MoreIn the publication, this service two days ago, so expect that it will get new features like Biggs and Prinyt continue to evolve. They have already announced plans to add human transcripts. Also expect an increase in the quality of transcription as they train their algorithms. Of course, this does not mean that they will ever catch up with Trint or other algorithmic services. Only buy what you NeedRev and CheapTranscription basically have no minimum order, while Trint offers all its best features at \$40/month. So you can put in orders on all three services as you need. Most of the time, Trint is a lot for my purposes. (If I was paying out of pocket, I'd use it less often, but still pick it on CheapTranscription.) But when I'm on deadline with lots of transcripts to handle, I ask my editor to fork out for the Reverend Human Transcription costs four times as much, but that's incredibly accurate. Last year, my editor and I used Rev to shoot down transcripts for four phone interviews, which we then edited into one long feature about touring audio drama Welcome to Night Vale. Getting perfect transcripts saved us hours of working on loud Piece. 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
