How fake to play the piano, our video series on learning the piano is not boring. Previously, composer and pianist Jason Oberholzer taught you octaves and fifth, notes, chords and keys, as well as the creation of your own music. Today he will show you how to explore almost any music on the piano. This lesson was difficult for me- I just learned to claw my hands in the fifth a few minutes ago, so Jason took over and showed what you can achieve with enough hours of practice. He also explains how all the building blocks we've learned form the basis for the most popular music. Studying all this in one day was a huge challenge. I walked away with something that normal piano lessons failed to give me: the feeling that I could create beautiful sounds on the piano. I can't name notes other than C, and I can't read music, but I can understand the ideas behind what my hands are doing, and for the first time in years, I'm happy to teach myself more. This completes it as a fake piano game. Watch the entire series here and then go out and explore on your own. Now I need to find a new hobby to fake. An article in Fast Company earlier this year put forward unsurprising statistics: of the top 10 YouTube searches with lessons in the query, all of them were related to music. But these amateur lessons, the part continued to note, are not always effective, they cannot be adapted to individual students, and they lack the instant feedback that such a useful component in the flesh of the instructions. Chris Vance, founder of Playground Sessions, read the play with interest. With a clever piece of interactive software, he tries to bring a dusty old piano lesson into the 21st century. And if you believe all these searches on YouTube, there are still a lot of people who want to learn. The basic philosophy of the system takes the idea of learning to play and flips it on its head. The Sessions playground, which is currently available as a kind of public beta and will roll out in its final version in the coming months, is an app for Mac and PC that teaches users to play the piano through video tutorials and slightly gamified play-alongs. The lessons are led by self-taught YouTube sensation David Sides and take users through the basics of music theory, from chords to key signatures in scale and syncopation. As users practice the techniques they learned with the MIDI keyboard, they get scored for accuracy, and the progress panel tracks their progress as they move through the program. The inspiration for the software came a few years ago when Vance noticed a fusion of public interest in music, interactivity and learning. It all started with trends.... Incredible success we saw at Rosetta Stone, the success we saw in GarageBand guitar guitar when they were really at their peak. It's kind of like the ultimate quirk. But it certainly reassured everyone that this is a global understanding that has always been around and will probably always be around that people harbor a desire to be a rock star is still very true. But if there's anything in the music world that's exactly the opposite of being a rock star, he sits behind a piano-image lesson sparked by one of the stuffy old instructor, the endless repetition of scales, and a house that smells like cats. Vance was convinced that there is a better way, something more interesting, more fun, and above all more relevant to how people enjoy music today. The basic philosophy of the system takes the idea of learning to play and flips it on its head. From the beginning, playground sessions are about the game to learn. The first video in the Bootcamp software section is called Introduction to the Keyboard, but immediately things are livelier than the name of the lesson suggests. Within seconds, Parties shows you how to play the familiar tune of the 2001 hit Superman band Five For Fighting. Only after you spent a few minutes tickling the ivory and probably surprised yourself by how quickly you were able to coax the keyboard into playing something that resembles a music-making parties double back and start explaining the theory behind the melody. We're not going to pretend that music theory isn't important, Vance explained to me, we're just not going to teach music theory the way it's traditionally taught. We will teach the relevance of music theory. And we always combine the theory of music with the music you know and love. We're incredibly confident, he continued, that if people go through our music program that we call Bootcamp, they'll be engaged in David, they're going to engage because it's music theory, but you're kind of learning without even knowing what you're learning. It's not easy how to learn it, learn it, learn it - it's a game to learn the method, so it's playing it, playing it, playing it. Then we step back and say, What we just learned is how important this is, and how can you apply it, how do you go further? Let's not treat them like idiots. The emphasis on contemporary music is another key way in which playground sessions are a departure from traditional lessons. The Entertainer, timeless though, may not be as likely to excite new students as much as the familiar songs of Jackson 5, Ne-Yo, or Beyonce. are some of the artists available in the game session of the built-in store (Vance says the team is focused on expanding the store to include much more contemporary music as well as jazz, classics, and holiday themed pieces). In this section users can buy video tutorials for modern songs, play along with live band accompaniments, or, once they are ready, just download the notes to follow themselves. It's a good way to make sure you're learning music that you like from the beginning. The number one thing we've done, Vance said, is user empowerment. Let's not treat them like idiots. Successful learning about someone who is engaged, and because they are engaged, they will learn. But the current iteration of Playground Sessions suffers a bit from this freedom- a small number of songs and individual bootcamp lessons available to users right out of the gate can be a little overwhelming for someone looking for more guided track instructions. Vance agrees and sees the need for a better balance in this regard. One thing we've learned over time with testing is we need to do a little better with giving people recommendations or suggestions. So we are in the process of building ... recommendation engine, so we can be more forward on where you want to go. Finding that sweet engagement spot, where users feel compelled to keep going back to the software to view new lessons and download new songs, will be one of the game sessions of central problems. The app is currently priced at \$150, which gets you all 27 interactive Bootcamp lessons, as well as video tutorials for three songs from the app's library, although Vance says the company is considering a la carte model for future sales lessons. It seems that the right step-most of the YouTube music lesson appeal is the low cost of entry, and knowing that if the instruction is not gelling with your needs as a student, you can always help out. However, for those who stick to it, playground sessions are undoubtedly cheaper than traditional lessons, and the only smells you'll be exposed to are those in your own home. You can download the free 7-day trial on the Playground Sessions website. Adjustable piano benches are an excellent option; especially for growing children, those who share the piano, and those who still become comfortable on the keyboard. Traditional piano benches are not one-size-fits-all - you may have to adjust the bench in order to achieve proper piano posture. With your feet in the picture, your hips are no longer your center of gravity - your back is free to bend back and forth, and your torso can provide momentum for your upper body during strong dynamics and long octave spans. Avoid sitting at the piano as you would on your desktop; The keyboard can cover your knees, but your hips are not designed to underneath the tool. Sitting too high in front of the piano can cause pain in the upper back and neck; Sitting on a low makes for poor gaming positions and reduced keyboard vision. Your height should allow you to touch the keys with your forearms parallel to the floor. The hips are almost parallel; It is normal for the knees to be a little lower than your hips.
