What is the lasting memory of your time as WM?

In 2001 I was installed by my Father WBro. Bruce Littley PPrJGW. It was a bit of a blur, I was "top-of the tree" in Dormer, but bottom of the tree in the Army, a newly promoted sergeant, the "New Kid on the Block".

It was nice to be in charge, to have the trust and reassurance of the brethren. There were points in the ceremony where I wondered what was going on. At the Festive Board, the-then PGM RW Bro' Barrie Cooper, said I was "firing too fast". Once a gunner, always a gunner.

What changed in your subsequent chairs?

I do things differently. I share work, encourage junior brethren to have a go and arrange regular lectures, building masonic knowledge.

I was diagnosed with PTSD in 2014, it was a very difficult time. I found that my Masonic activity supported me throughout and has aided my recovery. My job, freemasonry and research activities all compliment each other.

What advice would you give to brethren approaching the chair?

Don't get anxious, just do it, if you're not perfect it's fine, play to your strengths and get others involved, break things into manageable sections. Your skills don't all come from freemasonry, your professional life brings its own perspective, use it.

Often your first office is Inner Guard, if you can do that you can handle the chair. It's a great indicator and perfect preparation, because you must carefully observe the whole ceremony.

Any final words of wisdom?

It's not a race, take your time. If you want to stay in an office for a few years, that's fine.
