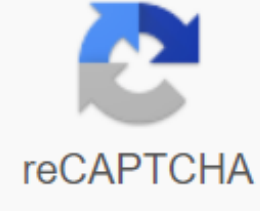

You can make some sculptures of extraordinary paper mache to decorate any room of your house, even garden.you can make a complete gang just like this!! 1) You would need fabrics or toilet paper.2) white glue3) a brush5) a marker or pencil (optional)6) Newspapers or any object (you want to recycle)To insert any paper or any fabric on everything you need to make a mixture of 3 pieces of glue and 1 part of water, it will help you insert the fabric on what you are going to recycle. If you are unable to select a recycling item you can just use some newspapers. Rolling newspapers or crushing it in the shape of this object you want to do would just give you a base or skeleton object. Paper you or wash the fabric will take a long time, you should not do it with great care. You can easily do this. As the power takes time drying it would turn out to be a long time too.after covering the object completely let it dry during the day. Painting is very easy in this kind of work. acrylic paint works best.yay! You made one! TIP- you can even make it waterproof by adding waterproof paint. When you have mixed your pasta and ripped up your newspaper you are ready to start. However, you have to decide what you are going to do! I've done a lot of different things and make shapes out of wire hangers and plastic grocery bags, generously covered with camouflage tape to add a paper mache mix very easily. When I have a shape, it's when I start covering it all with pasta and

paper. You can apply the paste to a brush or sponge, or fingers until you have covered the surface of any shape you have molded with your paper. You will have to cover the shape with at least three or four layers of paste and paper to make it nice and strong. You should also let the shape dry before adding each extra layer. Be generous with pasta. Each strip of paper should be covered so that they will all stick together. You can use all kinds of things for your basic form, such as blown balloons, old fabric boxes, shoe boxes, wiffle balls - all that is already the shape you want to do. For other forms, use plastic food bags and camouflage tape and become You'll see one of the loons (which I love doing) covered with several layers of pasta and paper. Also a giant ice cream cone that was made for a church event. When molding over something like a salad bowl, you need to grease the surface of the vase bowl with vaseline to make the paper mache easier to remove into one piece when it is dry. When working on small objects or complex areas where parts are combined, use narrow, short strips of your newspaper. This term applies whether liquid starch, glue mixture, or flour and water combination has been used. The paper mash process uses sticky but strong glue to attach layers of paper or newspaper paper to the base form, such as a balloon, cup, egg box or crumpled foil. When dry, the form is light, strong and difficult. Before painting, any rough spots are smoothed with sandpaper. After that, the project is painted and decorated. Once it's dry, you can cut your eyes, nose and mouth holes to form frowns, smiles or whatever you like. What you do with the mask is now yours. If you want to paint it, use acrylic paints. Aquaray paint will not be thick enough to cover words and photos on the pages of the newspaper. For masks with horns, teeth, wrinkles or other hard features, you can form extra paper mache on the mask when it is done. The possibilities are almost limitless with paper mache. Two of the most popular items to do are pinata and volcano. If you know what you want to do, then create a base or form for your project. Once your base is ready, you have to prepare the paste. Browse this collection of paper paste mache options and choose the one that works best for your project. When your base and glue is ready, you will need to tear the newspaper into strips. The length of the bands can vary depending on the size of the project; However, you want your bands to be about 1 to 2 inches wide. Dip one piece of newspaper at a time in a paper paste mache. You want the newspaper strip to be saturated. saturated strip over a bowl of pasta and run it through your fingers to squeeze any excess paste. After all layers of paper mache are applied and dried, you are ready to draw, decorate and proudly show your work of art. Tear the newspaper into strips - don't cut it. The torn strips are stacked more smoothly. Be generous when immersing newspaper strips in pasta- you want each piece carefully saturated. Let each layer dry completely before adding another one. Cover your work surface well as paper mache can get pretty messy. It can be helpful to keep a bowl of water or a wet cloth nearby to clean your fingers. Then blow up and tie the balloon. Some people prefer to install a balloon on top of the bowl for use as a stand while working on the formation of the globe. If you want to do this, cover the bowl with plastic wrap so that the paper mache does not stick to it. Break the newspaper into strips that are about 1 inch wide and 4 to 6 inches long. You will need a lot of newspaper strips for this project, so break a few pages. Now it's time to make a paper paste mache. Start by putting 3 cups of water in a saucepan and bring it to the boil. While waiting for the water to boil, mix 1 cup of flour and 1/2 cup of resin glue powder in a medium-sized container. Then add 1 cup of warm water, stirring briskly to remove any lumps. Once the pot of water boils, stir in the flour mixture. Boil for two to three minutes or until it is clear and smooth. Then remove the pan from the heat and allow it to cool until it is safe to work. Transfer the pasta back to a medium-sized container in which you will eventually store it. Dip one newspaper strip in a paper paste mache until it is completely saturated. Hold a saturated strip over the pasta container. Gently run it through your fingers to squeeze out the excess paste, be careful not to break it. Stick to the newspaper strip in a hot air balloon, and smooth it with your fingers. Continue the same process of adding the paste to one strip at a time and sticking the strip to the balloon. The goal is to stick to the lanes so they overlap and run in different directions. Stop when the ball is completely covered with one layer of newspaper strips. Once one layer of newspaper strips is applied, let your paper globe mache completely dry. This can take up to 24 hours. Meanwhile, store paper paste mache in a container with an airtight lid in Once the first layer is dry, apply the second layer of newspaper strips just as you did the first layer. Then, let it dry completely. Once again, store the pasta in the fridge. Once the second layer has dried, repeat the process of paper mash again for the third layer. Then wait until it has completely dried. You won't need any more paper paste mash. Once the paper mache is dry, use acrylic paint to decorate your globe. You can draw continents and oceans in green and blue to look like an actual globe or go more abstract with colors. Add as many details as you want. And if you work with kids, share some fun facts about countries around the world as well as water bodies. We have featured various handmade paper skills over the years here, but perhaps none of them are as mind-bendingly flexible as paper works by Chinese artist Li Hongbo. What might seem at first classic style of plaster busts is immediately broken when the figures are in motion, unfolding in a rather psychedelic elongation of form through space and time. He applied the same cellular paper structure to much larger human forms, which led to these very flexible sculptures. Lee explains why he chose paper as the material for his work: It is the visual impact of me to realize that an alternative opportunity existed in the language of paper texture and form: from concrete to abstract; From the physical to the intangible; From standardization to liberation or vice versa. Thus, continuity has become a key element of language expression here; its collection and scattering, ups and downs, twists and turns gave us a set of unpredictable images. As can be seen from the fascinating first video above from the Schoeni gallery, Lee's meticulous process begins by gluing hundreds of sheets of paper without wood by hand into blocks, which are then polished into the desired shapes. As Lee demonstrates in another video below (Mandarin only), he first started with crafted paper guns, which in a surprising turn open in beautiful, round shapes. While we certainly hope that the materials used are recycled and recycled, what is interesting here is how Lee has kept the tradition, reinterpreted it into new forms and functions. In addition, the visual pleasure of the fact that the shapes are stretched and deformed, evokes a sense of quantum multidimensionality that in fact matter can does not extend beyond our comprehension.
