Club Nights



The hut was empty, but clean and tidy, following its occupation by 16 scouts from Upper Hutt on Saturday night- Thanks to scouts for a great tidy up!

18 September

Holdsworth pest trapping line. Led by Nigel

Six of us joined at a busy car park at Holdsworth, another sunny day forecast. We were not planning to go far, or fast, and started with a wander along the track to where the Donnelly Flat Loop track meets the Gentle Annie. (A piece of history, the Gentle Annie originally referred to the short track going up to High Point 412, on what later became the longer 'Old' Gentle Annie).

Just 20m along the loop track we started our climb up trap Line 10c, stopping at some of the traps to check the kills recorded on the Goodnature Chirps. Past halfway on the climb and some called for a rest, it was quite steep, and it was also past 10am, so overdue for a "smoko" break. Shortly after we joined on to trap Line 10, crossed over the 'new' Gentle Annie track and on upwards to the junction of Line 10 and the 'old' Gentle Annie. Part of the 'old' Gentle Annie is also trap Line 5, so we headed down Line 5, checking the traps that had recently been rebaited, but no dead rats to be seen. A few birds were to be heard, mostly grey warblers, maybe we were just too late for the dawn chorus!

At the bottom of the Gentle Annie, on the main track to Donnelly Flat, we turned left and had lunch at the SWTC picnic table at Donnelly Flat. Rather than taking the main track back to the car park we took trap line E, for our Thursday trapping group, re-emerging on the main track just before the bridge over to the Lodge.





25 September

Escarpment Track walk. Led by Denise

It's always dangerous to make arrangements on the morning of the move to daylight saving, but it does herald the beginning of summer. All 4 managed to make the designated pickup times with trepidation because a cold southerly was still blowing.

In the back of our minds was what the conditions were going to be like for the objective was a windswept coastal walk. The crossing of the Remutuka pass in heavy rain just added to our weather concerns.

Our greatest navigation issue was the new Transmission Gully motorway, an unfamiliar obstacle for us east coast provincial trampers for it didn't appear on our Topo maps! Finding the correct exit required an unplanned diversion.

With the car safely parked near the Paekakariki rail station our on foot journey begun from the north. Fortunately, the rain had stopped by this point and there were hints of blue sky. We followed the pavement briefly before picking up a small track squeezed between the road and the railway line. Using the underside of a bridge (us trampers are generally use to the top of bridges to make crossings) took us to the hillside into the wooded area. It was interesting to see many unfamiliar species there were. There was a lot of restoration plantings being done.

After crossing a small stream the track climbs abruptly up countless, and soon to be despised, steps. There are claims that there are 1500 steps on the track. I did not dare try to substantiate this. The first 100ms of climb forced us to shed a layer of clothing but the stop did give us time to admire the remains of some Maori terraced gardens. They must have been keen, as the soil did not look that good. Another 100ms of climb saw us at our high point (220ms) and a brief lunch stop.

The Escarpment track is a very contrived route (apart for the section to the Maori gardens) which was built in 2016 for \$1.4m. It forms part of the Te Araroa trail network. Most noticeable about the track is the steep ground that it covers which is generally 30 degrees (at times 45 degrees) in angle. You look down onto the Centennial Highway (circa 1939) and the main trunk railway line. It does give you good views of Kapiti Island and the northern aspects of the Marlborough Sounds.

The next part of the route took us down the flight of stairs known as the "Stairway to Heaven" to the first of two swing bridges spanning two side creeks. The bridges gives us a chance to admire the wind sculptured vegetation canopies. This vegetation graphically depicts the struggle for existence against the prevailing and accelerating coastal winds. The tracks middle section saw us pass through pockets of mature trees, or regrowth. Generally, the track is on relatively open ground.

The track had been closed just prior to our trip due to slips during recent rain. The evidence indicated that these "slips" were relatively minor. There is one slip (circa 2020) where one must navigate a substantial (formed) detour. Remedial work is slowly being carried out because it forms a threat to the railway line and road below.

Finally the altitude was lost and we entered the easier ground of Pukerua Bay. A few back streets saw us at the railway station. After a few minutes we were on the train for the return journey to our car at Paekakariki.

Trip Grades

Grades allocated to each trip, Easy / Easy + / Average etc, depend on several factors including weather, terrain, your own fitness and experience. An averagely fit person could expect to do the below trips as per the following times;

Easy 3-6 hours, little climbing, suitable for beginners to help them assess their

fitness

Easy + 3-6 hours, probably some short hills

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Average 5-8 hours, some experience required, fewer rest stops, almost certainly

some hill work

Fit 6+ hours, Good fitness required, may go off track. Stops for lunch and

smoko. Suitable for experienced trampers.
