CLEANING NOT POLLUTING

We strive toward a circular food system where the interests of humans, animals, and nature are interconnected.

This may sound a bit presumptuous, but this means we want to create a world with less or no meat, eggs, and dairy in our shopping baskets. And it definitely calls for more respect for animals and nature. Basically, we offer our chickens a habitat to express their natural behavior as much as possible. It's still not perfect, but we are doing our best in making their lives as pleasant as possible.

We are working towards a food system in which livestock does not gobble up valuable land but rather upcycles existing residual flows from food production. This means livestock numbers need to match the size of the available food surplus and residual flows from food systems. We explain how this works - and its impacts - in this annual report.



OUR VIEW OF AGRICULTURE

We look forward to a world in which people eat plantbased alternatives to meat, eggs and dairy - and where animals are no longer seen as meat deposits.

WHY?

Because plant-based food is less harmful for the climate and the environment than animal proteins. Pushing crops first through the stomach of a chicken, cow or pig, means less food for people to eat. Removing animals from our food chain will bring us closer to solutions around global warming, famine, deforestation, etcetera.

FEED

Currently, over 75% of all agricultural land is used to grow livestock feed crops or for grazing (source: FAO). Feeding people with crops derived directly from the land is more efficient and generally less polluting. But people still like to eat animals, so there's still a lot of work to be done.

UKRAINE

Consider this: the very first grain shipment from Ukraine since the war started was filled with chicken feed - 26,000 tons of corn to be exact. Meanwhile, the number of people who are unsure if they will have enough to eat tomorrow has increased from 440 million to 1.6 billion, according to The Economist. Too much valuable farmland is being used to grow animal feed. So, let's make better use of that land by growing food directly for people. Let's free the world's poorest people of the drudgery of endlessly foraging for food.

UPCYCLING

Hence, Kipster won't be using any shiploads of Ukrainian corn. Our chickens upcycle residual flows from the food industry into eggs and meat. By using (almost) no land, we are seeking to be part of the solution. It's our small contribution to creating a future-proof agriculture.

IF WE USE THE LAND DIRECTLY FOR HUMAN FOOD, WE'D:

- Feed many more mouths
- Need less farmland
- Maintain natural habitats
- Emit fewer greenhouse gases
- Reduce the risk of zoonotic diseases









THANK YOU, CHICKENS!

We see chickens as animals with needs and instincts that deserve a dignified existence.

Chickens know fear, feel pain and have desires. It's our responsibility to give them the best life possible. We are grateful to the chickens for the eggs they lay and the living they provide us.





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THANK YOU, ROOSTERS!

For every laying hen, a rooster is also born. This is basic reproductive math. Yet these so-called "laying roosters" are considered worthless since - surprise, surprise - they can't lay eggs.


Meanwhile they have too little meat on their bones to compete with meat chickens. This is why it's customary to gas these male chicks as soon as they hatch. In the Netherlands this involves about 4 million chicks annually.


USEFUL FUNCTION

No cockerels are gassed for Kipster eggs. Thanks to the cooperation with Victoria Trading and Lidl Netherlands, the cocks grow up according to the standards of the highest quality-of-life certification. Together we give these animals a useful function in our food system. As a result, fewer chickens need to be killed for our meat consumption since one kilo of this cockerel meat can replace a kilo of meat from the meat industry.

COSTLY

Allowing laying roosters to grow up is inefficient and costly compared to especially-bred broiler chickens. Roosters eat relatively more food compared to how much weight they actually put on. But while it's more expensive, it is more ethical in our eyes.









HOW MUCH ENERGY GOES INTO AN EGG?

We measure – in MJ (megajoules) – how much energy we put into an egg. This begins with the parent animals and also includes the hatching of the eggs right through to transport to our customers, as well as the raising of the cockerels. The bottom line is one-third of the energy remains in the egg and the rest is needed to make it.

CLOSING DUTCH CYCLES

Our chickens eat a specially developed feed made from leftovers from, for example, large bakeries.

In this way, they contribute to a better environment and reduce waste. We barely need any fields for growing chicken feed.


AMBITION


We strive for chicken feed that consists of 95% residuals and 5% vitamins and minerals. This year we are still 4.3% below that.

Our goal is to get away from soy. We just haven't yet been successful in making a balanced soy-free feed. But we are making small steps in the right direction.

MORE SOY IN FEED THAN OUR GOAL

- 2020 5.1% more
- 2021 3.7% more

CLIMATE-NEUTRAL FARMING

This means we first try to reduce all our emissions. Whatever's left, we compensate.

CLIMATE-NEUTRAL EGG

A climate-neutral egg is not a utopian vision for us, but daily practice. We do this mainly by feeding our hens with residual flows from food production, and by generating our electricity from solar panels on our farms' roofs. Our white eggs also help: their CO2 footprint is 5% less than brown eggs.

ANIMAL INDUSTRY

At the moment Kipster is just a drop in a bucket: a modest example of how things can be done differently. We are still part of the animal industry that according to the magazine *Groene Amsterdammer* (May 2022) in the Netherlands "emits twice as much methane as all households, traffic, oil and gas producers, industrial plants, power plants, ships, airplanes and landfills in our country put together."

And according to Royal Netherlands Meteorological Institute (KNMI), methane (CH4) is a stronger greenhouse gas than CO2 – 30 to 70 times stronger depending on chosen time horizon. Also something to note: methane is virtually non-existent when it comes to chicken (and pig) farming. Darn cows.







CO₂ FOOTPRINT

FROM JANUARY 1ST TO DECEMBER 31ST, 2022

Here are our preliminary results. The full environmental impact of our eggs in 2022 will be published in a separate independently-reviewed report.


FOR THE EXPERTS

We look at Global Warming Potential (GWP) expressed in CO2 equivalents. Thereby we can express the extent greenhouse gases contribute to global warming relative to CO_2 . For agriculture, the main greenhouse gases are CO_2 , CH_4 (methane) and N_2O (nitrous oxide).

FROM PARENT ANIMALS TO EGG CUSTOMER

In the CO2-footprint calculations, the in- and outputs from cradle-to-first-customer is included. This begins with the parent stock and the hatching of the laying hens and cockerels and ends with the arrival of the eggs at our customers.

Our emissions are fully compensated with Fairtrade and Gold Standard certified credits from the Birds, Bees & Business project in Burkina Faso.



BIGGEST OUTBREAK OF BIRD FLU EVER

As of October 5th, 2022, there is again a mandatory cage policy for poultry. That is because bird flu broke out in several poultry farms.

It concerns the highly pathogenic variant H5N1. Therefore, throughout the Netherlands, it's still prohibited to visit locations with risk birds (with exceptions being veterinarians and personnel).

Of course, we are not happy about this. And neither are our chickens. Normally we like to receive visitors to our farms. And we also let the chickens out in the open air. Fortunately, we have indoor gardens with lots of daylight, good ventilation, climbing trees and plenty of room for scratching and dust baths. So the chickens can still feel a bit as if they are outside.

The problem with bird flu is it's very contagious. There is now even talk of a world-wide outbreak among wild birds that also affects mammals. Also, the virus can infect humans (zoonosis). Concerns about bird flu therefore remain high. And let's face it, as long as we haven't switched to a (more) plant-based food system, the end is not yet in sight.

Between May and October, the chickens were allowed a beak of fresh air in the outdoor garden. After that they had to go back into lockdown indefinitely.







PART 1. HOW PECKING ORDER RESEMBLES THE MAFIA



CAPOS

These are the somewhat higher-ranking chickens.

They have differing power relations and peck each other to reestablish the order as they see it. It rarely degenerates into a blood bath. It's more about:

"You! Out of my way! I'm going first."

BOSS

This is the one who's always in front of the feeders and has the best resting spot. They have a very loose beak when it comes to pecking. You know the type.

UNDERBOSS

As the boss's right-talon, this is the number two in the pecking order. So, she might occasionally get reprimanded with a peck from the boss. The opposite situation will never happen. And the other chickens will definitely get their butt pecked if they need to reminded about the state of the hierarchy.

SOLDATO

They are at the bottom of the ranks. Of all the chickens in the coop, they get pecked around the most. These she-soldatos will never peck another chicken and meekly accepts their place as last.

FREEBIRD, NOT

Sometimes chickens fall into disfavor with the rest of the group. For example, when they are weak or injured. Then you're out of the system. You can dehydrate or get pecked to death. It's a cruel world best avoided...





PART 2. NEVER A DULL MOMENT



When chickens get bored, they start messing with each other. So it's important that there's always something to do. And that's what we provide at Kipster.

FREE-RANGING

Chickens spend 60 to 90% of their waking hours looking for food. That's why we scatter around a lot of feed to scavenge when the chickens come out of their nests in the morning. "Hey, what's that?"

HAY BALES

Chickens love to peck at and jump on the hay bales. Our bales are made of alfalfa hay. So, they're also tasty.

DUST BATH

Chickens like to take a refreshing dust bath for personal hygiene reasons. We facilitate this by having many different individual dust baths so a rejuvenating flutter is always just a few struts away....

BOWLS

We provide so-called pecking blocks for the chickens so they can maintain their beaks and nails.

FAKE TREES

These are just like real trees: made of wood. But we made the trunks and branches out of dead planks. It makes the chickens feel like they are in their natural habitat: the woods.

HEALTHY CHICK

When she is well feathered, she scurries around and has no tendency to peck at her mates or pull out her own feathers. Bored chickens have a tendency to do this more...





PART 3. THE DEEPER SIDE OF CLUCKING



SOCIAL TALK

By cackling among themselves, chickens make it clear where they stand in the pecking order. This ranges from a gentle murmur to a cacophony of malicious clucking. Like humans: sometimes they're happy, sometimes they're grumpy.

ALARM CRY

When danger threatens, chickens alarm each other. They have a ground alarm to warn against earth-bound predators such as foxes. And if the danger comes from above via a circling bird of prey, the air alarm sounds. The chickens then know to flee or take cover.

FOOD GROUP

Chickens have different sounds for different types of food. If they discover a source of insects, the call will sound different than when they uncover a plant-based food source.

TALKING EGG

The unborn chicks squeak in the egg to exchange information with their mother. Already, they are learning what their parents' sounds mean.

THAT'S WHY THE ROOSTER CROWS

Roosters like to impress the hennies by getting all cock-adoodle-do in the morning. At the same time, this sends a signal to competing roosters: "This is my turf."





PEELING BACK THE CHICKEN AND THE EGG STORY

GREAT-GRANDPARENTS

The great-grandparents of Kipster chickens come from a pure line owned by Hendrix Genetics, one of two major companies controlling the layer genetics market worldwide. Kipster chickens are from the Dekalb White brand.

GRAND PARENTS

The grandparents of our chickens live in specialized farms. Here, the parents of the laying hens are born.

PARENTS

The parents grow up at so-called breeding farms where they lay the eggs from which laying hens burst free. On average, for every eight hens there is usually one rooster to fertilize the eggs.

HATCHING EGG

In so-called hatching eggs, our hens grow. Until they hatch 21 days later, they lie in an incubator. Then the wee roosters are separated from the wee hens. Usually, the roosters are killed immediately. But at Kipster, they are raised for their meat.

Meanwhile the young hens - the pullets - are sent to a rearing farm.

LAYING HENS

At the rearing farm, the chicks are prepared for the real work: laying eggs. They learn where to eat, drink and sleep. At 17 weeks, the mature pullets arrive at Kipster. When they are around 21 weeks, they start pumping out the eggs.


All Kipster chickens on the farm are the same age. They've all crawled out of the egg at the same time. Scientists still don't know why this happens. At the moment we are doing research into simplifying the so-called chicken chain, reducing animal transportation and generally improving well-being.


