SAT dates and deadlines: 2020-2021 In general, the College administers the SAT on Saturdays, with more tests offered in the fall. If saturday's test cannot be performed for religious or other reasons, alternative dates are usually available on Sunday. Below, we give you sat test dates, normal registration deadlines, late registration deadlines, and score release dates for the remaining 2020/2021 test dates. The test dates were officially confirmed by the College Board, although some of the score release dates did not. We have included both confirmed and planned test dates for the rest of the year. I have listed international test dates in separate tables since the SAT is administered on fewer dates outside the United States. Note that in the United States and internationally, SAT Subject Tests are available on all SAT dates except March. SAT Test Dates 2020-2021 (US) The College Board has added a September test date in 2020 to take into account previous test cancellations due to COVID-19. At the moment, the College has announced no plans to make the September SAT date a regular event. For more information about the new September 2020 test date, click here. Note that the SAT exam of May 2, 2020 and the exam of June 6, 2020 were canceled due to the COVID-19 outbreak. You can find more information about the effects of COVID-19 on SAT tests here. This is due to the fact that most college application deadlines are in late fall and of winter. Essentially, the College Board is giving seniors more shots hit their SAT target scores just before their applications are due. In spring, SAT dates are more common, with the exception of May and June. This is due, once again, to the fact that in spring there are fewer deadlines for submitting university applications than in autumn and early winter. These dates are also geared more towards young people and other students who would like to take the SAT soon. Next, we can see that due to the high number of test dates in the fall, it is difficult to take two series TESTS in a row. When your score for a test comes out, the late registration date for the next test will often have already passed! Even if you were to go ahead and register for another test without knowing your scores, you might end up wasting money on a shot if your scores are higher than you thought. Similarly, if you don't sign up for the following test, you may miss the only chance to increase your scores before your application deadlines. Taking the ATA TYPES there back-to-back also doesn't give you enough time to make the most of your recovery; you'll probably see a small, if any, improvement in scores due to the lack of proper preparation time between tests. Choosing the best date for the SAT test for you: 5 essential factors It is essential to choose an SAT test date that works well not only for anyone, but especially for you. Here are five main factors to consider before committing to a test date. #1: When are the college application deadlines? By far the most important factors are college application deadlines. In the United States, most deadlines fall around January 1 (by regular decision) and November 1 or 15 (for an early action/early decision). The College Board sends SAT scores to schools (for your four free scoring reports) starting one day before the online score is released, or about three to five weeks after the exam. However, not all schools process scores immediately; in fact, some may take a week or so to report scores. As a result, it may be necessary to wait a maximum of about six weeks after the test date for schools to officially perform SAT scores. And that doesn't even include the extra time it takes to process orders for additional score reports (if you have more than four schools that you want to send scores to). Ordering these reports will add at least another week or two once scores are released. Therefore, as a rule, do not take the SAT less than five or six weeks before the universities are due. If you order additional score reports after your scores are released, respect trial dates more than seven or eight weeks before deadlines. Remember that If your schools don't receive or process your SAT scores on time, your application may be disqualified! Then plan accordingly. #2: Are you applying for SAT scholarships? Another factor is SAT scholarships. In general, SCHOOL-based SAT scholarships as university applications. If you're not sure when your SAT scores are due, contact your schools directly to ask if your scores should arrive earlier or with your question. #3: How many times are you going to get the SAT? You should also consider whether you might want to resume the SAT if you're not getting the necessary college scores. It is generally recommended to take the SAT at least twice, possibly three times, depending on your scoring goals. Here's our suggested SAT schedule: Take the SAT in the fall of your junior year Take the SAT a second time in the spring of your junior year Take the SAT a final time at the end of summer/early fall of your last year if you took your first SAT in the spring of your junior year instead of fall, you still have plenty of opportunities to take the SAT once or twice more. You could, for example, take the SAT a second time in June or August and a third time in October or November. That said, avoid signing up for back-to-back SAT test dates, especially in the fall of your senior year. Squeezing into too many sRETTI just gives you time to study and probably won't increase your score by any obvious margin. Also, trying to balance so much preparation during the school year, and how you're applying for college, no less!, is an incredibly stressful effort. Then spread your tests in the best possible way. #4: How much study time will it take? Before you sign up for the SAT, decide how much time you'll need to spend studying. Normally we recommend set aside three to six months for SAT preparation. This amount of time allows you to space study sessions so that you study consistently without burning yourself. More importantly, however, you will want enough hours of study. The number of hours you'll need to spend studying depends on the number of points you want to improve your base SAT score for. (A basic score is the score you get on an official SAT practice test before starting any SAT preparation.) Below is the (approximate) number of study hours needed to make the following total improvements to the point on the SAT: improvement of 0-30 points: 10 hours 30-70 improvement points: 20 hours 70-130 improvement point: 40 hours 130-200 improvement point: 80 hours 200-330 improvement point: 150 hours - As you can see, the bigger the increase in points you want, the more hours you will have to study. Unfortunately, not everyone has a lot of time to devote entirely to SAT preparation. At the very least, time trial in at least 10 hours of preparation. If you only have a month or so before test day, you can still increase your score by big as long as you're willing to put in the effort. Obligations can be anything from school games and AP testing to sports tournaments and family holidays. Before choosing a test date, make sure you're aware of your schedule. I suggest using a planner to take note of any large blocks of time during which you will be too busy to study for the SAT. Quick start guide: What is the best SAT test date for juniors? For the elderly? For timely action? In fact, the date of the best SAT test varies for each student; however, sometimes you just want to know what a good trial date is, in general. Here, we'll take a quick look at the best SAT test dates for four common scenarios. Scenario 1: You are a Junior Best Dates for 1st SAT: October, November, December For the 2ND SAT: March, May, June You should always take your first JUNIOR SAT, ideally in autumn. The October and November test dates offer plenty of flexibility and plenty of time to study and prepare for the second round if you want to take the SAT again. In spring, try taking the SAT in March or May, or at the latest, June. These dates ensure you have the entire summer to rate your scores, finalize your college list, and decide if you want to take the test again in August or fall. Scenario 2: You are a Senior Best Dates: August, October, NovemberRiskier Date: December As a senior, you have up to four possible SAT test dates (for regular decision deadlines): August, October, November, and December. As with all university prepares, the sooner the better! Try taking the SAT in August, October, or November. These three test dates should have little trouble getting college scores on time, assuming your first deadline is somewhere around January 1. Although you can also opt for the December test date, I would only do so if your deadlines are January 10 or later. December scores aren't usually released until the end of December, so January 1 could play a little too close for some colleges. If the regular deadline for the decision is particularly early, such as the University of California's November 30 deadline, opt instead for the August or October test dates. Scenario 3: You're applying early action /The best dates for early decisions: June, AugustRiskier Date: October Most early action deadlines are November 1 or 15. A test date of June or August (before the last year) is excellent choice since scores on both test dates should definitely get to your schools on time. These dates also give you the to focus entirely on university applications instead of SAT preparation. The October deadline is a bit riskier, though, as its scores aren't normally released until the end of October. So, if your deadline is November 1, October probably won't work. If your deadlines are November 15 or later, however, October should be fine. Scenario 4: College applications did not expire until February or later Many schools have deadlines later than normal in February, March, April, May, June, July, August, and even September. So what SAT test dates will work for these late decision schools? Below are the latest SAT test dates that you can choose depending on the expiration of your college application. The latest recommended dates are pretty much guaranteed to get SAT scores for schools on time, while riskier dates may not get scores before deadlines.
